AN ACT

- To award a Congressional Gold Medal, collectively, to the U.S. Merchant Marine of World War II, in recognition of their dedicated and vital service during World War II.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- This Act may be cited as the "Merchant Marine of
- 3 World War II Congressional Gold Medal Act".
- 4 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

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- 5 The Congress finds the following:
- 6 (1) 2015 marks the 70th anniversary of the Allied victory in World War II and the restoration of peacetime across the European and Pacific theaters.
- 9 (2) The United States Merchant Marine was in-10 tegral in providing the link between domestic pro-11 duction and the fighting forces overseas, providing 12 combat equipment, fuel, food, commodities, and raw 13 materials to troops stationed overseas.
 - (3) Fleet Admiral Ernest J. King acknowledged the indispensability of the Merchant Marine to the victory in a 1945 letter stating that without their support, "the Navy could not have accomplished its mission".
 - (4) President and former Supreme Commander of the Allied Forces, Dwight D. Eisenhower, acknowledged that "through the prompt delivery of supplies and equipment to our armed forces overseas, and of cargoes representing economic and military aid to friendly nations, the American Merchant Marine has effectively helped to strengthen the forces of freedom throughout the world".

- 1 (5) Military missions and war planning were 2 contingent upon the availability of resources and 3 that the United States Merchant Marine played a 4 vital role in this regard, ensuring the efficient and 5 reliable transoceanic transport of military equipment 6 as well as both military and civilian personnel.
 - (6) The United States Merchant Marine provided for the successful transport of resources and personnel despite consistent and ongoing exposure to enemy combatants from both the air and the sea, such as enemy bomber squadrons, submarines, and mines.
 - (7) The efforts of the United States Merchant Marine were not without sacrifices as they bore a higher per capita casualty rate than any other branch of the military during the war.
 - (8) The United States Merchant Marine proved to be an instrumental asset on untold occasions, participating in every landing operation by the United States Marine Corps from Guadalcanal to Iwo Jima as well as providing, for instance, the bulk tonnage of material necessary for the invasion of Normandy which "would not have been possible without the Merchant Marine", as a 1944 New York Times article observed.

- 1 (9) In also assessing their performance, General
 2 Dwight D. Eisenhower stated, "every man in this
 3 Allied command is quick to express his admiration
 4 for the loyalty, courage, and fortitude of the officers
 5 and men of the Merchant Marine. We count upon
 6 their efficiency and their utter devotion to duty as
 7 we do our own; they have never failed us".
 - (10) During a September 1944 speech, President Franklin D. Roosevelt stated, the Merchant Marine has "delivered the goods when and where needed in every theater of operations and across every ocean in the biggest, the most difficult, and dangerous transportation job ever undertaken. As time goes on, there will be greater public understanding of our merchant fleet's record during this war.".
 - (11) The feats and accomplishments of the Merchant Marine are deserving of broader public recognition.
 - (12) The United States will be forever grateful and indebted to the U.S. Merchant Marine for their effective, reliable, and courageous transport of goods and resources in enemy territory throughout theaters of every variety in World War II; that these goods and resources saved thousands of lives and en-

- 1 abled the Allied Powers to claim victory in World
- War II.
- 3 (13) The Congressional Gold Medal will be an
- 4 appropriate way to shed further light on the service
- 5 of the Merchant Marine in World War II and the in-
- 6 strumental role they played in winning World War
- 7 II.

8 SEC. 3. CONGRESSIONAL GOLD MEDAL.

- 9 (a) AWARD AUTHORIZED.—The Speaker of the
- 10 House of Representatives and the President pro tempore
- 11 of the Senate shall make appropriate arrangements for the
- 12 award, on behalf of the Congress, of a single gold medal
- 13 of appropriate design to the U.S. Merchant Marine of
- 14 World War II, in recognition of their dedicated and vital
- 15 service during World War II.
- 16 (b) Design and Striking.—For the purposes of the
- 17 award referred to in subsection (a), the Secretary of the
- 18 Treasury (hereafter referred to as the "Secretary") shall
- 19 strike the gold medal with suitable emblems, devices, and
- 20 inscriptions, to be determined by the Secretary.
- 21 (c) American Merchant Marine Museum.—
- 22 (1) IN GENERAL.—Following the award of the
- gold medal in honor of the U.S. Merchant Marine,
- the gold medal shall be given to the American Mer-

- 1 chant Marine Museum, where it will be available for
- 2 display as appropriate and available for research.

3 SEC. 4. DUPLICATE MEDALS.

- 4 Under such regulations as the Secretary may pre-
- 5 scribe, the Secretary may strike and sell duplicates in
- 6 bronze of the gold medal struck under section 3, at a price
- 7 sufficient to cover the costs of the medals, including labor,
- 8 materials, dies, use of machinery, and overhead expenses.

9 SEC. 5. STATUS OF MEDALS.

- 10 (a) National Medals.—Medals struck pursuant to
- 11 this Act are national medals for purposes of chapter 51
- 12 of title 31, United States Code.
- 13 (b) Numismatic Items.—For purposes of section
- 14 5134 of title 31, United States Code, all medals struck
- 15 under this Act shall be considered to be numismatic items.
