Mr. Kratovil (for himself and Mr. Boustany) introduced the following bill; which was referred to the Committee on Natural Resources

A BILL

To provide for the eradication and control of nutria in Maryland, Louisiana, and other coastal States.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Nutria Eradication
- 5 and Control Act of 2009".
- 6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS; PURPOSE.
- 7 (a) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—
- 8 (1) wetland and tidal marshes in the Chesa-
- 9 peake Bay, the State of Louisiana, and other coastal

- States provide significant cultural, economic, and ecological benefits to the United States;
- 3 (2) the South American nutria (Myocastor 4 coypus) is directly contributing to substantial marsh 5 loss on Federal, State, and private land in the 6 States of Maryland and Louisiana and other coastal 7 States;
 - (3) the Nutria Eradication and Control Act of 2003 (Public Law 108–16; 117 Stat. 621) authorized the Maryland Nutria Project, which has successfully eradicated nutria from more than 130,000 acres of Chesapeake Bay wetland in the State of Maryland;
 - (4) the Nutria Eradication and Control Act of 2003 (Public Law 108–16; 117 Stat. 621) and the Coastal Wetlands Planning, Protection, and Restoration Act (16 U.S.C. 3951 et seq.) authorized the Coastwide Nutria Control Program, which has reduced nutria-impacted wetland acres in the State of Louisiana from 80,000 acres to 23,141 acres; and
 - (5) proven techniques developed under the Nutria Eradication and Control Act of 2003 (Public Law 108–16; 117 Stat. 621) that are eradicating nutria from the State of Maryland and are reducing the acres of nutria-impacted wetland in Louisiana,

- 1 should be applied to nutria eradication or control 2 programs in other nutria-infested coastal States. 3 (b) Purpose.—The purpose of this Act is to authorize the Secretary of the Interior to provide financial assistance to the States of Maryland, Louisiana, Delaware, Or-5 egon, Virginia, and Washington to carry out activities— 6 7 (1) to eradicate or control nutria; and 8 (2) to restore nutria damaged wetland. SEC. 3. DEFINITIONS. 10 In this Act: STATE.—The 11 term "coastal Coastal 12 State" means each of the States of Delaware, Or-13 egon, Virginia, and Washington. (2) Program.—The term "program" means 14 15 the nutria eradication program established by sec-16 tion 4(a). 17 (3) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means 18 the Secretary of the Interior. 19 SEC. 4. NUTRIA ERADICATION PROGRAM. 20 (a) In General.—There is established a nutria 21 eradication program under which the Secretary may, subject to the availability of appropriations, provide financial 23 assistance to the States of Maryland and Louisiana and
- 25 (1) to eradicate or control nutria; and

the coastal States to implement measures—

1	(2) to restore wetland damaged by nutria.
2	(b) Goals.—The goals of the program shall be—
3	(1) to eradicate nutria in the State of Mary-
4	land;
5	(2) to eradicate or control nutria in the State
6	of Louisiana and the coastal States; and
7	(3) to restore wetland damaged by nutria.
8	(c) ACTIVITIES IN THE STATE OF MARYLAND.—The
9	Secretary shall require that the program carried out in
10	the State of Maryland consist of management, research,
11	and public education activities carried out in accordance
12	with the document published by the United States Fish
13	and Wildlife Service entitled "Eradication Strategies for
14	Nutria in the Chesapeake and Delaware Bay Water-
15	sheds", dated March 2002, and updated March 2009.
16	(d) Cost-Sharing Requirement.—
17	(1) Federal share.—The Federal share of
18	the total cost of the program may not exceed 75 per-
19	cent.
20	(2) In-kind contributions.—The non-Fed-
21	eral share of the total cost of the program may be
22	provided in the form of in-kind contributions of ma-
23	terials or services.
24	(e) Limitation on Administrative Expenses.—
25	Not more that 5 percent of the financial assistance pro-

vided by the Secretary under the program may be used for administrative expenses. 3 SEC. 5. REPORT. 4 Not later than 180 days after the date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary and the National Invasive Species Council shall— 6 7 (1) for purposes of the program, give consider-8 ation to— 9 (A) the 2002 report for the Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries entitled 10 11 "Nutria in Louisiana"; and 12 (B) the March 2009 update of the docu-13 ment entitled "Eradication Strategies for the 14 Nutria in the Chesapeake and Delaware Bay 15 Watersheds" and dated March 2002; 16 (2) continue, in cooperation with the State of 17 Louisiana Department of Wildlife and Fisheries and 18 the State of Maryland Department of Natural Re-19 sources, a long-term nutria control or eradication 20 program, as appropriate, with the objective to sig-21 nificantly reduce and restore the damage nutria 22 cause to coastal wetland in the States of Louisiana 23 and Maryland; and 24 (3) develop, in cooperation with the State of

Delaware Department of Natural Resources and En-

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vironmental Control, the State of Virginia Department of Game and Inland Fisheries, the State of Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife, and the
State of Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife, long-term nutria control or eradication programs, as appropriate, with the objective to significantly reduce and restore the damage nutria cause
to coastal wetland in the coastal States.

9 SEC. 6. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

- There are authorized to be appropriated to the Sec-11 retary for each of fiscal years 2010 through 2014—
- 12 (1) \$4,000,000 to provide financial assistance 13 under the program to each of the States of Mary-14 land and Louisiana; and
- 15 (2) \$1,000,000 to provide financial assistance 16 under the program to each of the coastal States.

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
