## A BILL

To require the Secretary of Commerce and the Federal Trade Commission to conduct a study on facial recognition technology, and for other purposes.

1       *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-  
2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4       This Act may be cited as the “Advancing Facial Rec-  
5 ognition Technology Act”.

6 **SEC. 2. FACIAL RECOGNITION TECHNOLOGY STUDY.**

7       (a) IN GENERAL.—

1                             (1) STUDY REQUIRED.—Not later than 2 years  
2 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Sec-  
3 retary of Commerce and the Federal Trade Commis-  
4 sion, in coordination with the head of any other ap-  
5 propriate Federal agency, shall conduct a study on  
6 the impact of facial recognition technology on United  
7 States businesses conducting interstate commerce.

8                             (2) REQUIREMENTS FOR STUDY.—In con-  
9 ducting the study, the Secretary and the Commis-  
10 sion shall do the following:

- 11                                 (A) Conduct a survey of the facial recogni-  
12 tion technology industry through outreach to  
13 participating entities to—  
14                                     (i) establish a list of the industry sec-  
15 tors that develop, promote, and use facial  
16 recognition technology;  
17                                     (ii) establish a list of public-private  
18 partnerships focused on promoting the de-  
19 velopment, adoption, and use of facial rec-  
20 gnition technology;  
21                                     (iii) provide a description of the ways  
22 entities or industry sectors develop, use, or  
23 promote the use of facial recognition tech-  
24 nology; and

(iv) provide a description of the advantages of the widespread adoption of facial recognition technology, as well as identify any concerns the use of such technology may present.

(B) Conduct a survey of the Federal activity related to facial recognition industry technology to—

(i) establish a comprehensive list of Federal agencies asserting jurisdiction over entities and industry sectors identified under this section;

(ii) identify all interagency activities related to facial recognition technology;

(iii) develop a brief description of the jurisdiction and expertise of the Federal agencies as it relates to facial recognition technology; and

(iv) identify each Federal rule, regulation, guideline, policy, and other Federal activity implemented by each Federal agency related to facial recognition technology.

(C) Conduct an international survey of other countries to establish a compendium of at least 10 and not more than 15 countries con-

1           sisting of each country's national strategy on  
2           facial recognition technology to determine where  
3           the United States ranks with respect to the de-  
4           velopment, promotion, and adoption of facial  
5           recognition technology.

6                 (D) Conduct a survey of the marketplace  
7                 and supply chain of facial recognition tech-  
8                 nology to—

9                             (i) assess the severity of risks posed  
10                          to such marketplace and supply chain;

11                             (ii) review the ability of foreign gov-  
12                          ernments or third parties to exploit such  
13                          supply chain in a manner that raises risks  
14                          to the economic and national security of  
15                          the United States; and

16                             (iii) identify emerging risks and long-  
17                          term trends in such marketplace and sup-  
18                          ply chain.

19                 (E) Identify potential concrete harms to  
20                 individuals related to the use of facial recogni-  
21                 tion technology.

22                 (F) Identify any Secretary and Commis-  
23                 sion action related to facial recognition tech-  
24                 nology.

1       (b) REPORT TO CONGRESS.—Not later than 6  
2 months after the completion of the study required pursuant  
3 to subsection (a), the Secretary and the Commission,  
4 in coordination with the head of any other appropriate  
5 Federal agency, shall submit to the Committee on Energy  
6 and Commerce of the House of Representatives and the  
7 Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation of  
8 the Senate a report that contains—

- 9                     (1) the results of the study conducted under  
10 subsection (a); and
- 11                     (2) recommendations to—  
12                         (A) address any duplicative Federal rule,  
13 regulation, guideline, policy, and other Federal  
14 activity acting as a barrier to the development  
15 and adoption of facial recognition technology;  
16                         (B) develop and implement a comprehensive  
17 plan to promote the growth of the development  
18 and adoption of facial recognition technology;  
19                         (C) develop policies that States can adopt  
20 to encourage the development and adoption of  
21 facial recognition technology;  
22                         (D) develop a national strategy to advance  
23 the position in the world of business sectors in

1           the United States on the development and  
2           adoption of facial recognition technology;

3           (E) develop strategies to mitigate current  
4           and emerging risks to the marketplace and sup-  
5           ply chain of facial recognition technology; and

6           (F) develop legislation to accomplish such  
7           recommendations.
