1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE AND FINDINGS.

2 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
3 "Preserving America's Family Farms Act".

4 (b) FINDINGS.—Congress finds that—

5 (1) family farms have a long history and tradi6 tion of providing youth with valuable work experi7 ence;

8 (2) Department of Labor regulations should not 9 adversely impact the longstanding tradition of youth 10 working on farms where they can gain valuable skills 11 and lessons on hard work, character, and leadership;

(3) the Department of Labor's proposed regulations would have curtailed opportunities for youth to
gain experiential learning and hands-on skills for enrollment in vocational agricultural training;

(4) the proposed regulations would have obstructed the opportunity for youth to find rewarding
employment and earn money for a college education
or other meaningful purposes;

(5) the proposed regulations would have limited
opportunities for young farmers wishing to pursue a
career in agriculture at a time when the average age
of farmers continues to rise; and

(6) working on a farm has become a way of life
for thousands of youth across the rural United
States.

1 SEC. 2. RULE RELATING TO CHILD LABOR.

The Secretary of Labor shall not reissue in substantially the same form, or issue a new rule that is substantially the same as, the proposed rule entitled "Child Labor
Regulations, Orders and Statements of Interpretation;
Child Labor Violations—Civil Money Penalties" (published at 76 Fed. Reg. 54836 (September 2, 2011)).
