### 117TH CONGRESS 1ST SESSION H.R.4706

## **AN ACT**

To establish the Blackwell School National Historic Site in Marfa, Texas, and for other purposes.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-

2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### 1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Blackwell School Na-3 tional Historic Site Act".

#### 4 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

5 In this Act:

6 (1) NATIONAL HISTORIC SITE.—The term "na7 tional historic site" means the Blackwell School, in
8 Marfa, Texas.

9 (2) SECRETARY.—The term "Secretary" means
10 the Secretary of the Interior.

#### 11 SEC. 3. FINDINGS.

12 Congress finds as follows:

(1) The Blackwell School, located at 501 South
Abbott Street, in Marfa, Presidio County, Texas, is
associated with the period of racial segregation in
Marfa public schools and is the sole extant property
directly associated with Hispanic education in the
community, the remaining buildings having been
torn down after the school closed in 1965.

(2) The Blackwell School is a tangible reminder
of a time when the practice of "separate but equal"
dominated education and social systems. Despite
being categorized as "white" by Texas law, Mexican
Americans were regularly excluded from commingling with Anglos at barbershops, restaurants, functional homes, theaters, churches, and schools.

(3) The spectrum of experiences of students
 and teachers at the Blackwell School constitute an
 important record of life in a segregated school in the
 context of the history of Texas and America.

5 (4) Mexican and Mexican American culture and 6 history in Marfa is tied to the Blackwell School, 7 which for more than 50 years served as a leading 8 feature of the Hispanic community, illustrating the 9 challenge of maintaining cultural identity in a domi-10 nant Anglo society. Yet today, Hispanic influences 11 are seen in Marfa's social and religious organiza-12 tions, business and government institutions, and 13 shared experiences of language, food, and music.

14 (5) The historic Blackwell School building is a 15 physical record of the longevity and beauty of the 16 distinctive design and craftsmanship informed by 17 both traditional techniques and materials, and the 18 transition from purely the vernacular to the period 19 of materials, design, and workmanship made avail-20 able after the arrival of the railroad. The original 21 historic school building and grounds on which it 22 stands provide an authentic setting to commemorate 23 and interpret the history of the Blackwell School.

24 (6) The Blackwell School is closely associated25 with the broad patterns of local, State, and national

1	history in the area of school segregation. Mexicans
2	and other members of the Latin American diaspora
3	have placed a high value upon education as a means
4	of economic, social, and political advancement.
5	(7) Mexican Americans and other members of
6	the Latin American diaspora have placed a high
7	value upon education as a means of economic, social,
8	and political advancement. However, Hispanics and
9	Latinos have not always had equitable opportunities
10	and access to quality educational facilities in the
11	United States.
12	SEC. 4. ESTABLISHMENT OF THE BLACKWELL SCHOOL NA-
13	TIONAL HISTORIC SITE.
13 14	TIONAL HISTORIC SITE. (a) Establishment.—
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14 15 16 17	<ul> <li>(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—</li> <li>(1) IN GENERAL.—Subject to paragraph (2), there is established the Blackwell School National Historic Site in the State of Texas as a unit of the</li> </ul>
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(2) CONDITIONS.—The national historic site
 shall not be established until the date on which the
 Secretary has—

4 (A) entered into a written agreement with 5 the Marfa Unified School District providing 6 that the Blackwell School shall be donated to or 7 placed by agreement into co-management with 8 the United States for inclusion in a national 9 historic site to be managed consistently with the 10 purposes of a national historic site; and

(B) acquired sufficient land or interests in
land within the boundaries of the national historic site to constitute a manageable unit.

14 (b) BOUNDARIES.—The boundaries of the national15 historic site shall be the boundaries generally depicted on16 the map.

17 (c) AVAILABILITY OF MAP.—The map shall be on file18 and available for public inspection in the appropriate of-19 fices of the National Park Service.

20 (d) ACQUISITION OF AUTHORITY.—The Secretary
21 may only acquire any land or interest in land located with22 in the boundary of the national historic site by—

- 23 (1) donation;
- 24 (2) purchase with donated funds; or
- (3) exchange.

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1	(e) Administration.—
2	(1) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary shall admin-
3	ister this national historic site in accordance with—
4	(A) this Act; and
5	(B) the laws generally applicable to units
6	of the National Park System.
7	(2) MANAGEMENT PLAN.—
8	(A) Not later than 3 years after the date
9	on which funds are first made available to the
10	Secretary for this purpose, the Secretary shall
11	prepare a general management plan for the na-
12	tional historic site in accordance with section
13	100502 of title 54, United States Code.
14	(B) Upon completion, the Secretary shall
15	submit the general management plan prepared
16	pursuant to subparagraph (A) to the Com-
17	mittee on Natural Resources of the House of
18	Representatives and the Committee on Energy
19	and Natural Resources of the Senate.
20	(f) COOPERATIVE AGREEMENTS.—The Secretary
21	shall enter into cooperative agreements with the Blackwell
22	School Alliance (and other local, regional, State, academic
23	and nonprofit partners) for interpretive and educational

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(g) WRITTEN CONSENT OF OWNER.—No private
 property or non-Federal public property shall be included
 within the boundaries of the national historic site or man aged as part of the national historic site without the writ ten consent of the owner of such property.
