AN ACT

- To authorize the Secretary of Homeland Security to work with cybersecurity consortia for training, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "National Cybersecurity3 Preparedness Consortium Act of 2016".

4 SEC. 2. NATIONAL CYBERSECURITY PREPAREDNESS CON-5 SORTIUM.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-7 rity may work with a consortium, including the National 8 Cybersecurity Preparedness Consortium, to support ef-9 forts to address cybersecurity risks and incidents (as such 10 terms are defined in section 227 of the Homeland Security 11 Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 148)), including threats of ter-12 rorism and acts of terrorism.

(b) ASSISTANCE TO THE NCCIC.—The Secretary of
Homeland Security may work with a consortium to assist
the national cybersecurity and communications integration
center of the Department of Homeland Security (established pursuant to section 227 of the Homeland Security
Act of 2002) to—

(1) provide training to State and local first responders and officials specifically for preparing for
and responding to cybersecurity risks and incidents,
including threats of terrorism and acts of terrorism,
in accordance with current law;

(2) develop and update a curriculum utilizing
existing programs and models in accordance with
such section 227, for State and local first responders

and officials, related to cybersecurity risks and inci dents, including threats of terrorism and acts of ter rorism;

4 (3) provide technical assistance services to build
5 and sustain capabilities in support of preparedness
6 for and response to cybersecurity risks and inci7 dents, including threats of terrorism and acts of ter8 rorism, in accordance with such section 227;

9 (4) conduct cross-sector cybersecurity training 10 and simulation exercises for entities, including State 11 and local governments, critical infrastructure owners 12 and operators, and private industry, to encourage 13 community-wide coordination in defending against 14 and responding to cybersecurity risks and incidents, 15 including threats of terrorism and acts of terrorism, 16 in accordance with subsection (c) of section 228 of 17 the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 149);

(5) help States and communities develop cybersecurity information sharing programs, in accordance with section 227 of the Homeland Security Act
of 2002, for the dissemination of homeland security
information related to cybersecurity risks and incidents, including threats of terrorism and acts of terrorism; and

(6) help incorporate cybersecurity risk and inci dent prevention and response (including related to
 threats of terrorism and acts of terrorism) into ex isting State and local emergency plans, including
 continuity of operations plans.

6 (c) PROHIBITION ON DUPLICATION.—In carrying out 7 the functions under subsection (b), the Secretary of 8 Homeland Security shall, to the greatest extent prac-9 ticable, seek to prevent unnecessary duplication of existing 10 programs or efforts of the Department of Homeland Secu-11 rity.

(d) CONSIDERATIONS REGARDING SELECTION OF A
13 CONSORTIUM.—In selecting a consortium with which to
14 work under this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Security
15 shall take into consideration the following:

16 (1) Any prior experience conducting cybersecu17 rity training and exercises for State and local enti18 ties.

19 (2) Geographic diversity of the members of any
20 such consortium so as to cover different regions
21 across the United States.

(e) METRICS.—If the Secretary of Homeland Security works with a consortium pursuant to subsection (a),
the Secretary shall measure the effectiveness of the activities undertaken by such consortium under this Act.

1 (f) OUTREACH.—The Secretary of Homeland Secu-2 rity shall conduct outreach to universities and colleges, in-3 cluding historically Black colleges and universities, His-4 panic-serving institutions, Tribal Colleges and Univer-5 sities, and other minority-serving institutions, regarding opportunities to support efforts to address cybersecurity 6 7 risks and incidents, including threats of terrorism and acts 8 of terrorism, by working with the Secretary pursuant to 9 subsection (a).

(g) TERMINATION.—The authority to carry out this
Act shall terminate on the date that is 5 years after the
date of the enactment of this Act.

(h) CONSORTIUM DEFINED.—In this Act, the term
"consortium" means a group primarily composed of nonprofit entities, including academic institutions, that develop, update, and deliver cybersecurity training in support of homeland security.
