AN ACT

To require the Secretary of Homeland Security to conduct a maritime border threat analysis, and for other purposes.

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2	This Act may be cited as the "Maritime Border Secu-
3	rity Review Act".

4 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.

5 In this Act:

6 (1) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMIT-TEES.—The term "appropriate congressional com-7 8 mittees" means-9 (A) the Committee on Homeland Security 10 of the House of Representatives; 11 (B) the Committee on Transportation and 12 Infrastructure of the House of Representatives; 13 (C) the Committee on Homeland Security 14 and Government Affairs of the Senate; and 15 (D) the Committee on Commerce, Science, 16 and Transportation of the Senate. (2) MARITIME BORDER.—The term "maritime 17 border" means-18 19 (A) the transit zone; and 20 (B) the borders and territorial waters of 21 Puerto Rico and the United States Virgin Is-22 lands. (3) TRANSIT ZONE.—The term "transit zone" 23 24 has the meaning given such term in section 25 1092(a)(8) of the National Defense Authorization 26 Act for Fiscal Year 2017 (6 U.S.C. 223(a)(8)). •HR 5869 EH

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2	(a) IN GENERAL.—Not later than 180 days after the
3	date of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland
4	Security shall submit to the appropriate congressional
5	committees a maritime border threat analysis that in-
6	cludes an identification and description of the following:
7	(1) Current and potential terrorism and crimi-
8	nal threats posed by individuals and groups seeking
9	to—
10	(A) enter the United States through the
11	maritime border; or
12	(B) exploit border vulnerabilities on the
13	maritime border.
14	(2) Improvements needed at United States sea
15	ports to—
16	(A) prevent terrorists and instruments of
17	terror from entering the United States; and
18	(B) reduce criminal activity, as measured
19	by the total flow of illegal goods and illicit
20	drugs, related to the maritime border.
21	(3) Improvements needed with respect to the
22	maritime border to—
23	(A) prevent terrorists and instruments of
24	terror from entering the United States; and
25	(B) reduce criminal activity related to the
26	maritime border.

1 SEC. 3. MARITIME BORDER THREAT ANALYSIS.

1 (4) Vulnerabilities in law, policy, cooperation 2 between State, territorial, and local law enforcement, 3 or international agreements that hinder effective and 4 efficient border security, counterterrorism, antihuman trafficking efforts, and the flow of legitimate 5 6 trade with respect to the maritime border. 7 (5) Metrics and performance parameters used 8 by the Department of Homeland Security to evalu-9 ate maritime security effectiveness, as appropriate. 10 (b) ANALYSIS REQUIREMENTS.—In preparing the threat analysis required under subsection (a), the Sec-11 retary of Homeland Security shall consider and examine 12 the following: 13 14 (1) Technology needs and challenges. 15 (2) Personnel needs and challenges. 16 (3) The role of State, territorial, and local law 17 enforcement in general border security activities. 18 (4) The need for cooperation among Federal, 19 State, territorial, local, and appropriate international 20 law enforcement entities relating to border security. 21 (5) The geographic challenges of the maritime 22 border. 23 (6) The impact and consequences of Hurricanes 24 Harvey, Irma, Maria, and Nate on general border

security activities with respect to the maritime bor der.

3 (c) CLASSIFIED THREAT ANALYSIS.—To the extent 4 possible, the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit 5 the threat analysis required under subsection (a) in un-6 classified form. The Secretary may submit a portion of 7 the threat analysis in classified form if the Secretary de-8 termines that such form is appropriate for such portion.
