- To amend the Homeland Security Act of 2002 to establish the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, and for other purposes.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

1 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

2 This Act may be cited as the "Countering Weapons3 of Mass Destruction Act of 2018".

4 SEC. 2. COUNTERING WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUCTION 5 OFFICE.

6 (a) IN GENERAL.—Title XIX of the Homeland Secu7 rity Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 591 et seq.) is amended—

8 (1) in the title heading, by striking "**DOMES**-

9 **TIC NUCLEAR DETECTION OFFICE**" and 10 inserting "**COUNTERING WEAPONS OF**

11 MASS DESTRUCTION OFFICE";

(2) by striking section 1901 and inserting thefollowing:

14 **"SEC. 1900. DEFINITIONS.**

15 "In this title:

"(1) ASSISTANT SECRETARY.—The term 'Assistant Secretary' means the Assistant Secretary for
the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office.
"(2) INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY.—The term
"intelligence community' has the meaning given such
term in section 3(4) of the National Security Act of
1947 (50 U.S.C. 3003(4)).

23 "(3) OFFICE.—The term 'Office' means the
24 Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office es25 tablished under section 1901(a).

"(4) WEAPON OF MASS DESTRUCTION.—The 1 2 term 'weapon of mass destruction' has the meaning given the term in section 101 of the Foreign Intel-3 ligence Surveillance Act of 1978 (50 U.S.C. 1801). 4 "Subtitle A—Countering Weapons 5 of Mass Destruction Office 6 7 "SEC. 1901. COUNTERING WEAPONS OF MASS DESTRUC-8 TION OFFICE. 9 "(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—There is established in the

10 Department a Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction
11 Office.

12 "(b) ASSISTANT SECRETARY.—The Office shall be
13 headed by an Assistant Secretary for the Countering
14 Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, who shall be ap15 pointed by the President.

16 "(c) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Assistant Secretary
17 shall serve as the Secretary's principal advisor on—

18 "(1) weapons of mass destruction matters and19 strategies; and

20 "(2) coordinating efforts to counter weapons of21 mass destruction.

"(d) DETAILS.—The Secretary may request that the
Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of Energy, the Secretary of State, the Attorney General, the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, and the directors of other Federal

agencies, including elements of the intelligence commu nity, provide for the reimbursable detail of personnel with
 relevant expertise to the Office.";

4 (3) by adding at the end the following:

5 "Subtitle B—Mission of the Office

6 "SEC. 1921. MISSION OF THE OFFICE.

7 "The Office shall be responsible for coordinating with 8 other Federal efforts and developing departmental strat-9 egy and policy to plan for, detect, and protect against the 10 importation, possession, storage, transportation, development, or use of unauthorized chemical, biological, radio-11 logical, or nuclear materials, devices, or agents in the 12 13 United States and to protect against an attack using such materials, devices, or agents against the people, territory, 14 15 or interests of the United States.

16 "SEC. 1922. RELATIONSHIP TO OTHER DEPARTMENT ENTI-

17 TIES AND FEDERAL AGENCIES.

18 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The authority of the Assistant Secretary under this title shall neither affect nor diminish 19 the authority or the responsibility of any officer of the De-2021 partment or of any officer of any other department or 22 agency of the United States with respect to the command, 23 control, or direction of the functions, personnel, funds, as-24 sets, and liabilities of any entity within the Department 25 or any Federal department or agency.

"(b) FEDERAL EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGEN-1 2 CY.—Nothing in this title or any other provision of law 3 may be construed to affect or reduce the responsibilities 4 of the Federal Emergency Management Agency or the Ad-5 ministrator of the Agency, including the diversion of any asset, function, or mission of the Agency or the Adminis-6 7 trator of the Agency."; 8 (4) by striking section 1905; 9 (5) by redesignating sections 1902, 1903, 1904, 10 1906, and 1907 as sections 1923, 1924, 1925, 1926, 11 and 1927, respectively, and transferring such sec-12 tions to appear after section 1922, as added by 13 paragraph (3); 14 (6) in section 1923, as so redesignated— 15 (A) in the section heading by striking "MISSION OF OFFICE" and inserting "RE-16 **SPONSIBILITIES**"; and 17 18 (B) in subsection (a)(11), by striking "Domestic Nuclear Detection Office" and inserting 19 20 "Office"; 21 (7) in section 1925, as so redesignated, in sub-22 section (a), in the first sentence, by striking "section 23 1902" and inserting "section 1923"; 24 (8) in section 1926, as so redesignated—

15	the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office" and in-
16	serting "Assistant Secretary"; and
17	(B) in subsection (c), by striking "section
18	1902" and inserting "section 1923"; and
19	(10) by inserting after section 1927, as so re-
20	designated, the following new section:
21	"SEC. 1928. SECURING THE CITIES PROGRAM.
22	"(a) ESTABLISHMENT.—The Secretary, through the
23	Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weapons of Mass
24	Destruction Office, shall establish the 'Securing the Cities'
25	('STC') program to enhance the ability of the United

States to detect and prevent terrorist attacks and other
 high consequence events utilizing nuclear or other radio logical materials that pose a high risk to homeland secu rity in high-risk urban areas. Through the STC program
 the Secretary shall—

6 "(1) assist State, local, Tribal, and territorial 7 governments in designing and implementing, or en-8 hancing existing, architectures for coordinated and 9 integrated detection and interdiction of nuclear or 10 other radiological materials that are out of regu-11 latory control;

"(2) support the development of a region-wide
operating capability to detect and report on nuclear
and other radioactive materials out of regulatory
control;

"(3) provide resources to enhance detection,
analysis, communication, and coordination to better
integrate into Federal operations State, local, Tribal,
and territorial assets;

"(4) facilitate alarm adjudication and provide
subject matter expertise and technical assistance on
concepts of operations, training, exercises, and alarm
response protocols;

24 "(5) communicate with, and promote sharing of25 information about the presence or detection of nu-

clear or other radiological materials among appro priate Federal, State, local, Tribal, and territorial
 governments, in a manner that ensures transparency
 with the jurisdictions served by such program;

5 "(6) provide augmenting resources, as appro6 priate, to enable State, local, Tribal, and territorial
7 governments to sustain and refresh their capabilities
8 developed under the STC program; and

9 "(7) provide any other assistance the Secretary
10 determines appropriate.

"(b) DESIGNATION OF JURISDICTIONS.—In carrying
out the STC program under subsection (a), the Secretary
shall designate jurisdictions from among high-risk urban
areas under section 2003, and other cities and regions,
as appropriate.

16 CONGRESSIONAL NOTIFICATION.—The "(e) Secretary shall notify the Committee on Homeland Security 17 and the Committee on Appropriations of the House of 18 Representatives and the Committee on Homeland Security 19 20 and Governmental Affairs and the Committee on Appro-21 priations of the Senate not later than 3 days before the 22 designation of a new jurisdiction in accordance with sub-23 section (b) or any other change to participating jurisdictions.". 24

25 (b) References and Construction.—

1	(1) IN GENERAL.—Any reference in any law,
2	regulation, document, paper, or other record of the
3	United States to—
4	(A) the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office
5	shall be deemed to be a reference to the Coun-
6	tering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office; and
7	(B) the Director for Domestic Nuclear De-
8	tection shall be deemed to be a reference to the
9	Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weap-
10	ons of Mass Destruction Office.
11	(2) CONSTRUCTION.—Sections 1923 through
12	1927 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002, as so
13	redesignated by subsection (a), shall be construed to
14	cover the chemical and biological responsibilities of
15	the Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weapons
16	of Mass Destruction Office.
17	(3) AUTHORITY.—The authority of the Director
18	of the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office to make
19	grants or enter into cooperative agreements is trans-
20	ferred to the Assistant Secretary for the Countering
21	Weapons of Mass Destruction Office, and such au-
22	thority shall be construed to include grants for all
23	purposes of title XIX of the Homeland Security Act
24	of 2002, as amended by this Act.
25	(c) CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER.—

(1) REPEAL.—Title V of the Homeland Secu rity Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 311 et seq.) is amended
 by striking section 516.

4 (2) AMENDMENT.—Title XIX of the Homeland
5 Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 591 et seq.), as
6 amended by subsection (a), is further amended by
7 adding at the end the following:

8 "Subtitle C—Chief Medical Officer 9 "SEC. 1931. CHIEF MEDICAL OFFICER.

"(a) IN GENERAL.—There is in the Office a Chief
Medical Officer, who shall be appointed by the President.
The Chief Medical Officer shall report to the Assistant
Secretary.

"(b) QUALIFICATIONS.—The individual appointed as
Chief Medical Officer shall be a licensed physician possessing a demonstrated ability in and knowledge of medicine and public health.

18 "(c) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Chief Medical Officer
19 shall have the responsibility within the Department for
20 medical issues related to natural disasters, acts of ter21 rorism, and other man-made disasters, including—

"(1) serving as the principal advisor on medical
and public health issues to the Secretary, the Administrator of the Federal Emergency Management

1	Agency, the Assistant Secretary, and other Depart-
2	ment officials;
3	((2)) providing operational medical support to
4	all components of the Department;
5	"(3) as appropriate, providing medical liaisons
6	to the components of the Department, on a reim-
7	bursable basis, to provide subject matter expertise
8	on operational medical issues;
9	"(4) coordinating with Federal, State, local,
10	and Tribal governments, the medical community,
11	and others within and outside the Department, in-
12	cluding the Centers for Disease Control and Preven-
13	tion and the Office of the Assistant Secretary for
14	Preparedness and Response of the Department of
15	Health and Human Services, with respect to medical
16	and public health matters; and
17	"(5) performing such other duties relating to
18	such responsibilities as the Secretary may require.".
19	(3) CLERICAL AMENDMENT.—The table of con-
20	tents in section 1(b) of the Homeland Security Act
21	of 2002 is amended by striking the item relating to
22	section 516.
23	(d) Workforce Health and Medical Sup-
24	PORT.—Title VII of the Homeland Security Act of 2002

1 (6 U.S.C. 341 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end2 the following new section:

3 "SEC. 710. WORKFORCE HEALTH AND MEDICAL SUPPORT.

4 "(a) IN GENERAL.—The Under Secretary for Man5 agement shall be responsible for workforce-focused health
6 and medical activities of the Department. The Under Sec7 retary for Management may further delegate these respon8 sibilities, as appropriate.

9 "(b) RESPONSIBILITIES.—The Under Secretary for
10 Management, in coordination with the Chief Medical Offi11 cer, shall—

"(1) provide oversight and coordinate the medical and health activities of the Department for the
human and animal personnel of the Department;

"(2) establish medical, health, veterinary, and
occupational health exposure policy, guidance, strategies, and initiatives for the human and animal personnel of the Department;

"(3) as deemed appropriate by the Under Secretary, provide medical liaisons to the components of
the Department, on a reimbursable basis, to provide
subject matter expertise on occupational medical and
public health issues;

24 "(4) serve as the primary representative for the25 Department on agreements regarding the detail of

1	Commissioned Corps officers of the Public Health
2	Service of the Department of Health and Human
3	Services to the Department, except that components
4	and offices of the Department shall retain authority
5	for funding, determination of specific duties, and su-
6	pervision of such detailed Commissioned Corps offi-
7	cers; and
8	"(5) perform such other duties relating to such
9	responsibilities as the Secretary may require.".
10	(e) Transfers; Abolishment.—
11	(1) TRANSFERS.—The Secretary of Homeland
12	Security shall transfer to—
13	(A) the Countering Weapons of Mass De-
14	struction Office all functions, personnel, budget
15	authority, and assets of—
16	(i) the Domestic Nuclear Detection
17	Office, as in existence on the day before
18	the date of the enactment of this Act; and
19	(ii) the Office of Health Affairs, as in
20	existence on the day before the date of the
21	enactment of this Act, except for the func-
22	tions, personnel, budget authority, and as-
23	sets of such office necessary to perform the
24	functions specified in section 710 of the
25	Homeland Security Act of 2002 (relating

1	to workforce health and medical support),
2	as added by this Act; and
3	(B) the Directorate of Management of the
4	Department of Homeland Security all functions,
5	personnel, budget authority, and assets of the
6	Office of Health Affairs, as in existence on the
7	day before the date of the enactment of this
8	Act, that are necessary to perform the functions
9	of such section 710.
10	(2) Abolishment.—Upon completion of all
11	transfers pursuant to paragraph (1)—
12	(A) the Domestic Nuclear Detection Office
13	of the Department of Homeland Security and
14	the Office of Health Affairs of the Department
15	of Homeland Security are abolished; and
16	(B) the positions of Assistant Secretary for
17	Health Affairs and Director for Domestic Nu-
18	clear Detection are abolished.
19	(f) Conforming Amendments.—
20	(1) OTHER OFFICERS.—Paragraph (4) of sec-
21	tion 103(d) of the Homeland Security Act of 2002
22	(6 U.S.C. 113(d)) is amended by striking "A Direc-
23	tor for Domestic Nuclear Detection" and inserting
24	"An Assistant Secretary for the Countering Weap-
25	ons of Mass Destruction Office".

13	(4) Functions transferred.—Section

22	(5) Coordination of department of home-
23	LAND SECURITY EFFORTS RELATED TO FOOD, AGRI-
24	CULTURE, AND VETERINARY DEFENSE AGAINST
25	TERRORISM.—Section 528(a) of the Homeland Secu-

rity Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 321q(a)) is amended by
 striking "Health Affairs," and inserting "the Coun tering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office,".

(g) DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY CHEM-4 ICAL, BIOLOGICAL, RADIOLOGICAL, AND NUCLEAR AC-5 TIVITIES.—Not later than 1 year after the date of enact-6 7 ment of this Act and once every year thereafter, the Sec-8 retary of Homeland Security shall provide a briefing and 9 report to the appropriate congressional committees (as defined in section 2 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 10 11 (6 U.S.C. 101) on—

(1) the organization and management of the
chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear activities of the Department of Homeland Security, including research and development activities, and the
location of each activity under the organizational
structure of the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction Office;

(2) a comprehensive inventory of chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear activities, including
research and development activities, of the Department of Homeland Security, highlighting areas of
collaboration between components, coordination with
other agencies, and the effectiveness and accomplishments of consolidated chemical, biological, radio-

logical, and nuclear activities of the Department of
 Homeland Security, including research and develop ment activities;

4 (3) information relating to how the organiza5 tional structure of the Countering Weapons of Mass
6 Destruction Office will enhance the development of
7 chemical, biological, radiological, and nuclear prior8 ities and capabilities across the Department of
9 Homeland Security;

10 (4) a discussion of any resulting cost savings
11 and efficiencies gained through activities described
12 in paragraphs (1) and (2);

(5) information on how the Assistant Secretary
for the Countering Weapons of Mass Destruction
Office is coordinating with the Under Secretary of
Science and Technology of the Department of
Homeland Security on research and development activities; and

(6) recommendations for any necessary statutory changes, or, if no statutory changes are necessary, an explanation of why no statutory or organizational changes are necessary.
