1 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

2 This Act may be cited as the "Button Cell Battery" 3 Safety Act of 2011".

SEC. 2. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY STANDARDS FOR 4 5 **BUTTON CELL BATTERY ACCESS.**

6 (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

7 (1) BATTERY-OPERATED OR ASSISTED CON-SUMER PRODUCT.—The term "battery-operated or 8 assisted consumer product" means a remote control, 9 10 clock, musical greeting card, automobile key, flash-11 light, novelty, or other consumer product powered in 12 whole or in part by a button cell battery and that 13 is designed, manufactured, and sold primarily for 14 use by consumers in or around their homes or motor 15 vehicles.

16 (2) BUTTON CELL BATTERY.—The term "button cell battery" means— 17

18 (A) a cell battery that is 32 millimeters or 19 less in diameter and less than its diameter in 20 length; or

(B) any other battery, regardless of the 21 22 technology used to produce an electrical charge, 23 as determined by the Consumer Product Safety 24 Commission to pose an ingestion hazard.

25 (3) CONSUMER PRODUCT.—The term "con-26 sumer product" has the meaning given the term in •S 1165 IS

section 3 of the Consumer Product Safety Act (15
 U.S.C. 2052).

3 (b) STANDARDS REQUIRED.—Not later than 1 year
4 after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Consumer
5 Product Safety Commission shall promulgate, as a final
6 consumer product safety standard under section 7(a) of
7 the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2056(a))—

8 (1) a standard requiring button cell battery 9 compartments of battery-operated or assisted con-10 sumer products to be secured, to the greatest extent 11 practicable, in a manner that reduces access to but-12 ton cell batteries by children that are 3 years of age 13 or younger; and

14 (2) standards requiring warning labels—

15 (A) to be included in any literature that
16 accompanies a battery-operated or assisted con17 sumer product, such as a user manual;

(B) to be included on packaging for buttoncell batteries sold to consumers; and

20 (C) to be included, as practicable, directly
21 on a battery-operated or assisted consumer
22 product in a manner that is visible to the con23 sumer upon installation or replacement of the
24 button cell battery.

(c) WARNING LABELS.—Warning labels required
 under subsection (b) shall—

3 (1) clearly identify the hazard of ingestion; and
4 (2) instruct consumers, as practicable, to keep
5 new and used batteries out of the reach of children
6 and to seek immediate medical attention if a battery
7 is ingested.

8 (d) EXPEDITED RULEMAKING.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—The standards required by
10 subsection (b) shall be promulgated in accordance
11 with section 553 of title 5, United States Code.

(2) INAPPLICABILITY OF CERTAIN PROMULGATION REQUIREMENTS.—The requirements of subsections (a) through (f) and (g)(1) of section 9 of
the Consumer Product Safety Act (15 U.S.C. 2058)
shall not apply to the promulgation of the standards
required by subsection (b) of this section.

(e) EFFECTIVE DATE.—Each final consumer product
safety standard required by subsection (b) shall apply to
battery-operated or assisted consumer products manufactured on or after the date that is 1 year after the date
on which the Commission promulgates the standard.

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
