To help middle class families succeed.

1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE. 3 4 This Act may be cited as the "Middle Class Success 5 Act". SEC. 2. SENSE OF THE SENATE. 7 It is the sense of the Senate that Congress should— 8 (1) support middle class tax relief; 9 (2) help families afford the cost of college and

improve opportunities for a secure retirement;

1	(3) invest in infrastructure and other measures
2	to create good, well-paying jobs;
3	(4) help ensure that families have access to af-
4	fordable child and elder care;
5	(5) preserve and improve affordable health care;
6	(6) ensure that all workers earn enough to meet
7	basic living standards and do not live in poverty;
8	(7) ensure that tax dollars do not support com-
9	panies that break the law or mistreat their workers;
10	(8) keep Social Security's promise and block
11	proposals to privatize the program;
12	(9) ensure that families have access to a
13	healthy and clean environment, including access to
14	safe drinking water;
15	(10) ensure that workers can secure representa-
16	tion without employer obstruction;
17	(11) ensure that our streets and communities
18	are safe; and
19	(12) address the serious housing problems fac-
20	ing many American families.
