Mr. CASSIDY introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs

A BILL

To require the Secretary of Homeland Security to examine the actions the Department of Homeland Security is undertaking to combat the threat of vehicular terrorism, and for other purposes.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 This Act may be cited as the “Vehicular Terrorism
5 Prevention Act of 2017”.

6 **SEC. 2. REPORT ON VEHICULAR TERRORISM.**

7 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term “vehic-
8 ular terrorism” means an action that uses automotive

1 transportation to inflict violence and intimidation on indi-
2 viduals for a political purpose.

3 (b) REPORT.—Not later than 6 months after the date
4 of enactment of this Act, the Secretary of Homeland Secu-
5 rity shall—

6 (1) examine the actions the Department of
7 Homeland Security is undertaking to combat the
8 threat of vehicular terrorism; and

9 (2) submit to the Committee on Homeland Se-
10 curity and Governmental Affairs of the Senate and
11 the Committee on Homeland Security of the House
12 of Representatives a report that contains informa-
13 tion relating to the findings and recommendations
14 resulting from that examination.

15 (c) CONTENTS.—The report required under sub-
16 section (b) shall outline—

17 (1) an examination of the current threat level
18 for vehicular terrorism;

19 (2) an examination of the actions the Depart-
20 ment of Homeland Security is undertaking to guard
21 against vehicular terrorism;

22 (3) an examination of how the threat of vehic-
23 ular terrorism may be mitigated;

24 (4) an examination of the extent to which the
25 Department of Homeland Security is doing outreach

1 or training with private sector partners in response
2 to threats of vehicular terrorism; and

3 (5) an examination of actions Congress can
4 take to help the Department of Homeland Security
5 mitigate the threat of vehicular terrorism.

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
