AN ACT

To establish the Northern Border Coordination Center, and for other purposes.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 2 This Act may be cited as the "Northern Border Co-
- 3 ordination Act".
- 4 SEC. 2. DEFINITIONS.
- 5 In this Act:
- 6 (1) CENTER.—The term "Center" means the
- 7 Northern Border Coordination Center established
- 8 pursuant to section 3.
- 9 (2) Department.—The term "Department"
- means the Department of Homeland Security.
- 11 (3) NORTHERN BORDER.—The term "northern
- border' means—
- (A) the international border between the
- 14 United States and Canada; and
- 15 (B) the maritime border between Alaska
- and the Russian Federation.
- 17 (4) Secretary.—The term "Secretary" means
- the Secretary of Homeland Security.
- 19 SEC. 3. NORTHERN BORDER COORDINATION CENTER.
- 20 (a) Establishment.—Not later than 1 year after
- 21 the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall
- 22 establish the Northern Border Coordination Center.
- (b) Purpose.—The purpose of the Center shall be
- 24 to serve as the Department's forward deployed centralized
- 25 coordination center for operations, domain awareness, in-
- 26 formation sharing, intelligence, training, and stakeholder

1	engagement with Federal, State, tribal, local, and inter-					
2	national government partners along the northern border					
3	of the United States. The Center shall be placed along					
4	the northern border at a location that is collocated with					
5	an existing U.S. Border Patrol sector headquarters, an Ai					
6	and Marine Operations branch, and a United States Coas					
7	Guard air station, and other existing Department activi					
8	ties.					
9	(c) Components.—					
10	(1) In General.—The Center shall collocate					
11	personnel and activities of—					
12	(A) U.S. Customs and Border Protection					
13	including U.S. Border Patrol and Air and Ma-					
14	rine Operations;					
15	(B) the United States Coast Guard;					
16	(C) U.S. Immigration and Customs En-					
17	forcement's Homeland Security Investigations;					
18	(D) other components and offices of the					
19	Department that the Secretary determines to be					
20	necessary, including to support the training					
21	technology testing, and development described					
22	in subsection (d); and					
23	(E) additional Federal, State, tribal, local					
24	and international government partners, as the					
25	Secretary determines to be necessary and ap-					

1	propriate to support the coordination of oper-					
2	ations described in this Act.					
3	(d) Functions.—The Center shall perform the func-					
4	tions described in this subsection in addition to any other					
5	functions assigned by the Secretary.					
6	(1) NORTHERN BORDER STRATEGY.—The Cen-					
7	ter, in collaboration with relevant offices and compo					
8	nents of the Department, shall—					
9	(A) serve as a coordination mechanism for					
10	operational components for the implementation,					
11	evaluation, and updating of the Northern Bor					
12	der Strategy and any successor strategy; and					
13	(B) support the development of best prac-					
14	tices and policies for personnel at the northern					
15	border to support such implementation.					
16	(2) Training.—The Center shall serve as a					
17	training location to support the delivery of training					
18	or exercises for Department personnel and Federal,					
19	State, tribal, local, and international government					
20	partners.					
21	(3) Metrics.—The Center, in collaboration					
22	with relevant offices and components of the Depart-					
23	ment, shall coordinate the development and tracking					
24	of border security metrics for the northern border.					

1	(4) RESOURCE AND TECHNOLOGICAL NEEDS						
2	AND CHALLENGES.—The Center, in collaboration						
3	with relevant offices and components of the Depart-						
4	ment, shall—						
5	(A) identify resource and technological						
6	needs or challenges affecting security along the						
7	northern border; and						
8	(B) serve as a testing ground and dem-						
9	onstration location for the testing of border se-						
10	curity technology, including determining such						
11	technology's suitability and performance in the						
12	northern border and maritime environments.						
13	(5) Air and marine operations.—						
14	(A) QUICK REACTION CAPABILITIES.—In						
15	support of the Center, U.S. Customs and Bor-						
16	der Protection's Air and Marine Operations—						
17	(i) shall establish and maintain capa-						
18	bility that is collocated with the Center						
19	and available for quick deployment in sup-						
20	port of the northern border missions, U.S.						
21	Customs and Border Protection, and the						
22	Department, including missions in the						
23	Great Lakes region; and						
24	(ii) in coordination with the Center						
25	and relevant offices and components of the						

1	Department, shall evaluate requirements					
2	and make recommendations to support the					
3	operations of large unmanned aircraft sys					
4	tems based at the Center.					
5	(B) Northern Border domain aware					
6	NESS.—In order to coordinate with the Cente					
7	and support its operations, the Air and Marin					
8	Operations Center shall collocate personnel and					
9	resources with the Center to enhance the De					
10	partment's capabilities to—					
11	(i) support air and maritime domain					
12	awareness and information sharing efforts					
13	along the northern border;					
14	(ii) provide dedicated monitoring of					
15	northern border systems; and					
16	(iii) lead, in coordination with other					
17	U.S. Customs and Border Protection com-					
18	ponents, Federal, State, tribal, local, and					
19	international governments, and private sec-					
20	tor partners, the Center's efforts to track					
21	and monitor legitimate cross-border traffic					
22	involving unmanned aircraft and un-					
23	manned aircraft systems.					
24	(6) Counter-unmanned aircraft sys-					
25	TEMS —					

- (A) In general.—Pursuant to policies es-tablished by the Secretary, consistent with sec-tion 210G of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6 U.S.C. 124n), the Center shall support counter-unmanned aircraft systems operations along the northern border to respond to the in-creased use of unmanned aircraft systems. Such support may involve development, testing, and evaluation of technologies.
 - (B) Rule of construction.—Nothing in this Act may be construed to provide additional authority related to detection, mitigation, research, development, or testing of unmanned aircraft systems or counter-unmanned aircraft systems.
 - (7) PRIVACY AND CIVIL RIGHTS.—The Center, in collaboration with the Chief Privacy Officer and the Office for Civil Rights and Civil Liberties of the Department, shall ensure that operations and practices of the Center comply with the privacy and civil rights policies of the Department and its components.
 - (8) Noncontiguous Northern Border.—
 The Center, in collaboration with relevant offices
 and components of the Department, shall—

- 1 (A) identify the specific challenges that
 2 exist along the noncontiguous international land
 3 border with Canada and the maritime border
 4 with Russia, including resource, technological
 5 challenges, and domain awareness;
 - (B) ensure that dedicated personnel, including reachback support, are working to evaluate and address the challenges identified pursuant to subparagraph (A); and
 - (C) determine the feasibility of establishing a satellite facility of the Center to address the specific challenges identified pursuant to subparagraph (A).
- 14 (e) Annual Reporting.—Not later than 180 days 15 after the establishment of the Center, and annually thereafter, the Secretary shall submit a report to the Com-16 mittee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs 18 of the Senate, the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate, the Committee on Commerce, Science, and Trans-19 portation of the Senate, the Committee on Homeland Se-21 curity of the House of Representatives, the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives, and the 23 Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the House of Representatives that describes the activities of

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1	the Center during the most recently concluded fiscal year,
2	including—
3	(1) personnel levels;
4	(2) additional resources that are needed to sup-
5	port the operations of the Center and northern bor-
6	der operations of the Department; and
7	(3) any additional assets or authorities that are
8	needed to increase security and domain awareness
9	along the northern border.
10	(f) Temporary Duty Assignments.—The Sec-
11	retary shall submit a quarterly report to the Committee
12	on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs of the
13	Senate, the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Sen-
14	ate, the Committee on Homeland Security of the House
15	of Representatives, and the Committee on Foreign Affairs
16	of the House of Representatives regarding temporary duty
17	assignments of U.S. Border Patrol agents during the re-
18	porting period, including—
19	(1) the number of agents on temporary duty as-
20	signment;
21	(2) the duration of the temporary duty assign-
22	ment; and
23	(3) the sectors from which the agents were as-
24	signed.

- 1 (g) Rule of Construction.—The Center estab-
- 2 lished pursuant to subsection (a) shall be established sepa-
- 3 rate and distinct from the Secretary's authorities under
- 4 section 708 of the Homeland Security Act of 2002 (6
- 5 U.S.C. 348).
- 6 (h) Sunset.—This Act shall cease to be effective on
- 7 the date that is 7 years after the date of the enactment
- 8 of this Act.
