Ms. AYOTTE introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations

A BILL

To express the sense of the Senate that the Secretary of State should use his existing authority to revoke the passports of United States citizens who have provided material support to ISIS and to require the Secretary to submit a quarterly report to Congress on the use of such authority.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SENSE OF THE SENATE.**

4 It is the sense of the Senate that the Secretary of
5 State—

1 (1) is authorized to revoke the passport of any
2 United States citizen whose activities abroad are
3 likely to cause serious damage to United States na-
4 tional security or foreign policy; and

5 (2) should use the authority described in para-
6 graph (1)—

7 (A) to revoke the passports of United
8 States citizens who are fighting with, or other-
9 wise providing material support to, the Islamic
10 State of Iraq and al-Sham; and

11 (B) to prevent such individuals from re-
12 turning to the United States to plan, coordi-
13 nate, or carry out a terrorist attack.

14 **SEC. 2. QUARTERLY REPORTS.**

15 The Secretary of State shall submit a quarterly re-
16 port, in classified and unclassified form, on the use of the
17 authority described in section 1 to—

18 (1) the Committee on Armed Services of the
19 Senate;

20 (2) the Committee on Foreign Relations of the
21 Senate;

22 (3) the Committee on Homeland Security and
23 Governmental Affairs of the Senate;

24 (4) the Select Committee on Intelligence of the
25 Senate;

1 (5) the Committee on Armed Services of the
2 House of Representatives;

3 (6) the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the
4 House of Representatives;

5 (7) the Committee on Homeland Security of the
6 House of Representatives; and

7 (8) the Permanent Select Committee on Intel-
8 ligence of the House of Representatives.

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
