A BILL

To provide for additional supplemental appropriations for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, for border security and disaster relief.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.**

4 (a) SHORT TITLE.—This Act may be cited as the
5 “Additional Supplemental Appropriations for Border Se-
6 curity and Disaster Relief, 2019”.

2 The following sums in this Act are appropriated, out
3 of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
4 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019.

7 **BORDER SECURITY**

8 The following sums in this title are appropriated, out
9 of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
10 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, and for
11 other purposes, namely:

1 SECURITY, ENFORCEMENT, AND
2 INVESTIGATIONS
3 U.S. CUSTOMS AND BORDER PROTECTION
4 PROCUREMENT, CONSTRUCTION, AND IMPROVEMENTS

5 For an additional amount for U.S. Customs and Bor-
6 der Protection for procurement, construction, and im-
7 provements, including procurements to purchase marine
8 vessels, aircraft, and unmanned aerial systems,
9 \$3,600,000,000, available until expended, for purposes au-
10 thorized under section 102 of the Illegal Immigration Re-
11 form and Immigrant Responsibility Act of 1996 (8 U.S.C.
12 1103 note; Public Law 104–208), to include activities au-
13 thorized under section 103(b) of the Immigration and Na-
14 tionality Act (8 U.S.C. 1103(b)): *Provided*, That not later
15 than 180 days after the date of the enactment of this Act,
16 the Secretary of Homeland Security shall submit to the
17 Committee on Appropriations of the Senate, the Com-
18 mittee on Appropriations of the House of Representatives,
19 and the Comptroller General of the United States an up-
20 dated risk-based plan for improving security along the bor-
21 ders of the United States that includes the elements re-
22 quired under subsection (a) of section 231 of division F
23 of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2018, which shall
24 be evaluated in accordance with subsection (b) of such sec-
25 tion: *Provided further*, That amounts provided under this

- 1 heading may be used for roads, lighting, cameras, and sen-
- 2 sors.

2 DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE

3 The following sums in this title are appropriated, out
4 of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
5 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, and for
6 other purposes, namely:

7 AGRICULTURAL PROGRAMS
8 PROCESSING, RESEARCH AND MARKETING
9 OFFICE OF THE SECRETARY

10 For an additional amount for the “Office of the Sec-
11 retary”, \$3,005,442,000, which shall remain available
12 until December 31, 2020, for necessary expenses related
13 to losses of crops (including aquacultured plants and ani-
14 mals, milk, and harvested adulterated wine grapes), trees,
15 bushes, and vines, as a consequence of Hurricanes Michael
16 or Florence, other hurricanes, typhoons, volcanic activity,
17 or wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018 under such
18 terms and conditions as determined by the Secretary of
19 Agriculture (referred to in this title as the “Secretary”):
20 *Provided*, That the Secretary may provide assistance for
21 such losses in the form of block grants to eligible states
22 and territories and such assistance may include compensa-
23 tion to producers, as determined by the Secretary, for past
24 or future crop insurance premiums, forest restoration, and
25 poultry and livestock losses: *Provided further*, That of the

1 amounts provided under this heading, tree assistance pay-
2 ments may be made under section 1501(e) of the Agricul-
3 tural Act of 2014 (7 U.S.C. 9081(e)) to eligible orchard-
4 ists or nursery tree growers (as defined in such section)
5 of pecan trees with a tree mortality rate that exceeds 7.5
6 percent (adjusted for normal mortality) and is less than
7 15 percent (adjusted for normal mortality), to be available
8 until expended, for losses incurred during the period be-
9 ginning January 1, 2018, and ending December 31, 2018:
10 *Provided further*, That in the case of producers impacted
11 by volcanic activity that resulted in the loss of crop land,
12 or access to crop land, the Secretary shall consider all
13 measures available, as appropriate, to bring replacement
14 land into production: *Provided further*, That the total
15 amount of payments received under this heading and ap-
16 plicable policies of crop insurance under the Federal Crop
17 Insurance Act (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) or the Noninsured
18 Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) under section
19 196 of the Federal Agriculture Improvement and Reform
20 Act of 1996 (7 U.S.C. 7333) shall not exceed 90 percent
21 of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided fur-*
22 *ther*, That the total amount of payments received under
23 this heading for producers who did not obtain a policy or
24 plan of insurance for an insurable commodity for the ap-
25 plicable crop year under the Federal Crop Insurance Act

1 (7 U.S.C. 1501 et seq.) for the crop incurring the losses
2 or did not file the required paperwork and pay the service
3 fee by the applicable State filing deadline for a noninsur-
4 able commodity for the applicable crop year under NAP
5 for the crop incurring the losses shall not exceed 70 per-
6 cent of the loss as determined by the Secretary: *Provided*
7 *further*, That producers receiving payments under this
8 heading, as determined by the Secretary, shall be required
9 to purchase crop insurance where crop insurance is avail-
10 able for the next two available crop years, excluding tree
11 insurance policies, and producers receiving payments
12 under this heading shall be required to purchase coverage
13 under NAP where crop insurance is not available in the
14 next two available crop years, as determined by the Sec-
15 retary: *Provided further*, That, not later than 120 days
16 after the end of fiscal year 2019, the Secretary shall sub-
17 mit a report to the Congress specifying the type, amount,
18 and method of such assistance by state and territory: *Pro-*
19 *vided further*, That such amount is designated by the Con-
20 gress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to
21 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
22 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 FARM SERVICE AGENCY
2 EMERGENCY FOREST RESTORATION PROGRAM
3 For an additional amount for the “Emergency Forest
4 Restoration Program”, for necessary expenses related to
5 the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and
6 wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other nat-
7 ural disasters, \$480,000,000, to remain available until ex-
8 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
9 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant
10 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
11 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

12 NATURAL RESOURCES CONSERVATION SERVICE
13 WATERSHED AND FLOOD PREVENTION OPERATIONS
14 For an additional amount for “Watershed and Flood
15 Prevention Operations”, for necessary expenses for the
16 Emergency Watershed Protection Program related to the
17 consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence and
18 wildfires occurring in calendar year 2018, and other nat-
19 ural disasters, \$125,000,000, to remain available until ex-
20 pended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
21 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant
22 to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
23 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 RURAL DEVELOPMENT

2 RURAL COMMUNITY FACILITIES PROGRAM ACCOUNT

3 For an additional amount for the cost of grants for
4 rural community facilities programs as authorized by sec-
5 tion 306 and described in section 381E(d)(1) of the Con-
6 solidated Farm and Rural Development Act, for necessary
7 expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Mi-
8 chael and Florence and wildfires occurring in calendar
9 year 2018, and other natural disasters, \$150,000,000, to
10 remain available until expended: *Provided*, That sections
11 381E–H and 381N of the Consolidated Farm and Rural
12 Development Act are not applicable to the funds made
13 available under this heading: *Provided further*, That such
14 amount is designated by the Congress as being for an
15 emergency requirement pursuant to section
16 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
17 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

18 GENERAL PROVISIONS—THIS TITLE

19 SEC. 201. In addition to amounts otherwise made
20 available, out of the funds made available under section
21 18 of Food and Nutrition Act of 2008, \$25,200,000 shall
22 be available for the Secretary to provide a grant to the
23 Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands for dis-
24 aster nutrition assistance in response to the Presidentially
25 declared major disasters and emergencies: *Provided*, That

1 funds made available to the Commonwealth of the North-
2 ern Mariana Islands under this section shall remain avail-
3 able for obligation by the Commonwealth until September
4 30, 2020: *Provided further*, That such amount is des-
5 ignated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
6 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
7 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

8 SEC. 202. For purposes of administering title I of
9 subdivision 1 of division B of the Bipartisan Budget Act
10 of 2018 (Public Law 115–123), losses to agricultural pro-
11 ducers resulting from hurricanes shall also include losses
12 incurred from Tropical Storm Cindy, losses of peach and
13 blueberry crops in calendar year 2017 due to extreme cold,
14 blueberry productivity losses in calendar year 2018 due
15 to extreme cold and hurricane damage in calendar year
16 2017, losses of milk, and losses of aquacultured plants and
17 animals: *Provided*, That the amounts provided by this sec-
18 tion are designated by the Congress as being for an emer-
19 gency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of
20 the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act
21 of 1985: *Provided further*, That amounts repurposed
22 under this heading that were previously designated by the
23 Congress as an emergency requirement pursuant to the
24 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
25 1985 are designated by the Congress as an emergency re-

1 requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
2 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

3 SEC. 203. (a)(1) Except as provided in paragraph
4 (2), a person or legal entity is not eligible to receive a
5 payment under the Market Facilitation Program estab-
6 lished pursuant to the Commodity Credit Corporation
7 Charter Act (15 U.S.C. 714 et seq.) if the average ad-
8 justed gross income of such person or legal entity is great-
9 er than \$900,000.

10 (2) Paragraph (1) shall not apply to a person or legal
11 entity if at least 75 percent of the adjusted gross income
12 of such person or legal entity is derived from farming,
13 ranching, or forestry related activities.

14 (b) A person or legal entity may not receive a pay-
15 ment under the Market Facilitation Program described in
16 subsection (a)(1), directly or indirectly, of more than
17 \$125,000.

18 (c) In this section, the term “average adjusted gross
19 income” has the meaning given the term defined in section
20 760.1502 of title 7 Code of Federal Regulations (as in
21 effect July 18, 2018).

22 (d) The amount provided by this section is designated
23 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
24 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
25 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 SEC. 204. In addition to other amounts made avail-
2 able by section 309 of division A of the Additional Supple-
3 mental Appropriations for Disaster Relief Requirements
4 Act, 2017 (Public Law 115–72; 131 Stat. 1229), there
5 is appropriated to the Secretary, out of any moneys in the
6 Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the fiscal year
7 ending September 30, 2019, \$610,000,000 to provide a
8 grant to the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico for disaster
9 nutrition assistance in response to a major disaster or
10 emergency designated by the President under the Robert
11 T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act
12 (42 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.): *Provided*, That the funds made
13 available to the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico under this
14 section shall remain available for obligation by the Com-
15 monwealth until September 30, 2020, and shall be in addi-
16 tion to funds otherwise made available: *Provided further*,
17 That such amount is designated by the Congress as being
18 for an emergency requirement pursuant to section
19 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
20 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)).

1 TITLE III

2 DEPARTMENT OF COMMERCE

3 The following sums in this title are appropriated, out
4 of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated,
5 for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2019, and for
6 other purposes, namely:

7 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ADMINISTRATION

8 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS

9 (INCLUDING TRANSFERS OF FUNDS)

10 Pursuant to section 703 of the Public Works and
11 Economic Development Act (42 U.S.C. 3233), for an addi-
12 tional amount for “Economic Development Assistance
13 Programs” for necessary expenses related to flood mitiga-
14 tion, disaster relief, long-term recovery, and restoration of
15 infrastructure in areas that received a major disaster des-
16 ignation as a result of Hurricanes Florence, Michael, and
17 Lane, Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut, and of wildfires, vol-
18 canic eruptions, earthquakes, and other natural disasters
19 occurring in calendar year 2018 under the Robert T. Staf-
20 ford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42
21 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.), \$600,000,000, to remain available
22 until expended: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
23 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
24 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
25 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided*

1 *further*, That within the amount appropriated, up to 2 per-
 2 cent of funds may be transferred to the “Salaries and Ex-
 3 penses” account for administration and oversight activi-
 4 ties: *Provided further*, That within the amount appro-
 5 priated, \$1,000,000 shall be transferred to the “Office of
 6 Inspector General” account for carrying out investigations
 7 and audits related to the funding provided under this
 8 heading.

9 NATIONAL OCEANIC AND ATMOSPHERIC
 10 ADMINISTRATION
 11 OPERATIONS, RESEARCH, AND FACILITIES

12 For an additional amount for “Operations, Research,
 13 and Facilities” for necessary expenses related to the con-
 14 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael, Typhoon
 15 Yutu, and of wildfires, \$120,570,000, to remain available
 16 until September 30, 2020, as follows:

17 (1) \$3,000,000 for repair and replacement of
 18 observing assets, real property, and equipment;

19 (2) \$11,000,000 for marine debris assessment
 20 and removal;

21 (3) \$31,570,000 for mapping, charting, and ge-
 22 odesy services;

23 (4) \$25,000,000 to improve: (a) hurricane in-
 24 tensity forecasting, including through deployment of
 25 unmanned ocean observing platforms and enhanced

1 data assimilation; (b) flood prediction, forecasting,
2 and mitigation capabilities; and (c) wildfire pre-
3 diction, detection, and forecasting; and

4 (5) \$50,000,000 for Title IX Fund grants as
5 authorized under section 906(c) of division O of
6 Public Law 114–113:

7 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
8 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
9 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
10 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985: *Provided further*, That
11 the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration
12 shall submit a spending plan to the Committees on Appro-
13 priations of the House of Representatives and the Senate
14 for funding provided under subsection (4) of this heading
15 within 45 days after the date of enactment of this Act.

16 PROCUREMENT, ACQUISITION AND CONSTRUCTION

17 For an additional amount for “Procurement, Acquisi-
18 tion and Construction”, \$25,000,000, to remain available
19 until September 30, 2021, for improvements to oper-
20 ational and research weather supercomputing infrastruc-
21 ture and satellite ground services used for hurricane inten-
22 sity and track prediction; flood prediction, forecasting, and
23 mitigation; and wildfire prediction, detection, and fore-
24 casting: *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the
25 Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant

3 SALARIES AND EXPENSES

4 For an additional amount for “Salaries and Ex-
5 penses” for necessary expenses related to the con-
6 sequences of Hurricanes Florence and Michael and Ty-
7 phoon Yutu, \$1,336,000: *Provided*, That such amount is
8 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
9 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
10 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

11 FEDERAL PRISON SYSTEM
12 BUILDINGS AND FACILITIES

13 For an additional amount for “Buildings and Facili-
14 ties” for necessary expenses related to the consequences
15 of Hurricanes Florence and Michael and Typhoon Yutu,
16 \$28,400,000, to remain available until expended: *Pro-*
17 *vided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
18 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
19 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
20 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

21 RELATED AGENCIES

22 LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

23 PAYMENT TO THE LEGAL SERVICES CORPORATION

24 For an additional amount for “Payment to the Legal
25 Services Corporation” to carry out the purposes of the

1 Legal Services Corporation Act by providing for necessary
2 expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Flor-
3 ence, Michael, and Lane, Typhoons Yutu and Mangkhut,
4 and calendar year 2018 wildfires, volcanic eruptions, and
5 earthquakes, \$15,000,000: *Provided*, That such amount is
6 designated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
7 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
8 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985:
9 *Provided further*, That none of the funds appropriated in
10 this Act to the Legal Services Corporation shall be ex-
11 pended for any purpose prohibited or limited by, or con-
12 trary to any of the provisions of, sections 501, 502, 503,
13 504, 505, and 506 of Public Law 105–119, and all funds
14 appropriated in this Act to the Legal Services Corporation
15 shall be subject to the same terms and conditions set forth
16 in such sections, except that all references in sections 502
17 and 503 to 1997 and 1998 shall be deemed to refer in-
18 stead to 2018 and 2019, respectively, and except that sec-
19 tions 501 and 503 of Public Law 104–134 (referenced by
20 Public Law 105–119) shall not apply to the amount made
21 available under this heading: *Provided further*, That, for
22 the purposes of this Act, the Legal Services Corporation

8 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
9 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
10 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
11 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

12 RESERVE PERSONNEL, AIR FORCE

13 For an additional amount for “Reserve Personnel,
14 Air Force”, \$7,323,000, for necessary expenses related to
15 the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence:
16 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
17 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
18 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
19 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

20 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE

21 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, MARINE CORPS

22 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
23 tenance, Marine Corps”, \$200,000,000, for necessary ex-
24 penses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael
25 and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is designated

1 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
2 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
3 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

4 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE

5 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
6 tenance, Air Force”, \$400,000,000, for necessary ex-
7 penses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael
8 and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
9 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
10 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
11 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

12 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE

13 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
14 tenance, Air Force”, \$342,012,000, to remain available
15 for obligation until September 30, 2020, for necessary ex-
16 penses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael
17 and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is designated
18 by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement
19 pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budg-
20 et and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

22 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-

3 is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency

7 OPERATION AND MAINTENANCE, AIR FORCE RESERVE
8 For an additional amount for “Operation and Main-
9 tenance, Air Force Reserve”, \$3,505,000, to remain avail-
10 able for obligation until September 30, 2020, for necessary
11 expenses related to the consequences of Hurricanes Mi-
12 chael and Florence: *Provided*, That such amount is des-
13 ignated by the Congress as being for an emergency re-
14 quirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Bal-
15 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

17 AIRCRAFT PROCUREMENT, AIR FORCE

18 For an additional amount for “Aircraft Procurement,
19 Air Force”, \$46,000,000, for necessary expenses related
20 to the consequences of Hurricanes Michael and Florence:
21 *Provided*, That such amount is designated by the Congress
22 as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to sec-
23 tion 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-
24 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 and Modernization (FSRM) related to the consequences
2 of Hurricanes Michael and Florence: *Provided*, That such
3 amount is designated by the Congress as being for an
4 emergency requirement pursuant to section
5 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency

20 and the general public to see how all grant funds are used,
21 including copies of all relevant procurement documents,
22 grantee administrative contracts and details of ongoing
23 procurement processes, as determined by the Secretary:
24 *Provided further*, That prior to the obligation of funds a
25 grantee shall submit a plan to the Secretary for approval

1 detailing the proposed use of all funds, including criteria
2 for eligibility and how the use of these funds will address
3 long-term recovery and restoration of infrastructure and
4 housing, economic revitalization, and mitigation in the
5 most impacted and distressed areas: *Provided further*,
6 That such funds may not be used for activities reimbursed
7 by, or for which funds have been made available by, the
8 Federal Emergency Management Agency or the Army
9 Corps of Engineers, in excess of the authorized amount
10 of the project or its components: *Provided further*, That
11 funds allocated under this heading shall not be considered
12 relevant to the non-disaster formula allocations made pur-
13 suant to section 106 of the Housing and Community De-
14 velopment Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5306): *Provided fur-*
15 *ther*, That a State, unit of general local government, or
16 Indian tribe may use up to 5 percent of its allocation for
17 administrative costs: *Provided further*, That the first pro-
18 viso under this heading in the Supplemental Appropria-
19 tions for Disaster Relief Requirements Act, 2018 (division
20 I of Public Law 115–254) is amended by striking “State
21 or unit of general local government” and inserting “State,
22 unit of general local government, or Indian tribe (as such
23 term is defined in section 102 of the Housing and Commu-
24 nity Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5302))”: *Pro-*
25 *vided further*, That the sixth proviso under this heading

1 in the Supplemental Appropriations for Disaster Relief
2 Requirements Act, 2018 (division I of Public Law 115–
3 254) is amended by striking “State or subdivision thereof”
4 and inserting “State, unit of general local government, or
5 Indian tribe (as such term is defined in section 102 of
6 the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974
7 (42 U.S.C. 5302))”: *Provided further*, That in admin-
8 istering the funds under this heading, the Secretary of
9 Housing and Urban Development may waive, or specify
10 alternative requirements for, any provision of any statute
11 or regulation that the Secretary administers in connection
12 with the obligation by the Secretary or the use by the re-
13 cipient of these funds (except for requirements related to
14 fair housing, nondiscrimination, labor standards, and the
15 environment), if the Secretary finds that good cause exists
16 for the waiver or alternative requirement and such waiver
17 or alternative requirement would not be inconsistent with
18 the overall purpose of title I of the Housing and Commu-
19 nity Development Act of 1974: *Provided further*, That,
20 notwithstanding the preceding proviso, recipients of funds
21 provided under this heading that use such funds to supple-
22 ment Federal assistance provided under section 402, 403,
23 404, 406, 407, 408 (c)(4), or 502 of the Robert T. Staf-
24 ford Disaster Relief and Emergency Assistance Act (42
25 U.S.C. 5121 et seq.) may adopt, without review or public

1 comment, any environmental review, approval, or permit
2 performed by a Federal agency, and such adoption shall
3 satisfy the responsibilities of the recipient with respect to
4 such environmental review, approval or permit: *Provided*
5 *further*, That, notwithstanding section 104(g)(2) of the
6 Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 (42
7 U.S.C. 5304(g)(2)), the Secretary may, upon receipt of
8 a request for release of funds and certification, imme-
9 diately approve the release of funds for an activity or
10 project assisted under this heading if the recipient has
11 adopted an environmental review, approval or permit
12 under the preceding proviso or the activity or project is
13 categorically excluded from review under the National En-
14 vironmental Policy Act of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.):
15 *Provided further*, That the Secretary shall publish via no-
16 tice in the Federal Register any waiver, or alternative re-
17 quirement, to any statute or regulation that the Secretary
18 administers pursuant to title I of the Housing and Com-
19 munity Development Act of 1974 no later than 5 days be-
20 fore the effective date of such waiver or alternative re-
21 quirement: *Provided further*, That of the amounts made
22 available under this heading, up to \$5,000,000 shall be
23 made available for capacity building and technical assist-
24 ance, including assistance on contracting and procurement
25 processes, to support States, units of general local govern-

1 ment, or Indian tribes (and their subrecipients) that re-
2 ceive allocations pursuant to this heading, received dis-
3 aster recovery allocations under the same heading in Pub-
4 lic Law 115–254, or may receive similar allocations for
5 disaster recovery in future appropriations Acts: *Provided*
6 *further*, That of the amounts made available under this
7 heading and under the same heading in Public Law 115–
8 254, up to \$2,500,000 shall be transferred, in aggregate,
9 to “Department of Housing and Urban Development—
10 Program Office Salaries and Expenses—Community Plan-
11 ning and Development” for necessary costs, including in-
12 formation technology costs, of administering and over-
13 seeing the obligation and expenditure of amounts under
14 this heading: *Provided further*, That the amount specified
15 in the preceding proviso shall be combined with funds ap-
16 propriated under the same heading and for the same pur-
17 pose in Public Law 115–254 and the aggregate of such
18 amounts shall be available for any of the same such pur-
19 poses specified under this heading or the same heading
20 in Public Law 115–254 without limitation: *Provided fur-*
21 *ther*, That such amount is designated by the Congress as
22 being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section
23 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency
24 Deficit Control Act of 1985.

1 GENERAL PROVISION—THIS TITLE

2 SEC. 1101. (a) Amounts previously made available
3 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and
4 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et
5 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-
6 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,
7 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas
8 resulting from a major disaster, including funds provided
9 under section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–223,
10 section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as
11 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–
12 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,
13 and any mitigation funding provided under the heading
14 “Department of Housing and Urban Development—Com-
15 munity Planning and Development—Community Develop-
16 ment Fund” of Public Law 115–123, that were allocated
17 in response to Hurricane Matthew, may be used inter-
18 changeably and without limitation for the same activities
19 in the most impacted and distressed areas related to Hur-
20 ricane Florence. In addition, any funds provided under the
21 heading “Department of Housing and Urban Develop-
22 ment—Community Planning and Development—Commu-
23 nity Development Fund” in this Act or in division I of
24 Public Law 115–254 that are allocated in response to
25 Hurricane Florence may be used interchangeably and

1 without limitation for the same activities in the most im-
2 pacted and distressed areas related to Hurricane Matthew.
3 Until HUD publishes the Federal Register Notice imple-
4 menting this provision, grantees may submit for HUD ap-
5 proval revised plans for the use of funds related to Hurri-
6 cane Matthew that expand the eligible beneficiaries of ex-
7 isting programs contained in such previously approved
8 plans to include those impacted by Hurricane Florence.
9 Approval of any such revised plans shall include the execu-
10 tion of revised grant terms and conditions as necessary.
11 Once the implementing Notice is published, any additional
12 action plan revisions shall follow the requirements con-
13 tained therein.

14 (b) Amounts made available for administrative costs
15 for activities authorized under title I of the Housing and
16 Community Development Act of 1974 (42 U.S.C. 5301 et
17 seq.) related to disaster relief, long-term recovery, restora-
18 tion of infrastructure and housing, economic revitalization,
19 and mitigation in the most impacted and distressed areas
20 under this Act or any future Act, and amounts previously
21 provided under section 420 of division L of Public Law
22 114–113, section 145 of division C of Public Law 114–
23 223, section 192 of division C of Public Law 114–223 (as
24 added by section 101(3) of division A of Public Law 114–
25 254), section 421 of division K of Public Law 115–31,

1 and under the heading “Department of Housing and
2 Urban Development—Community Planning and Develop-
3 ment—Community Development Fund” of division B of
4 Public Law 115–56, Public Law 115–123, and Public
5 Law 115–254, shall be available for eligible administrative
6 costs of the grantee related to any disaster relief funding
7 identified in this subsection without regard to the par-
8 ticular disaster appropriation from which such funds origi-
9 nated.

10 (c) The additional uses pursuant to this section for
11 amounts that were previously designated by the Congress,
12 respectively, as an emergency requirement or as being for
13 disaster relief pursuant to the Balanced Budget and
14 Emergency Deficit Control Act are designated by the Con-
15 gress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to
16 section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and
17 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 or as being for
18 disaster relief pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(D) of the
19 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of
20 1985.

TITLE XII

GENERAL PROVISIONS

SEC. 1201. Each amount appropriated or made available by this Act is in addition to amounts otherwise appropriated for the fiscal year involved.

SEC. 1202. No part of any appropriation contained in this Act shall remain available for obligation beyond the current fiscal year unless expressly so provided herein.

SEC. 1203. Unless otherwise provided for by this Act, the additional amounts appropriated by this Act to appropriations accounts shall be available under the authorities and conditions applicable to such appropriations accounts for fiscal year 2019.

SEC. 1204. Each amount designated in this Act by Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)(i)) shall be available (or rescinded or transferred, if applicable) only if the President subsequently so designates all such amounts and transmits such designations to the Congress.

SEC. 1205. For purposes of this Act, the consequences or impacts of any hurricane shall include damages caused by the storm at any time during the entirety

1 of its duration as a cyclone, as defined by the National
2 Hurricane Center.

3 SEC. 1206. Any amount appropriated by this Act,
4 designated by Congress as an emergency requirement pur-
5 suant to section 251(b)(2)(A)(i) of the Balanced Budget
6 and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C.
7 901(b)(2)(A)(i)) and subsequently so designated by the
8 President, and transferred pursuant to transfer authori-
9 ties provided by this Act shall retain such designation.
