Authorizing expenditures by the Select Committee on Intelligence.

IN THE SENATE OF THE UNITED STATES

FEBRUARY 11, 2009

Mrs. FEINSTEIN, from the Select Committee on Intelligence, reported the following original resolution; which was referred to the Committee on Rules and Administration

RESOLUTION

Authorizing expenditures by the Select Committee on
Intelligence.

1 *Resolved*, That, in carrying out its powers, duties, and
2 functions under Senate Resolution 400, agreed to May 19,
3 1976 (94th Congress), as amended by Senate Resolution
4 445, agreed to October 9, 2004 (108th Congress), in ac-
5 cordance with its jurisdiction under section 3 and section
6 17 of such Senate Resolution 400, including holding hear-
7 ings, reporting such hearings, and making investigations
8 as authorized by section 5 of such Senate Resolution 400,
9 the Select Committee on Intelligence is authorized from
10 March 1, 2009, through September 30, 2009; October 1,

1 2009, through September 30, 2010; and October 1, 2010,
2 through February 28, 2011, in its discretion (1) to make
3 expenditures from the contingent fund of the Senate, (2)
4 to employ personnel, and (3) with the prior consent of the
5 Government department or agency concerned and the
6 Committee on Rules and Administration, to use on a reim-
7 bursable or non-reimbursable basis the services of per-
8 sonnel of any such department or agency.

9 SEC. 2. (a) The expenses of the committee for the
10 period March 1, 2009, through September 30, 2009,
11 under this resolution shall not exceed \$4,151,023, of
12 which amount (1) not to exceed \$37,917 may be expended
13 for the procurement of the services of individual consult-
14 ants, or organizations thereof (as authorized by section
15 202(i) of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946, as
16 amended), and (2) not to exceed \$1,167 may be expended
17 for the training of the professional staff of such committee
18 (under procedures specified by section 202(j) of the Legis-
19 lative Reorganization Act of 1946).

20 (b) For the period October 1, 2009, through Sep-
21 tember 30, 2010, expenses for the committee under this
22 resolution shall not exceed \$7,298,438, of which amount
23 (1) not to exceed \$65,000 may be expended for the pro-
24 curement of the services of individual consultants, or orga-
25 nizations thereof (as authorized by section 202(i) of the

1 Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946, as amended), and
2 (2) not to exceed \$2,000 may be expended for the training
3 of the professional staff of such committee (under proce-
4 dures specified by section 202(j) of the Legislative Reorga-
5 nization Act of 1946).

6 (c) For the period October 1, 2010, through Feb-
7 ruary 28, 2011, expenses of the committee under this res-
8 olution shall not exceed \$3,108,302, of which amount (1)
9 not to exceed \$27,083 may be expended for the procure-
10 ment of the services of individual consultants, or organiza-
11 tions thereof (as authorized by section 202(i) of the Legis-
12 lative Reorganization Act of 1946, as amended), and (2)
13 not to exceed \$833 may be expended for the training of
14 the professional staff of such committee (under procedures
15 specified by section 202(j) of the Legislative Reorganiza-
16 tion Act of 1946).

17 SEC. 3. The committee shall report its findings, to-
18 gether with such recommendations for legislation as it
19 deems advisable, to the Senate at the earliest practicable
20 date, but not later than February 28, 2011.

21 SEC. 4. Expenses of the committee under this resolu-
22 tion shall be paid from the contingent fund of the Senate
23 upon vouchers approved by the chairman of the com-
24 mittee, except that vouchers shall not be required (1) for
25 the disbursement of salaries of employees paid at an an-

1 nual rate, or (2) for the payment of telecommunications
2 provided by the Office of the Sergeant at Arms and Door-
3 keeper, United States Senate, or (3) for the payment of
4 stationery supplies purchased through the Keeper of the
5 Stationery, United States Senate, or (4) for payments to
6 the Postmaster, United States Senate, or (5) for the pay-
7 ment of metered charges on copying equipment provided
8 by the Office of the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper,
9 United States Senate, or (6) for the payment of Senate
10 Recording and Photographic Services, or (7) for payment
11 of franked and mass mail costs by the Sergeant at Arms
12 and Doorkeeper, United States Senate.

13 SEC. 5. There are authorized such sums as may be
14 necessary for agency contributions related to the com-
15 pensation of employees of the committee from March 1,
16 2009, through September 30, 2009; October 1, 2009,
17 through September 30, 2010; and October 1, 2010,
18 through February 28, 2011, to be paid from the Appro-
19 priations account for “Expenses of Inquiries and Inves-
20 tigations”.

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
