Authorizing expenditures by committees of the Senate for the periods March 1, 2017 through September 30, 2017, October 1, 2017 through September 30, 2018, and October 1, 2018 through February 28, 2019.

4 powers, duties, and functions under the Standing Rules
5 of the Senate, and under the appropriate authorizing reso6 lutions of the Senate, there is authorized for the period
