Enactment of this legislation could cost the Department of Environmental Quality \$5,000 one-time in FY 2021 from the General Fund for rulemaking. Additionally, this bill could cost the Department \$300 ongoing starting in FY 2021 to create and maintain a list of engineering firms qualified to perform independent stormwater reviews. The department has indicated that they can absorb these costs.

Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

To the extent that low impact development applicants appeal a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System permittee's determination for post-construction stormwater retention requirements, enactment of this legislation could cost local governments half of the cost of an independent review by a firm on the Department of Environmental Quality stormwater engineering list. Additionally, this legislation could increase expenses for permittees to update rules for low impact development applications. Increased costs will vary between permittees and cannot be estimated in aggregate at this time.

Individuals & Businesses

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

To the extent that a low impact development applicant appeals a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System permittee's determination for post-construction stormwater retention requirements, enactment of this legislation could cost applicants half of the cost of an independent review by a firm on the Department of Environmental Quality stormwater engineering list.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(d)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
