Local Government

UCA 36-12-13(2)(c)

Enactment of this legislation could reduce by 1% the repayments to local governments for firefighting services they provide outside of their jurisdictions. The total estimated amount is \$75,000 per year. The legislation also could provide a grant to a local government with catastrophic workers' compensation claims. The frequency and amounts of such claims is unknown.

Enactment of this legislation likely will not result in direct expenditures from tax or fee changes for Utah residents and businesses.

Regulatory Impact

UCA 36-12-13(2)(e)

Enactment of this legislation likely will not change the regulatory burden for Utah residents or businesses.
