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LONG TITLE

General Description:

This joint resolution of the Legislature supports the existing scope of practice provisions under the Utah Nurse Practice Act that allow a certified registered nurse anesthetist (CRNA) to practice without the supervision of a physician and urges the state to formally opt out of the federal physician supervision requirements of 42 CFR 416.42.

Highlighted Provisions:

This resolution:

• urges the state to opt out of the current federal requirement that a physician supervise a CRNA when the CRNA is administering anesthesia, which currently conflicts with existing provisions of the Utah Nurse Practice Act.

> WHEREAS, in 2001 the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services issued a rule that allowed states to formally opt out of the physician-supervision requirements of 42 CFR 416.42,

and would direct Medicare to reimburse services provided by a certified registered nurse anesthetist regardless if the certified registered nurse anesthetist is supervised by a physician;

WHEREAS, the federal supervision requirement is inconsistent with Title 58, Chapter 31B, Nurse Practice Act, and the rules created by the Utah Board of Nursing under this act, which state that only a request of a licensed professional is necessary in order for a certified registered nurse anesthetist to administer anaesthesia;

WHEREAS, the current federal supervision requirement for certified registered nurse anesthetists creates confusion for medical facilities and surgeons, and will continue to create confusion absent the state opting out of the requirement, regarding the level of required supervision for certified registered nurse anesthetists;

WHEREAS, Title 58, Chapter 31B, Nurse Practice Act, provides certified registered nurse anesthetists with independence of practice, while federal rulings cause certified registered nurse anesthetists continued difficulty in seeking reimbursement for rendered services, a state opt out would eliminate these reimbursement issues for services rendered by a certified registered nurse anesthetist; and

WHEREAS, certified registered nurse anesthetists are currently practicing independently statewide and a state opt out would allow certified registered nurse anesthetists within the state of Utah to continue providing publicly accessible, quality care to patients in a safe manner without federal oversight and penalties:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Legislature of the state of Utah wholeheartedly supports that the state formally opt out of the federal requirement that certified registered nurse anesthetists be supervised by a physician.
