27 Be it enacted by the Legislature of the state of Utah:

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28	Section 1. Section <b>35A-1-104.6</b> is enacted to read:
29	<u>35A-1-104.6.</u> Task force on food security.
30	(1) As used in this section:
31	(a) "Food security" means access to sufficient, affordable, safe, and nutritious food that
32	meets an individual's food preferences and dietary needs.
33	(b) "Task force" means the Task Force on Food Security created in this section.
34	(2) There is created within the department the "Task Force on Food Security,"
35	consisting of the following members:
36	(a) two individuals from the Senate, appointed by the president of the Senate, with one
37	individual from the majority party and one individual from the minority party;
38	(b) two individuals from the House, appointed by the speaker of the House, with one
39	individual from the majority party and one individual from the minority party;
40	(c) the executive director, or the executive director's designee, from each of the
41	following:
42	(i) the Department of Health;
43	(ii) the Department of Human Services;
44	(iii) the Department of Workforce Services; and
45	(iv) the Governor's Office of Economic Development;
46	(d) the chair of the State Board of Education or the chair's designee;
47	(e) one individual appointed by the executive director of the Utah Association of
48	Counties to represent county government;
49	(f) one individual appointed by the executive director of the Utah League of Cities and
50	Towns to represent municipal government; and
51	(g) six individuals, appointed by the governor, including:
52	(i) one individual who works with a refugee or an immigrant community;
53	(ii) one individual with expertise on issues related to food security in rural Utah;
54	(iii) one individual who works with individuals experiencing a lack of food security;
55	(iv) one individual from the business community;
56	(v) one individual from a food assistance organization; and
57	(vi) one individual from an advocacy group that addresses hunger issues.
58	(3) The task force shall select two members to serve as cochairs.

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59	(4) (a) If a vacancy occurs in the membership of the task force appointed under
60	Subsection (2)(a), (b), or (g), the member shall be replaced in the same manner in which the
61	original appointment was made.
62	(b) A member of the task force serves until the member's successor is appointed and
63	qualified.
64	(5) (a) A majority of the task force members constitutes a quorum.
65	(b) The action of a majority of a quorum constitutes an action of the task force.
66	(6) (a) The salary and expenses of a task force member who is a legislator shall be paid
67	in accordance with Section 36-2-2, Legislative Joint Rules, Title 5, Chapter 2, Lodging, Meal,
68	and Transportation Expenses, and Legislative Joint Rules, Title 5, Chapter 3, Legislator
69	Compensation.
70	(b) A task force member who is not a legislator may not receive compensation or
71	benefits for the member's service on the task force but may receive per diem and
72	reimbursement for travel expenses incurred as a member of the task force at the rates
73	established by the Division of Finance under:
74	(i) Sections <u>63A-3-106</u> and <u>63A-3-107</u> ; and
75	(ii) rules made in accordance with Sections 63A-3-106 and 63A-3-107.
76	(7) The department shall provide staff support to the task force.
77	(8) (a) The task force shall develop an evidence-based plan for establishing food
78	security in this state.
79	(b) The plan shall include recommendations for:
80	(i) increasing economic security for all individuals in the state;
81	(ii) increasing public awareness and understanding that ending hunger is vital to the
82	health and well-being of the state's residents, economy, and communities;
83	(iii) increasing access to affordable, nutritious, and culturally appropriate food within
84	the community where an individual lives;
85	(iv) increasing the number of individuals who can access nutritious food assistance
86	through community-based organizations;
87	(v) maximizing enrollment in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program to
88	improve food access and nutrition education;
89	(vi) improving children's health by optimizing participation in federal child nutrition

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90	programs; and
91	(vii) removing barriers for senior citizens to access food security.
92	(9) On or before October 1, 2021, the task force shall submit electronically the plan for
93	increasing food security in this state to:
94	(a) the Executive Appropriations Committee;
95	(b) the Social Services Appropriations Subcommittee;
96	(c) the Business, Economic Development, and Labor Appropriations Subcommittee;
97	(d) the Health and Human Services Interim Committee; and
98	(e) the Economic Development and Workforce Services Interim Committee.
