79	(1) Before disconnecting an essential utility during a moratorium described in Section
80	35A-8-1504, an essential utility provider must provide a notice to a residential customer that
81	contains:
82	(a) the date of the scheduled disconnection;
83	(b) the amount due; and
84	(c) information regarding the moratorium program, including:
85	(i) residential customer qualifications; and
86	(ii) contact information for the department.
87	(2) An essential utility shall mail the notice by first class mail or personally deliver the
88	notice at least two days prior to the date on which the disconnection is scheduled to occur.
