- 5. Summary: Requires the Department of Forestry, in coordination with a stakeholder advisory group, to develop a Forestland and Urban Tree Canopy Conservation Plan no later than November 1, 2026, and update such plan every five years thereafter. The bill requires the Department to post and maintain on its website the most recent version of the Plan and submit the Plan to the Governor and Chairmen of the House Committee on Agriculture, Chesapeake and Natural Resources and the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Conservation and Natural Resources no later than November 30, 2026, and November 30 every five years thereafter.

8. Fiscal Implications: The Department of Forestry does not currently have the capacity or expertise to develop a Plan as described in the bill. Based on previous experience and preliminary estimates, the Department estimates that \$500,000 in the first year and \$400,000 in the second year will be sufficient to contract with a qualified firm to perform the analysis, develop the Plan, and coordinate the stakeholder recommendation process. Additionally, the Department would need funding of \$130,000 in both years to bring on one full time staff member or contractor to coordinate and manage the plan. HB30 as passed by the House and Senate includes \$630,000 in the first year and \$530,000 in the second year and one position for the development of the Forest Conservation Plan.

The bill only directs the development of the Plan. If it is the intent of the General Assembly for the Department to implement the Plan, the Department would need to retain the one full time coordinator on an ongoing basis, at a continuing cost of \$130,000 annually and an increase of one FTE.

The bill would create a Technical Advisory Committee that would include representatives from the Department of Environmental Quality, Department of Wildlife Resources, Department of Conservation and Recreation, and the Virginia Cooperative Extension. It is anticipated that each of these agencies will be able to absorb any participation costs within existing resources.
