- 5. Summary: Provides that absent a criminal or administrative warrant, law enforcement and regulatory agencies must not use license plate readers to collect or maintain personal information in a manner where such personal information is of unknown relevance and will not be promptly evaluated and potentially used to investigate suspected criminal activity or terrorism by any person, or in support of the emissions inspection program authorized elsewhere in the Code. Under the provisions of the bill, law enforcement agencies are allowed to collect information from license plate readers without a warrant, but any information collected must not be subject to any outside inquiries or internal usage except for the investigation of a report of a missing person, suspected criminal activity or terrorism by any person, and must be retained for no more than 30 days, unless such personal information is being used for such purposes. Additionally, a law enforcement or regulatory agency must not acquire personal information from any third party private vendor collected by such vendor from a license plate if such agency would be prohibited from collecting or maintain the personal information itself, unless such license plate reader technology is being used as part of the emissions inspection program.
