**4. Title:** Compensation of experts in criminal cases

**5. Summary:** The proposed bill increases from \$750 to \$1,200 the maximum fee that the court may pay for professional services rendered by each psychiatrist, clinical psychologist, or other expert appointed by the court to render professional service in a criminal case other than for aggravated murder cases.

**8. Fiscal Implications:** The proposed bill would increase the maximum fee that the court may pay for professional services rendered by each psychiatrist, clinical psychologist, or other expert appointed by the court to render professional service in a criminal case other than aggravated murder from \$750 to \$1,200, a 60 percent increase. Between FY 2019 and FY 2021, the Office of the Executive Secretary of the Supreme Court reports that an average of \$1,703,205 a year was paid out of the Criminal Fund for professional services rendered pursuant to § 19.2-175. If it is assumed that the amounts paid for experts would increase by 60 percent as a result of this bill, the increase in expenditure cost to the Criminal Fund would be an estimated \$1,021,923 annually.
