9	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to require the
10	Green Mountain Care Board to create an online database through which
11	consumers may compare the cost and quality of health care services around the
12	State. The bill would also require pharmacies to post in the store and online
13	the actual cost of the 20 most commonly prescribed medications.

18	§ 9410a. HEALTH CARE QUALITY AND PRICE COMPARISON
19	(a)(1) The Green Mountain Care Board shall establish a website allowing
20	health care consumers to compare the price of medical care in Vermont by

1	insurance plan and by service or procedure, including office visits, emergency
2	care, radiologic services, and preventive care such as mammography and
3	colonoscopy, as well as comparing the cost of prescription drugs. The website
4	shall also enable consumers to compare quality across providers. The Board
5	may develop and administer the comparison website itself or through a
6	contract with a third party.
7	(2) The website shall allow a consumer to compare price by selecting a
8	specific service or procedure, insurance plan, and geographic region of the
9	State. Based on the criteria specified, the website shall provide the consumer
10	with an estimate for each provider of the amount the consumer would pay for
11	the service or procedure, an estimate of the amount the insurance would pay,
12	and an estimate of the combined payments.
13	(3) For consumers without health insurance or who choose to compare
14	costs without selecting an insurance plan, the website shall provide the average
15	cost for the service or procedure in the specified geographic region.
16	(b) Cost data for the comparison website shall be derived from the unified
17	health care database established in section 9410 of this title.
18	(c) The Department of Vermont Health Access shall ensure that the website
19	for the Vermont Health Benefit Exchange includes a prominently placed link

to the comparison website established by this section to allow health care

4	§ 4634. PRESCRIPTION DRUG PRICE DISCLOSURE
5	(a) Upon request, a pharmacy shall disclose to any consumer or health care
6	provider the usual and customary retail price of a prescription drug.
7	(b) With each prescription dispensed, a pharmacy shall disclose to the
8	consumer, in writing, the price of the prescription and any payment toward the
9	price required of the consumer.
10	(c) Each pharmacy shall display on or near the pharmacy counter and on
11	the pharmacy website, if any, the usual and customary retail price of the 20
12	most commonly prescribed prescription medications dispensed at that
13	pharmacy, as well as the average price for each of those prescription
14	medications.
15	(d) For purposes of As used in this section:
16	(1) "Price of the prescription" means the amount charged by the
17	pharmacy to the consumer or, if applicable, to the consumer's health benefit
18	plan.
19	(2) "Usual and customary retail price" means the total price charged to a
20	consumer who does not have prescription drug coverage under a health benefit

1	(d)(e) In addition to any other remedy provided by law, the attorney
2	general Attorney General may file an action in superior court Superior Court
3	for a violation of this section. In any such action, the attorney general Attorney

11	2015, and pharmacies shall display the information required by Sec. 2 on or
12	before July 1, 2015.
