8	An act relating to making appropriations for the support of government
9	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
10	Sec. A.100 SHORT TITLE
11	(a) This bill may be referred to as the BIG BILL – Fiscal Year 2020
12	Appropriations Act.
13	Sec. A.101 PURPOSE
14	(a) The purpose of this act is to provide appropriations for the operations of
15	State government during fiscal year 2020. It is the express intent of the
16	General Assembly that activities of the various agencies, departments,
17	divisions, boards, and commissions be limited to those that can be supported
18	by funds appropriated in this act or other acts passed prior to June 30, 2019.

1	Agency and department heads are directed to implement staffing and service
2	levels at the beginning of fiscal year 2020 so as to meet this condition unless
3	otherwise directed by specific language in this act or other acts of the General
4	Assembly.
5	Sec. A.102 APPROPRIATIONS
6	(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that this act serves as the
7	primary source and reference for appropriations for fiscal year 2020.
8	(b) The sums herein stated are appropriated for the purposes specified in
9	the following sections of this act. When no time is expressly stated during
10	which any of the appropriations are to continue, the appropriations are
11	single-year appropriations and only for the purpose indicated and shall be paid
12	from funds shown as the source of funds. If in this act there is an error in
13	either addition or subtraction, the totals shall be adjusted accordingly.
14	Apparent errors in referring to section numbers of statutory titles within this
15	act may be disregarded by the Commissioner of Finance and Management.
16	(c) Unless codified or otherwise specified, all narrative portions of this act
17	apply only to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2020.
18	Sec. A.103 DEFINITIONS
19	(a) As used in this act:
20	(1) "Encumbrances" means a portion of an appropriation reserved for
21	the subsequent payment of existing purchase orders or contracts. The

1	Commissioner of Finance and Management shall make final decisions on the
2	appropriateness of encumbrances.
3	(2) "Grants" means subsidies, aid, or payments to local governments, to
4	community and quasi-public agencies for providing local services, and to
5	persons who are not wards of the State for services or supplies and means cash
6	or other direct assistance, including pension contributions.
7	(3) "Operating expenses" means property management, repair and
8	maintenance, rental expenses, insurance, postage, travel, energy and utilities,
9	office and other supplies, equipment, including motor vehicles, highway
10	materials, and construction, expenditures for the purchase of land and
11	construction of new buildings and permanent improvements, and similar items
12	(4) "Personal services" means wages and salaries, fringe benefits, per
13	diems, and contracted third-party services, and similar items.
14	Sec. A.104 RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING LAWS
15	(a) Except as specifically provided, this act shall not be construed in any
16	way to negate or impair the full force and effect of existing laws.
17	Sec. A.105 OFFSETTING APPROPRIATIONS
18	(a) In the absence of specific provisions to the contrary in this act, when
19	total appropriations are offset by estimated receipts, the State appropriations
20	shall control, notwithstanding receipts being greater or less than anticipated.

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2	(a) In fiscal year 2020, the Governor, with the approval of the Legislature
3	or the Joint Fiscal Committee if the Legislature is not in session, may accept
4	federal funds available to the State of Vermont, including block grants in lieu
5	of or in addition to funds herein designated as federal. The Governor, with the
6	approval of the Legislature or the Joint Fiscal Committee if the Legislature is
7	not in session, may allocate all or any portion of such federal funds for any
8	purpose consistent with the purposes for which the basic appropriations in this
9	act have been made.
10	(b) If, during fiscal year 2020, federal funds available to the State of
11	Vermont and designated as federal in this and other acts of the 2019 session of
12	the Vermont General Assembly are converted into block grants or are
13	abolished under their current title in federal law and reestablished under a new
14	title in federal law, the Governor may continue to accept such federal funds for
15	any purpose consistent with the purposes for which the federal funds were
16	appropriated. The Governor may spend such funds for such purposes for no
17	more than 45 days prior to Legislative or Joint Fiscal Committee approval.
18	Notice shall be given to the Joint Fiscal Committee without delay if the
19	Governor intends to use the authority granted by this section, and the Joint
20	Fiscal Committee shall meet in an expedited manner to review the Governor's
21	request for approval.
