<u>Whereas</u>, for many years, Francis Brooks taught chemistry and physics at Montpelier High School, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1982, the voters of Montpelier elected Francis Brooks to represent them in the House of Representatives, where he served with distinction during 25 biennial or adjourned sessions (1983–2007), and

<u>Whereas</u>, as a state legislator, Francis Brooks held the challenging role of House Majority Leader (1987–1992) and served on the Committees on Appropriations (1993–2002), Transportation (2003–2004), and General, Housing, and Military Affairs (2005–2007), which he also chaired (2005–2006), and

<u>Whereas</u>, legislative leadership often asked Representative Francis Brooks, one of the members from Montpelier, to preside at token sessions intended to move the legislative calendar forward at critical moments during the biennium, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 2007, Representative Francis Brooks' colleagues in the General Assembly elected him as the State House Sergeant at Arms, and

<u>Whereas</u>, when not serving in one of his public sector roles, Francis Brooks has devoted many hours to serving his beloved Baptist Church as a powerful lay preacher and vocal soloist, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on Friday, February 20, 2015, Sergeant at Arms Francis Brooks gave an inspirational and moving devotional in the House chamber, addressing the topic of adversity in life, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after more than two decades as a legislator and eight years as the Sergeant at Arms, Francis Brooks is now concluding 32 years (1983–2015) of outstanding public service at the Vermont State House, now therefore be it
