Whereas, the Long Trail, a "footpath through the wilderness," extends the

length of Vermont and is America's oldest long-distance hiking trail, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on March 11, 1910, in the Sample Room of Burlington's Van Ness House hotel, James P. Taylor convened a meeting of civic leaders who sought to promote recreational pedestrian access to the Green Mountains, and they established a new organization named the Green Mountain Club (GMC), and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Green Mountain Club's founders enjoyed the support and good wishes of prominent Vermonters, including Governor George H. Prouty, former Governors Urban A. Woodbury and Fletcher D. Proctor, and U.S. Senators Carroll S. Page and William P. Dillingham, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the core mission of the GMC is to make "the Vermont Mountains play a larger part in the life of the people" by protecting and maintaining the Long Trail, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the design and construction of the Long Trail and of a network of shelters for hikers to sleep in overnight was not completed until 1931, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on the club's 50th anniversary in 1960, the general assembly adopted joint resolution J.R.H.50, which expressed the legislature's "thanks to the Green Mountain Club for a good job done and . . . every good wish for the Green Mountain Club's continued success," and

<u>Whereas</u>, pursuant to joint resolutions J.R.S.22 of 1971 and J.R.S.18 of 1985, the General Assembly recognized the Green Mountain Club "as the founder, sponsor, defender and protector of the Long Trail system for now and future generations to come," and <u>Whereas</u>, in 1986, the Green Mountain Club and the state of Vermont embarked together on a land protection campaign to ensure a permanent corridor for the trail's path and its connecting side trails, an effort which is nearly complete but continues to this day, and

<u>Whereas</u>, after a devastating fire in 2003 destroyed the GMC's historic South Barn at its Waterbury campus headquarters, the club initiated a successful Second Century Campaign to raise private funds for construction of a new energy-efficient visitor center and increased the club's financial wherewithal to perform its mission for another hundred years, and

<u>Whereas</u>, today, March 11, 2010, marks the one-hundredth anniversary of the GMC's founding, and tonight, GMC members and friends of the Long Trail will gather in Burlington to mark this date in the history of a great Vermont organization, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly congratulates the Green Mountain Club as it celebrates a century of mud, rocks, sweat, black flies, heroic volunteers, and great hikes on Vermont's Long Trail, and be it further
