<u>Whereas</u>, for generations, millions of Americans were denied the housing of their choice because of factors such as race, ethnicity, or religion, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on April 11, 1968, President Lyndon Johnson signed the Civil Rights Act of 1968, including Title VIII, known as the Fair Housing Act, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Vermont's Fair Housing Act, enacted in 1987 and expanded in subsequent legislative acts, now prohibits discrimination in the rental or sale of housing based on "race, sex, sexual orientation, age, marital status, religious creed, color, national origin, or handicap of a person, or because a person intends to occupy a dwelling with one or more minor children, or because a person is a recipient of public assistance," making this law more protective than the federal statutes and among the most comprehensive in the nation, and

<u>Whereas</u>, despite both these federal and State legal guarantees, the dilemma of housing discrimination in Vermont has not disappeared, and

<u>Whereas</u>, as recently as 2012, a Vermont Legal Aid field investigation documented significant landlord bias barriers in Chittenden County for persons of color, foreign origin, or with children, and that accessibility problems for those with disabilities were significant, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the damage resulting from Tropical Storm Irene in 2011 reduced affordable housing options in some communities, especially mobile homes, and<u>Whereas</u>, 2012 Acts and Resolves No. 137 created new incentives for mobile home park development as a way to increase the availability of affordable housing, and

<u>Whereas</u>, this act strengthened the antidiscrimination requirements of mobile home park leases, and added a new provision banning municipal planning policies that discriminate against affordable housing, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Governor's designation of April as Fair Housing Month highlights the crucial but unfinished effort to eliminate all vestiges of housing discrimination in Vermont, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly recognizes April as Fair Housing Month in Vermont, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u>: That the Secretary of State be directed to send a copy of this resolution to the Vermont Human Rights Commission.
