<u>Whereas</u>, Rev. Michael DeMasi devotedly ministered for many decades to his parishioners, be they in Rutland, the Northeast Kingdom, or Bennington, with a special mission that although spiritually based, extended to many other aspects of their lives, and

<u>Whereas</u>, he was born in Northfield, earned an undergraduate degree at St. Michael's College in Winooski, and then desiring to dedicate his life to the service of his church, entered Grand Seminary in Montreal where he completed his course work for ordination as a Roman Catholic priest, and

<u>Whereas</u>, on finishing his theological classes, the Rev. Michael DeMasi was initially posted to St. Peters Church in Rutland, and he subsequently assumed his first pastoral assignment at St. Theresa's Church in Gilman, which also included a mission assignment in the nearby town of Lunenberg, and

<u>Whereas</u>, his pastoral role continued in the village of Island Pond where he exercised his duties as a cleric in St. James Parish, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in 1965, the Rev. Michael DeMasi journeyed across the state of Vermont to lead the parishioners at St. John the Baptist Church in North Bennington, and for the next 28 years, he served as the much-esteemed priest for this congregation, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Rev. Michael DeMasi's activities were not limited to his own Roman Catholic faith as he was involved in many charitable and community service projects encompassing other congregations and religious persuasions, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the breadth of his community involvement was recognized when the NorShaft Lions Club honored him with that organization's Citizen of the Year Award, citing Rev. Michael DeMasi's concern not only for the spiritual, but also the "economic, social and medical well-being" of the thousands of persons with whom he came in contact, and

<u>Whereas</u>, even after his official retirement in 1993, Rev. Michael DeMasi remained engaged in the ecclesiastical and secular realms, accepting church administration assignments at St. Jerome's Church in East Dorset and Holy Trinity parish in Danby; visiting the sick at local hospitals; saying weekly Mass at the Vermont Veterans Home; and distributing the Eucharist to the homebound, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Rev. Michael DeMasi will perhaps be most fondly remembered for his tireless dedication to picking apples at local orchards and distributing this hand-picked fruit of the earth to the poor, and
