5	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to create a
6	working group to recommend a classification system for criminal offenses for
7	the purpose of increasing uniform application of the law throughout the State.
8	An act relating to classification of crimes
9	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
10	Sec. 1. CRIMINAL OFFENSE CLASSIFICATION WORKING GROUP
11	(a) Findings:
12	(1) Vermont's criminal offense classification structure is minimal. Any
13	offense for which the maximum term of imprisonment is two years or less is a
14	misdemeanor, and any offense punishable by more than two years is a felony.
15	Most offenses have a statutory maximum term of imprisonment and no
16	minimum or recommended average. The sentence for each offense is distinct
17	with regard to both imprisonment and fine amount.
18	(2) Over time, this structure has resulted in a lack of uniformity among
19	sentences for comparable crimes and too little guidance for the courts with
20	regard to the General Assembly's policy on an appropriate sentence based

1	upon the seriousness of an offense. For instance, the statutory penalty for
2	embezzlement is imprisonment for not more than 10 years. This penalty
3	applies whether the embezzlement was \$5.00 or \$5,000,000.00.
4	(3) In recent years, the General Assembly has undertaken substantial
5	initiatives to provide equal access to justice throughout the State and to employ
6	data-driven policies to reduce recidivism and divert nonviolent offenders from
7	incarceration. A review and subsequent revision of the classification and
8	penalties for crimes is essential to continue this work and ensure that
9	lawmakers' policy decisions concerning Vermont's approach to criminal
10	justice is applied consistently throughout the State.
11	(b) Creation of Working Group. There is created a Criminal Offense
12	Classification Working Group for the purpose of developing a criminal offense
13	system that is well-organized and reflective of appropriate grading of liability
14	and punishment and increasing uniformity in application of the law throughout
15	the State.
16	(c) Membership. The Working Group shall be composed of five members
17	as follows:
18	(1) the Attorney General or designee;
19	(2) the Executive Director of the Department of State's Attorneys and
20	Sheriffs or designee;
21	(3) the Defender General or designee;

1	(4) a criminal defense attorney appointed by the Defender General; and
2	(5) the Director of the Vermont Center for Justice Research.
3	(d) Powers and duties.
4	(1) The Working Group shall:
5	(A) Collect the statutory sentencing ranges for all criminal offenses
6	under Vermont law.
7	(B) Examine the sentencing structure of the model penal code,
8	criminal codes in other jurisdictions, and earlier attempts by the General
9	Assembly to revise the criminal code.
10	(C)(i) Develop recommendations for creating a classification of
11	offenses for Vermont that includes consistent sentences that should be no more
12	severe than necessary to achieve the societal purpose or purposes for which
13	they are authorized.
14	(ii) The sentencing range shall be consistent with the gravity of the
15	offense, the culpability of the offender, the offender's criminal history, and the
16	personal characteristics of an individual offender that may be taken into
17	account.
18	(2) In its work, the Working Group shall consult with the Office of
19	Legislative Council.

- 8 § 2531. EMBEZZLEMENT GENERALLY
- 9 (a) An officer, agent, bailee for hire, clerk or servant of a banking 10 association or an incorporated company, or a clerk, agent, bailee for hire, 11 officer or servant of a private person, partnership, tradesunion, joint stock 12 company, unincorporated association, fraternal or benevolent association, 13 except apprentices and other persons under the age of 16 years, who embezzles 14 or fraudulently converts to his or her own use, or takes or secretes with intent 15 to embezzle or fraudulently convert to his or her own use, money or other 16 property which comes into his or her possession or is under his or her care by 17 virtue of such employment, notwithstanding he or she may have an interest in 18 such money or property, shall be guilty of embezzlement and shall be

imprisoned not more than 10 years or fined not more than \$500.00, or both.
