1 AN ACT Relating to the audiology and speech-language pathology
2 interstate compact; adding a new chapter to Title 18 RCW; and
3 providing a contingent effective date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 1.** (1) The purpose of this compact is to
6 facilitate interstate practice of audiology and speech-language
7 pathology with the goal of improving public access to audiology and
8 speech-language pathology services. The practice of audiology and
9 speech-language pathology occurs in the state where the patient,
10 client, or student is located at the time of the patient, client, or
11 student encounter. The compact preserves the regulatory authority of
12 states to protect public health and safety through the current system
13 of state licensure.

14 (2) This compact is designed to achieve the following objectives:

15 (a) Increase public access to audiology and speech-language
16 pathology services by providing for the mutual recognition of other
17 member state licenses;

18 (b) Enhance the states' ability to protect the public's health
19 and safety;

20 (c) Encourage the cooperation of member states in regulating
21 multistate audiology and speech-language pathology practice;

- 1 (d) Support spouses of relocating active duty military personnel;
- 2 (e) Enhance the exchange of licensure, investigative, and
3 disciplinary information between member states;
- 4 (f) Allow a remote state to hold a provider of services with a
5 compact privilege in that state accountable to that state's practice
6 standards; and
- 7 (g) Allow for the use of telehealth technology to facilitate
8 increased access to audiology and speech-language pathology services.

9 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 2.** As used in this compact, and except as
10 otherwise provided, the following definitions shall apply:

11 (1) "Active duty military" means full-time duty status in the
12 active uniformed service of the United States, including members of
13 the national guard and reserve on active duty orders pursuant to 10
14 U.S.C. Secs. 1209 and 1211.

15 (2) "Adverse action" means any administrative, civil, equitable,
16 or criminal action permitted by a state's laws which is imposed by a
17 licensing board or other authority against an audiologist or speech-
18 language pathologist, including actions against an individual's
19 license or privilege to practice such as revocation, suspension,
20 probation, monitoring of the licensee, or restriction on the
21 licensee's practice.

22 (3) "Alternative program" means a nondisciplinary monitoring
23 process approved by an audiology or speech-language pathology
24 licensing board to address impaired practitioners.

25 (4) "Audiologist" means an individual who is licensed by a state
26 to practice audiology.

27 (5) "Audiology" means the care and services provided by a
28 licensed audiologist as set forth in the member state's statutes and
29 rules.

30 (6) "Audiology and speech-language pathology compact commission"
31 or "commission" means the national administrative body whose
32 membership consists of all states that have enacted the compact.

33 (7) "Audiology and speech-language pathology licensing board,"
34 "audiology licensing board," "speech-language pathology licensing
35 board," or "licensing board" means the agency of a state that is
36 responsible for the licensing and regulation of audiologists, speech-
37 language pathologists, or both.

38 (8) "Compact privilege" means the authorization granted by a
39 remote state to allow a licensee from another member state to

1 practice as an audiologist or speech-language pathologist in the
2 remote state under its laws and rules. The practice of audiology or
3 speech-language pathology occurs in the member state where the
4 patient, client, or student is located at the time of the patient,
5 client, or student encounter.

6 (9) "Current significant investigative information" means
7 investigative information that a licensing board, after an inquiry or
8 investigation that includes notification and an opportunity for the
9 audiologist or speech-language pathologist to respond, if required by
10 state law, has reason to believe is not groundless and, if proved
11 true, would indicate more than a minor infraction.

12 (10) "Data system" means a repository of information about
13 licensees including, but not limited to, continuing education,
14 examination, licensure, investigative, compact privilege, and adverse
15 action.

16 (11) "Encumbered license" means a license in which an adverse
17 action restricts the practice of audiology or speech-language
18 pathology by the licensee and said adverse action has been reported
19 to the national practitioners data bank.

20 (12) "Executive committee" means a group of directors elected or
21 appointed to act on behalf of, and within the powers granted to them
22 by, the commission.

23 (13) "Home state" means the member state that is the licensee's
24 primary state of residence.

25 (14) "Impaired practitioner" means individuals whose professional
26 practice is adversely affected by substance abuse, addiction, or
27 other health-related conditions.

28 (15) "Licensee" means an individual who currently holds an
29 authorization from the state licensing board to practice as an
30 audiologist or speech-language pathologist.

31 (16) "Member state" means a state that has enacted the compact.

32 (17) "Privilege to practice" means a legal authorization
33 permitting the practice of audiology or speech-language pathology in
34 a remote state.

35 (18) "Remote state" means a member state other than the home
36 state where a licensee is exercising or seeking to exercise the
37 compact privilege.

38 (19) "Rule" means a regulation, principle, or directive
39 promulgated by the commission that has the force of law.

1 (20) "Single-state license" means an audiology or speech-language
2 pathology license issued by a member state that authorizes practice
3 only within the issuing state and does not include a privilege to
4 practice in any other member state.

5 (21) "Speech-language pathologist" means an individual who is
6 licensed by a state to practice speech-language pathology.

7 (22) "Speech-language pathology" means the care and services
8 provided by a licensed speech-language pathologist as set forth in
9 the member state's statutes and rules.

10 (23) "State" means any state, commonwealth, district, or
11 territory of the United States of America that regulates the practice
12 of audiology and speech-language pathology.

13 (24) "State practice laws" means a member state's laws, rules,
14 and regulations that govern the practice of audiology or speech-
15 language pathology, define the scope of audiology or speech-language
16 pathology practice, and create the methods and grounds for imposing
17 discipline.

18 (25) "Telehealth" means the application of telecommunication
19 technology to deliver audiology or speech-language pathology services
20 at a distance for assessment, intervention, or consultation.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 3.** (1) A license issued to an audiologist or
22 speech-language pathologist by a home state to a resident in that
23 state shall be recognized by each member state as authorizing an
24 audiologist or speech-language pathologist to practice audiology or
25 speech-language pathology, under a privilege to practice, in each
26 member state.

27 (2) A state must implement or utilize procedures for considering
28 the criminal history records of applicants for initial privilege to
29 practice. These procedures shall include the submission of
30 fingerprints or other biometric-based information by applicants for
31 the purpose of obtaining an applicant's criminal history record
32 information from the federal bureau of investigation and the agency
33 responsible for retaining that state's criminal records.

34 (a) A member state must fully implement a criminal background
35 check requirement, within a time frame established by rule, by
36 receiving the results of the federal bureau of investigation record
37 search on criminal background checks and use the results in making
38 licensure decisions.

1 (b) Communication between a member state, the commission, and
2 among member states regarding the verification of eligibility for
3 licensure through the compact shall not include any information
4 received from the federal bureau of investigation relating to a
5 federal criminal records check performed by a member state under
6 Public Law 92-544.

7 (3) Upon application for a privilege to practice, the licensing
8 board in the issuing remote state shall ascertain, through the data
9 system, whether the applicant has ever held, or is the holder of, a
10 license issued by any other state, whether there are any encumbrances
11 on any license or privilege to practice held by the applicant,
12 whether any adverse action has been taken against any license or
13 privilege to practice held by the applicant.

14 (4) Each member state shall require an applicant to obtain or
15 retain a license in the home state and meet the home state's
16 qualifications for licensure or renewal of licensure as well as all
17 other applicable state laws.

18 (5) An audiologist must:

19 (a) Meet one of the following educational requirements:

20 (i) On or before December 31, 2007, have graduated with a
21 master's degree or doctorate in audiology, or equivalent degree
22 regardless of degree name, from a program that is accredited by an
23 accrediting agency recognized by the council for higher education
24 accreditation, or its successor, or by the United States department
25 of education and operated by a college or university accredited by a
26 regional or national accrediting organization recognized by the
27 licensing board; or

28 (ii) On or after January 1, 2008, have graduated with a doctoral
29 degree in audiology, or equivalent degree, regardless of degree name,
30 from a program that is accredited by an accrediting agency recognized
31 by the council for higher education accreditation, or its successor,
32 or by the United States department of education and operated by a
33 college or university accredited by a regional or national
34 accrediting organization recognized by the licensing board; or

35 (iii) Have graduated from an audiology program that is housed in
36 an institution of higher education outside of the United States (A)
37 for which the program and institution have been approved by the
38 authorized accrediting body in the applicable country and (B) the
39 degree program has been verified by an independent credentials review
40 agency to be comparable to a state licensing board-approved program;

1 (b) Have completed a supervised clinical practicum experience
2 from an accredited educational institution or its cooperating
3 programs as required by the licensing board;

4 (c) Have successfully passed a national examination approved by
5 the commission;

6 (d) Hold an active, unencumbered license;

7 (e) Have not been convicted or found guilty, and has not entered
8 into an agreed disposition, of a felony related to the practice of
9 audiology, under applicable state or federal criminal law; and

10 (f) Have a valid United States social security or national
11 practitioner identification number.

12 (6) A speech-language pathologist must:

13 (a) Meet one of the following educational requirements:

14 (i) Have graduated with a master's degree from a speech-language
15 pathology program that is accredited by an organization recognized by
16 the United States department of education and operated by a college
17 or university accredited by a regional or national accrediting
18 organization recognized by the licensing board; or

19 (ii) Have graduated from a speech-language pathology program that
20 is housed in an institution of higher education outside of the United
21 States (A) for which the program and institution have been approved
22 by the authorized accrediting body in the applicable country and (B)
23 the degree program has been verified by an independent credentials
24 review agency to be comparable to a state licensing board-approved
25 program;

26 (b) Have completed a supervised clinical practicum experience
27 from an educational institution or its cooperating programs as
28 required by the commission;

29 (c) Have completed a supervised postgraduate professional
30 experience as required by the commission;

31 (d) Have successfully passed a national examination approved by
32 the commission;

33 (e) Hold an active, unencumbered license;

34 (f) Have not been convicted or found guilty, and has not entered
35 into an agreed disposition, of a felony related to the practice of
36 speech-language pathology, under applicable state or federal criminal
37 law;

38 (g) Have a valid United States social security or national
39 practitioner identification number.

1 (7) The privilege to practice is derived from the home state
2 license.

3 (8) An audiologist or speech-language pathologist practicing in a
4 member state must comply with the state practice laws of the state in
5 which the client is located at the time service is provided. The
6 practice of audiology and speech-language pathology shall include all
7 audiology and speech-language pathology practice as defined by the
8 state practice laws of the member state in which the client is
9 located. The practice of audiology and speech-language pathology in a
10 member state under a privilege to practice shall subject an
11 audiologist or speech-language pathologist to the jurisdiction of the
12 licensing board, the courts, and the laws of the member state in
13 which the client is located at the time service is provided.

14 (9) Individuals not residing in a member state shall continue to
15 be able to apply for a member state's single-state license as
16 provided under the laws of each member state. However, the single-
17 state license granted to these individuals shall not be recognized as
18 granting the privilege to practice audiology or speech-language
19 pathology in any other member state. Nothing in this compact shall
20 affect the requirements established by a member state for the
21 issuance of a single-state license.

22 (10) Member states may charge a fee for granting a compact
23 privilege.

24 (11) Member states must comply with the bylaws and rules and
25 regulations of the commission.

26 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 4.** (1) To exercise the compact privilege
27 under the terms and provisions of the compact, the audiologist or
28 speech-language pathologist shall:

29 (a) Hold an active license in the home state;

30 (b) Have no encumbrance on any state license;

31 (c) Be eligible for a compact privilege in any member state in
32 accordance with section 3 of this act;

33 (d) Have not had any adverse action against any license or
34 compact privilege within the previous two years from the date of
35 application;

36 (e) Notify the commission that the licensee is seeking the
37 compact privilege within a remote state or states;

38 (f) Pay any applicable fees, including any state fee, for the
39 compact privilege; and

1 (g) Report to the commission adverse action taken by any
2 nonmember state within thirty days from the date the adverse action
3 is taken.

4 (2) For the purposes of the compact privilege, an audiologist or
5 speech-language pathologist shall only hold one home state license at
6 a time.

7 (3) Except as provided in section 6 of this act, if an
8 audiologist or speech-language pathologist changes primary state of
9 residence by moving between two member states, the audiologist or
10 speech-language pathologist must apply for licensure in the new home
11 state, and the license issued by the prior home state shall be
12 deactivated in accordance with applicable rules adopted by the
13 commission.

14 (4) The audiologist or speech-language pathologist may apply for
15 licensure in advance of a change in primary state of residence.

16 (5) A license shall not be issued by the new home state until the
17 audiologist or speech-language pathologist provides satisfactory
18 evidence of a change in primary state of residence to the new home
19 state and satisfies all applicable requirements to obtain a license
20 from the new home state.

21 (6) If an audiologist or speech-language pathologist changes
22 primary state of residence by moving from a member state to a
23 nonmember state, the license issued by the prior home state shall
24 convert to a single-state license, valid only in the former home
25 state.

26 (7) The compact privilege is valid until the expiration date of
27 the home state license. The licensee must comply with the
28 requirements of subsection (1) of this section to maintain the
29 compact privilege in the remote state.

30 (8) A licensee providing audiology or speech-language pathology
31 services in a remote state under the compact privilege shall function
32 within the laws and regulations of the remote state.

33 (9) A licensee providing audiology or speech-language pathology
34 services in a remote state is subject to that state's regulatory
35 authority. A remote state may, in accordance with due process and
36 that state's laws, remove a licensee's compact privilege in the
37 remote state for a specific period of time, impose fines, or take any
38 other necessary actions to protect the health and safety of its
39 citizens.

1 (10) If a home state license is encumbered, the licensee shall
2 lose the compact privilege in any remote state until the following
3 occur:

4 (a) The home state license is no longer encumbered; and

5 (b) Two years have elapsed from the date of the adverse action.

6 (11) Once an encumbered license in the home state is restored to
7 good standing, the licensee must meet the requirements of subsection
8 (1) of this section to obtain a compact privilege in any remote
9 state.

10 (12) Once the requirements of subsection (10) of this section
11 have been met, the licensee must meet the requirements in subsection
12 (1) of this section to obtain a compact privilege in a remote state.

13 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 5.** Member states shall recognize the right of
14 an audiologist or speech-language pathologist, licensed by a home
15 state in accordance with section 3 of this act and under rules
16 promulgated by the commission, to practice audiology or speech-
17 language pathology in any member state via telehealth under a
18 privilege to practice as provided in the compact and rules
19 promulgated by the commission.

20 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 6.** Active duty military personnel, or their
21 spouse, shall designate a home state where the individual has a
22 current license in good standing. The individual may retain the home
23 state designation during the period the service member is on active
24 duty. Subsequent to designating a home state, the individual shall
25 only change their home state through application for licensure in the
26 new state.

27 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 7.** (1)(a) In addition to the other powers
28 conferred by state law, a remote state shall have the authority, in
29 accordance with existing state due process law, to:

30 (i) Take adverse action against an audiologist's or speech-
31 language pathologist's privilege to practice within that member
32 state;

33 (ii) Issue subpoenas for both hearings and investigations that
34 require the attendance and testimony of witnesses as well as the
35 production of evidence. Subpoenas issued by a licensing board in a
36 member state for the attendance and testimony of witnesses or the
37 production of evidence from another member state shall be enforced in

1 the latter state by any court of competent jurisdiction, according to
2 the practice and procedure of that court applicable to subpoenas
3 issued in proceedings pending before it. The issuing authority shall
4 pay any witness fees, travel expenses, mileage, and other fees
5 required by the service statutes of the state in which the witnesses
6 or evidence are located.

7 (b) Only the home state shall have the power to take adverse
8 action against an audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's
9 license issued by the home state.

10 (2) For purposes of taking adverse action, the home state shall
11 give the same priority and effect to reported conduct received from a
12 member state as it would if the conduct had occurred within the home
13 state. In so doing, the home state shall apply its own state laws to
14 determine appropriate action.

15 (3) The home state shall complete any pending investigations of
16 an audiologist or speech-language pathologist who changes primary
17 state of residence during the course of the investigations. The home
18 state shall also have the authority to take appropriate action and
19 shall promptly report the conclusions of the investigations to the
20 administrator of the data system. The administrator of the data
21 system shall promptly notify the new home state of any adverse
22 actions.

23 (4) If otherwise permitted by state law, the member state may
24 recover from the affected audiologist or speech-language pathologist
25 the costs of investigations and disposition of cases resulting from
26 any adverse action taken against that audiologist or speech-language
27 pathologist.

28 (5) The member state may take adverse action based on the factual
29 findings of the remote state, provided that the member state follows
30 the member state's own procedures for taking the adverse action.

31 (6) (a) In addition to the authority granted to a member state by
32 its respective audiology or speech-language pathology practice act or
33 other applicable state law, any member state may participate with
34 other member states in joint investigations of licensees.

35 (b) Member states shall share any investigative, litigation, or
36 compliance materials in furtherance of any joint or individual
37 investigation initiated under the compact.

38 (7) If adverse action is taken by the home state against an
39 audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's license, the
40 audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's privilege to practice

1 in all other member states shall be deactivated until all
2 encumbrances have been removed from the state license. All home state
3 disciplinary orders that impose adverse action against an
4 audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's license shall include
5 a statement that the audiologist's or speech-language pathologist's
6 privilege to practice is deactivated in all member states during the
7 pendency of the order.

8 (8) If a member state takes adverse action, it shall promptly
9 notify the administrator of the data system. The administrator of the
10 data system shall promptly notify the home state of any adverse
11 actions by remote states.

12 (9) Nothing in this compact shall override a member state's
13 decision that participation in an alternative program may be used in
14 lieu of adverse action.

15 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 8.** (1) The compact member states hereby
16 create and establish a joint public agency known as the audiology and
17 speech-language pathology compact commission:

18 (a) The commission is an instrumentality of the compact states.

19 (b) Venue is proper and judicial proceedings by or against the
20 commission shall be brought solely and exclusively in a court of
21 competent jurisdiction where the principal office of the commission
22 is located. The commission may waive venue and jurisdictional
23 defenses to the extent it adopts or consents to participate in
24 alternative dispute resolution proceedings.

25 (c) Nothing in this compact shall be construed to be a waiver of
26 sovereign immunity.

27 (2)(a) Each member state shall have two delegates selected by
28 that member state's licensing board. The delegates shall be current
29 members of the licensing board. One shall be an audiologist and one
30 shall be a speech-language pathologist.

31 (b) An additional five delegates, who are either a public member
32 or board administrator from a state licensing board, shall be chosen
33 by the executive committee from a pool of nominees provided by the
34 commission at large.

35 (c) Any delegate may be removed or suspended from office as
36 provided by the law of the state from which the delegate is
37 appointed.

38 (d) The member state licensing board shall fill any vacancy
39 occurring on the commission, within ninety days.

1 (e) Each delegate shall be entitled to one vote with regard to
2 the promulgation of rules and creation of bylaws and shall otherwise
3 have an opportunity to participate in the business and affairs of the
4 commission.

5 (f) A delegate shall vote in person or by other means as provided
6 in the bylaws. The bylaws may provide for delegates' participation in
7 meetings by telephone or other means of communication.

8 (g) The commission shall meet at least once during each calendar
9 year. Additional meetings shall be held as set forth in the bylaws.

10 (3) The commission shall have the following powers and duties:

11 (a) Establish the fiscal year of the commission;

12 (b) Establish bylaws;

13 (c) Establish a code of ethics;

14 (d) Maintain its financial records in accordance with the bylaws;

15 (e) Meet and take actions as are consistent with the provisions
16 of this compact and the bylaws;

17 (f) Promulgate uniform rules to facilitate and coordinate
18 implementation and administration of this compact. The rules shall
19 have the force and effect of law and shall be binding in all member
20 states;

21 (g) Bring and prosecute legal proceedings or actions in the name
22 of the commission, provided that the standing of any state audiology
23 or speech-language pathology licensing board to sue or be sued under
24 applicable law shall not be affected;

25 (h) Purchase and maintain insurance and bonds;

26 (i) Borrow, accept, or contract for services of personnel
27 including, but not limited to, employees of a member state;

28 (j) Hire employees, elect or appoint officers, fix compensation,
29 define duties, grant individuals appropriate authority to carry out
30 the purposes of the compact, and establish the commission's personnel
31 policies and programs relating to conflicts of interest,
32 qualifications of personnel, and other related personnel matters;

33 (k) Accept any and all appropriate donations and grants of money,
34 equipment, supplies, materials, and services, and to receive,
35 utilize, and dispose of the same; provided that at all times the
36 commission shall avoid any appearance of impropriety and/or conflict
37 of interest;

38 (l) Lease, purchase, accept appropriate gifts, or donations of,
39 or otherwise to own, hold, improve, or use, any property, real,

1 personal, or mixed; provided that at all times the commission shall
2 avoid any appearance of impropriety;

3 (m) Sell, convey, mortgage, pledge, lease, exchange, abandon, or
4 otherwise dispose of any property real, personal, or mixed;

5 (n) Establish a budget and make expenditures;

6 (o) Borrow money;

7 (p) Appoint committees, including standing committees composed of
8 members, and other interested persons as may be designated in this
9 compact and the bylaws;

10 (q) Provide and receive information from, and cooperate with, law
11 enforcement agencies;

12 (r) Establish and elect an executive committee; and

13 (s) Perform other functions as may be necessary or appropriate to
14 achieve the purposes of this compact consistent with the state
15 regulation of audiology and speech-language pathology licensure and
16 practice.

17 (4) The executive committee shall have the power to act on behalf
18 of the commission according to the terms of this compact.

19 (a)(i) The executive committee shall be composed of ten members:

20 (A) Seven voting members who are elected by the commission from
21 the current membership of the commission;

22 (B) Two ex officios, consisting of one nonvoting member from a
23 recognized national audiology professional association and one
24 nonvoting member from a recognized national speech-language pathology
25 association; and

26 (C) One ex officio, nonvoting member from the recognized
27 membership organization of the audiology and speech-language
28 pathology licensing boards.

29 (ii) The ex officio members shall be selected by their respective
30 organizations.

31 (b) The commission may remove any member of the executive
32 committee as provided in the bylaws.

33 (c) The executive committee shall meet at least annually.

34 (d) The executive committee shall have the following duties and
35 responsibilities:

36 (i) Recommend to the entire commission changes to the rules or
37 bylaws, changes to this compact legislation, fees paid by compact
38 member states such as annual dues, and any commission compact fee
39 charged to licensees for the compact privilege;

- 1 (ii) Ensure compact administration services are appropriately
2 provided, contractual or otherwise;
- 3 (iii) Prepare and recommend the budget;
- 4 (iv) Maintain financial records on behalf of the commission;
- 5 (v) Monitor compact compliance of member states and provide
6 compliance reports to the commission;
- 7 (vi) Establish additional committees as necessary; and
- 8 (vii) Other duties as provided in the rules or bylaws.

9 (5) All meetings shall be open to the public, and public notice
10 of meetings shall be given in the same manner as required under the
11 rule-making provisions in section 10 of this act.

12 (6) The commission or the executive committee or other committees
13 of the commission may convene in a closed, nonpublic meeting if the
14 commission or executive committee or other committees of the
15 commission must discuss:

16 (a) Noncompliance of a member state with its obligations under
17 the compact;

18 (b) The employment, compensation, discipline or other matters,
19 practices, or procedures related to specific employees or other
20 matters related to the commission's internal personnel practices and
21 procedures;

22 (c) Current, threatened, or reasonably anticipated litigation;

23 (d) Negotiation of contracts for the purchase, lease, or sale of
24 goods, services, or real estate;

25 (e) Accusing any person of a crime or formally censuring any
26 person;

27 (f) Disclosure of trade secrets or commercial or financial
28 information that is privileged or confidential;

29 (g) Disclosure of information of a personal nature where
30 disclosure would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of
31 personal privacy;

32 (h) Disclosure of investigative records compiled for law
33 enforcement purposes;

34 (i) Disclosure of information related to any investigative
35 reports prepared by or on behalf of or for use of the commission or
36 other committee charged with responsibility of investigation or
37 determination of compliance issues pursuant to the compact; or

38 (j) Matters specifically exempted from disclosure by federal or
39 member state statute.

1 (7) If a meeting, or portion of a meeting, is closed pursuant to
2 this provision, the commission's legal counsel or designee shall
3 certify that the meeting may be closed and shall reference each
4 relevant exempting provision.

5 (8) The commission shall keep minutes that fully and clearly
6 describe all matters discussed in a meeting and shall provide a full
7 and accurate summary of actions taken, and the reasons therefore,
8 including a description of the views expressed. All documents
9 considered in connection with an action shall be identified in
10 minutes. All minutes and documents of a closed meeting shall remain
11 under seal, subject to release by a majority vote of the commission
12 or order of a court of competent jurisdiction.

13 (9) (a) The commission shall pay, or provide for the payment of,
14 the reasonable expenses of its establishment, organization, and
15 ongoing activities.

16 (b) The commission may accept any and all appropriate revenue
17 sources, donations, and grants of money, equipment, supplies,
18 materials, and services.

19 (c) The commission may levy on and collect an annual assessment
20 from each member state or impose fees on other parties to cover the
21 cost of the operations and activities of the commission and its
22 staff, which must be in a total amount sufficient to cover its annual
23 budget as approved each year for which revenue is not provided by
24 other sources. The aggregate annual assessment amount shall be
25 allocated based upon a formula to be determined by the commission,
26 which shall promulgate a rule binding upon all member states.

27 (10) The commission shall not incur obligations of any kind prior
28 to securing the funds adequate to meet the same; nor shall the
29 commission pledge the credit of any of the member states, except by
30 and with the authority of the member state.

31 (11) The commission shall keep accurate accounts of all receipts
32 and disbursements. The receipts and disbursements of the commission
33 shall be subject to the audit and accounting procedures established
34 under its bylaws. However, all receipts and disbursements of funds
35 handled by the commission shall be audited yearly by a certified or
36 licensed public accountant, and the report of the audit shall be
37 included in and become part of the annual report of the commission.

38 (12) (a) The members, officers, executive director, employees, and
39 representatives of the commission shall be immune from suit and
40 liability, either personally or in their official capacity, for any

1 claim for damage to or loss of property or personal injury or other
2 civil liability caused by or arising out of any actual or alleged
3 act, error, or omission that occurred, or that the person against
4 whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for believing occurred
5 within the scope of commission employment, duties, or
6 responsibilities; provided that nothing in this subsection (12)(a)
7 shall be construed to protect any person from suit or liability for
8 any damage, loss, injury, or liability caused by the intentional or
9 willful or wanton misconduct of that person.

10 (b) The commission shall defend any member, officer, executive
11 director, employee, or representative of the commission in any civil
12 action seeking to impose liability arising out of any actual or
13 alleged act, error, or omission that occurred within the scope of
14 commission employment, duties, or responsibilities, or that the
15 person against whom the claim is made had a reasonable basis for
16 believing occurred within the scope of commission employment, duties,
17 or responsibilities; provided that nothing herein shall be construed
18 to prohibit that person from retaining his or her own counsel; and
19 provided further, that the actual or alleged act, error, or omission
20 did not result from that person's intentional or willful or wanton
21 misconduct.

22 (c) The commission shall indemnify and hold harmless any member,
23 officer, executive director, employee, or representative of the
24 commission for the amount of any settlement or judgment obtained
25 against that person arising out of any actual or alleged act, error,
26 or omission that occurred within the scope of commission employment,
27 duties, or responsibilities, or that person had a reasonable basis
28 for believing occurred within the scope of commission employment,
29 duties, or responsibilities, provided that the actual or alleged act,
30 error, or omission did not result from the intentional or willful or
31 wanton misconduct of that person.

32 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 9.** (1) The commission shall provide for the
33 development, maintenance, and use of a coordinated database and
34 reporting system containing licensure, adverse action, and
35 investigative information on all licensed individuals in member
36 states.

37 (2) Notwithstanding any other provision of state law to the
38 contrary, a member state shall submit a uniform data set to the data

1 system on all individuals to whom this compact is applicable as
2 required by the rules of the commission, including:

3 (a) Identifying information;

4 (b) Licensure data;

5 (c) Adverse actions against a license or compact privilege;

6 (d) Nonconfidential information related to alternative program
7 participation;

8 (e) Any denial of application for licensure, and the reason or
9 reasons for denial; and

10 (f) Other information that may facilitate the administration of
11 this compact, as determined by the rules of the commission.

12 (3) Investigative information pertaining to a licensee in any
13 member state shall only be available to other member states.

14 (4) The commission shall promptly notify all member states of any
15 adverse action taken against a licensee or an individual applying for
16 a license. Adverse action information pertaining to a licensee in any
17 member state shall be available to any other member state.

18 (5) Member states contributing information to the data system may
19 designate information that may not be shared with the public without
20 the express permission of the contributing state.

21 (6) Any information submitted to the data system that is
22 subsequently required to be expunged by the laws of the member state
23 contributing the information shall be removed from the data system.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 10.** (1) The commission shall exercise its
25 rule-making powers pursuant to the criteria set forth in this section
26 and the rules adopted thereunder. Rules and amendments shall become
27 binding as of the date specified in each rule or amendment.

28 (2) If a majority of the legislatures of the member states
29 rejects a rule, by enactment of a statute or resolution in the same
30 manner used to adopt the compact within four years of the date of
31 adoption of the rule, the rule shall have no further force and effect
32 in any member state.

33 (3) Rules or amendments to the rules shall be adopted at a
34 regular or special meeting of the commission.

35 (4) Prior to promulgation and adoption of a final rule or rules
36 by the commission, and at least thirty days in advance of the meeting
37 at which the rule shall be considered and voted upon, the commission
38 shall file a notice of proposed rule making:

1 (a) On the website of the commission or other publicly accessible
2 platform; and

3 (b) On the website of each member state audiology or speech-
4 language pathology licensing board or other publicly accessible
5 platform or the publication in which each state would otherwise
6 publish proposed rules.

7 (5) The notice of proposed rule making shall include:

8 (a) The proposed time, date, and location of the meeting in which
9 the rule shall be considered and voted upon;

10 (b) The text of the proposed rule or amendment and the reason for
11 the proposed rule;

12 (c) A request for comments on the proposed rule from any
13 interested person; and

14 (d) The manner in which interested persons may submit notice to
15 the commission of their intention to attend the public hearing and
16 any written comments.

17 (6) Prior to the adoption of a proposed rule, the commission
18 shall allow persons to submit written data, facts, opinions, and
19 arguments, which shall be made available to the public.

20 (7) The commission shall grant an opportunity for a public
21 hearing before it adopts a rule or amendment if a hearing is
22 requested by:

23 (a) At least twenty-five persons;

24 (b) A state or federal governmental subdivision or agency; or

25 (c) An association having at least twenty-five members.

26 (8) If a hearing is held on the proposed rule or amendment, the
27 commission shall publish the place, time, and date of the scheduled
28 public hearing. If the hearing is held via electronic means, the
29 commission shall publish the mechanism for access to the electronic
30 hearing.

31 (a) All persons wishing to be heard at the hearing shall notify
32 the executive director of the commission or other designated member
33 in writing of their desire to appear and testify at the hearing not
34 less than five business days before the scheduled date of the
35 hearing.

36 (b) Hearings shall be conducted in a manner providing each person
37 who wishes to comment a fair and reasonable opportunity to comment
38 orally or in writing.

39 (c) All hearings shall be recorded. A copy of the recording shall
40 be made available on request.

1 (d) Nothing in this section shall be construed as requiring a
2 separate hearing on each rule. Rules may be grouped for the
3 convenience of the commission at hearings required by this section.

4 (9) Following the scheduled hearing date, or by the close of
5 business on the scheduled hearing date if the hearing was not held,
6 the commission shall consider all written and oral comments received.

7 (10) If no written notice of intent to attend the public hearing
8 by interested parties is received, the commission may proceed with
9 promulgation of the proposed rule without a public hearing.

10 (11) The commission shall, by majority vote of all members, take
11 final action on the proposed rule and shall determine the effective
12 date of the rule, if any, based on the rule-making record and the
13 full text of the rule.

14 (12) Upon determination that an emergency exists, the commission
15 may consider and adopt an emergency rule without prior notice,
16 opportunity for comment, or hearing, provided that the usual rule-
17 making procedures provided in the compact and in this section shall
18 be retroactively applied to the rule as soon as reasonably possible,
19 in no event later than ninety days after the effective date of the
20 rule. For the purposes of this provision, an emergency rule is one
21 that must be adopted immediately in order to:

22 (a) Meet an imminent threat to public health, safety, or welfare;

23 (b) Prevent a loss of commission or member state funds; or

24 (c) Meet a deadline for the promulgation of an administrative
25 rule that is established by federal law or rule.

26 (13) The commission or an authorized committee of the commission
27 may direct revisions to a previously adopted rule or amendment for
28 purposes of correcting typographical errors, errors in format, errors
29 in consistency, or grammatical errors. Public notice of any revisions
30 shall be posted on the website of the commission. The revision shall
31 be subject to challenge by any person for a period of thirty days
32 after posting. The revision may be challenged only on grounds that
33 the revision results in a material change to a rule. A challenge
34 shall be made in writing and delivered to the chair of the commission
35 prior to the end of the notice period. If no challenge is made, the
36 revision shall take effect without further action. If the revision is
37 challenged, the revision may not take effect without the approval of
38 the commission.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 11.** (1)(a) Upon request by a member state,
2 the commission shall attempt to resolve disputes related to the
3 compact that arise among member states and between member and
4 nonmember states.

5 (b) The commission shall promulgate a rule providing for both
6 mediation and binding dispute resolution for disputes as appropriate.

7 (2)(a) The commission, in the reasonable exercise of its
8 discretion, shall enforce the provisions and rules of this compact.

9 (b) By majority vote, the commission may initiate legal action in
10 the United States district court for the District of Columbia or the
11 federal district where the commission has its principal offices
12 against a member state in default to enforce compliance with the
13 provisions of this compact and its promulgated rules and bylaws. The
14 relief sought may include both injunctive relief and damages. In the
15 event judicial enforcement is necessary, the prevailing member shall
16 be awarded all costs of litigation, including reasonable attorneys'
17 fees.

18 (c) The remedies herein shall not be the exclusive remedies of
19 the commission. The commission may pursue any other remedies
20 available under federal or state law.

21 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 12.** (1) The compact shall come into effect on
22 the date on which the compact statute is enacted into law in the
23 tenth member state. The provisions, which become effective at that
24 time, shall be limited to the powers granted to the commission
25 relating to assembly and the promulgation of rules. Thereafter, the
26 commission shall meet and exercise rule-making powers necessary to
27 the implementation and administration of this compact.

28 (2) Any state that joins this compact subsequent to the
29 commission's initial adoption of the rules shall be subject to the
30 rules as they exist on the date on which this compact becomes law in
31 that state. Any rule that has been previously adopted by the
32 commission shall have the full force and effect of law on the day the
33 compact becomes law in that state.

34 (3) Any member state may withdraw from this compact by enacting a
35 statute repealing the same.

36 (a) A member state's withdrawal shall not take effect until six
37 months after enactment of the repealing statute.

38 (b) Withdrawal shall not affect the continuing requirement of the
39 withdrawing state's audiology or speech-language pathology licensing

1 board to comply with the investigative and adverse action reporting
2 requirements of this act prior to the effective date of withdrawal.

3 (4) Nothing contained in this compact shall be construed to
4 invalidate or prevent any audiology or speech-language pathology
5 licensure agreement or other cooperative arrangement between a member
6 state and a nonmember state that does not conflict with the
7 provisions of this compact.

8 (5) This compact may be amended by the member states. No
9 amendment to this compact shall become effective and binding upon any
10 member state until it is enacted into the laws of all member states.

11 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 13.** This compact shall be liberally construed
12 so as to effectuate the purposes thereof. The provisions of this
13 compact shall be severable and if any phrase, clause, sentence, or
14 provision of this compact is declared to be contrary to the
15 constitution of any member state or of the United States or the
16 applicability thereof to any government, agency, person, or
17 circumstance is held invalid, the validity of the remainder of this
18 compact and the applicability thereof to any government, agency,
19 person, or circumstance shall not be affected thereby. If this
20 compact shall be held contrary to the constitution of any member
21 state, this compact shall remain in full force and effect as to the
22 remaining member states and in full force and effect as to the member
23 state affected as to all severable matters.

24 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 14.** (1) Nothing herein prevents the
25 enforcement of any other law of a member state that is not
26 inconsistent with this compact.

27 (2) All laws in a member state in conflict with this compact are
28 superseded to the extent of the conflict.

29 (3) All lawful actions of the commission, including all rules and
30 bylaws promulgated by the commission, are binding upon the member
31 states.

32 (4) All agreements between the commission and the member states
33 are binding in accordance with their terms.

34 (5) In the event any provision of this compact exceeds the
35 constitutional limits imposed on the legislature of any member state,
36 the provision shall be ineffective to the extent of the conflict with
37 the constitutional provision in question in that member state.

1 NEW SECTION. **Sec. 15.** Sections 1 through 14 of this act
2 constitute a new chapter in Title 18 RCW.
