1 AN ACT Relating to the use of toxic chemicals in cosmetic 2 products; amending RCW 43.21B.110 and 43.21B.300; adding a new 3 chapter to Title 70A RCW; and prescribing penalties.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that certain 6 chemicals used in cosmetic products are linked to harmful impacts on 7 health, such as cancer, birth defects, damage to the reproductive 8 system, organ system toxicity, and endocrine disruption. Many of 9 these chemicals have been identified by the state of Washington as 10 high priority chemicals of concern.

11 (2) In order to ensure the safety of cosmetic products and 12 protect Washington residents from toxic exposures, the legislature 13 intends to prohibit use of toxic chemicals found in cosmetic and 14 personal care products and join other jurisdictions in creating a 15 safer global standard for cosmetic products and bringing more 16 sustainable, safer ingredients to the marketplace.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. The definitions in this section apply 18 throughout this chapter unless the context clearly requires 19 otherwise.

1 (1) "Cosmetic product" has the same meaning as the term 2 "cosmetic" as defined in RCW 69.04.011.

3 (2) "Department" means the department of ecology.

4 (3) "Manufacturer" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 5 70A.350.010.

6 (4) "Ortho-phthalates" means esters of ortho-phthalic acid.

7 (5) "Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances" has the same 8 meaning as defined in RCW 70A.350.010.

9 (6) "Small business" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 10 70A.500.020.

11 (7) "Vulnerable populations" has the same meaning as defined in 12 RCW 70A.02.010.

13 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. (1) Except as provided in subsection (3) 14 of this section, beginning January 1, 2025, no person may 15 manufacture, knowingly sell, offer for sale, distribute for sale, or 16 distribute for use in this state any cosmetic product that contains 17 any of the following intentionally added chemicals or chemical 18 classes:

19 (a) Ortho-phthalates;

(b) Perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl substances;

(c) Formaldehyde (CAS 50-00-0) and chemicals determined by the department to release formaldehyde;

23 (d) Methylene glycol (CAS 463-57-0);

(f) Triclosan (CAS 3380-34-5);

24 (e) Mercury and mercury compounds (CAS 7439-97-6);

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26 (g) m-phenylenediamine and its salts (CAS 108-45-2); and

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(h) o-phenylenediamine and its salts (CAS 95-54-5).

(2) Except as provided in subsection (3) of this section, beginning January 1, 2025, no person may manufacture, knowingly sell, offer for sale, distribute for sale, or distribute for use in this state any cosmetic product that contains lead or lead compounds (CAS 7439-92-1) at one part per million (ppm) or above, or as otherwise determined by the department through rule making.

34 (3) An in-state retailer in possession of cosmetic products on 35 the date that restrictions on the sale of the products takes effect 36 under this section may exhaust its existing stock through sales to 37 the public until January 1, 2026.

(4) By June 1, 2024, the department, in consultation with thedepartment of health, must use existing information to identify and

assess the hazards of chemicals or chemical classes that can provide the same or similar function in cosmetic products as the chemicals or chemical classes listed in subsection (1) of this section and that can impact vulnerable populations. The department must make the information publicly available.

6 (5) (a) By May 2024, the department shall implement an initiative 7 to support small businesses that manufacture cosmetic products in efforts to obtain voluntary environmental health certifications for 8 cosmetics implemented by the United States environmental protection 9 agency or other programs, as determined by the department, that are 10 11 designed to identify cosmetic products that do not contain identified 12 hazards consistent with processes used to identify safer alternatives under chapter 70A.350 RCW. 13

14 (b) The program may include, but is not limited to, providing:

15 (i) Technical assistance and support;

16 (ii) Resources for chemical hazard assessments; and

17 (iii) Resources for reformulating products.

18 (6) For the purposes of this section, cosmetic products do not 19 include prescription drugs approved by the United States food and 20 drug administration.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. (1) The department may adopt rules as 22 necessary for the purpose of implementing, administering, and 23 enforcing this chapter.

(2) A manufacturer violating a requirement of this chapter, a rule adopted under this chapter, or an order issued under this chapter, is subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$5,000 for each violation in the case of a first offense. Manufacturers who are repeat violators are subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$10,000 for each repeat offense.

30 (3) Any penalty provided for in this section, and any order 31 issued by the department under this chapter, may be appealed to the 32 pollution control hearings board.

33 (4) All penalties collected under this chapter shall be deposited 34 in the model toxics control operating account created in RCW 35 70A.305.180.

36 Sec. 5. RCW 43.21B.110 and 2022 c 180 s 812 are each amended to 37 read as follows: 1 (1) The hearings board shall only have jurisdiction to hear and 2 decide appeals from the following decisions of the department, the 3 director, local conservation districts, the air pollution control 4 boards or authorities as established pursuant to chapter 70A.15 RCW, 5 local health departments, the department of natural resources, the 6 department of fish and wildlife, the parks and recreation commission, 7 and authorized public entities described in chapter 79.100 RCW:

8 (a) Civil penalties imposed pursuant to RCW 18.104.155, 9 70A.15.3160, 70A.300.090, 70A.20.050, 70A.530.040, 70A.350.070, 10 70A.515.060, 70A.245.040, 70A.245.050, 70A.245.070, 70A.245.080, 11 70A.65.200, 70A.455.090, <u>section 3 of this act</u>, 76.09.170, 77.55.440, 12 78.44.250, 88.46.090, 90.03.600, 90.46.270, 90.48.144, 90.56.310, 13 90.56.330, and 90.64.102.

(b) Orders issued pursuant to RCW 18.104.043, 18.104.060,
43.27A.190, 70A.15.2520, 70A.15.3010, 70A.300.120, 70A.350.070,
70A.245.020, 70A.65.200, <u>section 3 of this act</u>, 86.16.020, 88.46.070,
90.14.130, 90.46.250, 90.48.120, and 90.56.330.

(c) Except as provided in RCW 90.03.210(2), the issuance, 18 modification, or termination of any permit, certificate, or license 19 by the department or any air authority in the exercise of its 20 21 jurisdiction, including the issuance or termination of a waste 22 disposal permit, the denial of an application for a waste disposal permit, the modification of the conditions or the terms of a waste 23 disposal permit, or a decision to approve or deny an application for 24 25 a solid waste permit exemption under RCW 70A.205.260.

26 (d) Decisions of local health departments regarding the grant or27 denial of solid waste permits pursuant to chapter 70A.205 RCW.

(e) Decisions of local health departments regarding the issuance and enforcement of permits to use or dispose of biosolids under RCW 70A.226.090.

31 (f) Decisions of the department regarding waste-derived 32 fertilizer or micronutrient fertilizer under RCW 15.54.820, and 33 decisions of the department regarding waste-derived soil amendments 34 under RCW 70A.205.145.

35 (g) Decisions of local conservation districts related to the 36 denial of approval or denial of certification of a dairy nutrient 37 management plan; conditions contained in a plan; application of any 38 dairy nutrient management practices, standards, methods, and 39 technologies to a particular dairy farm; and failure to adhere to the 40 plan review and approval timelines in RCW 90.64.026.

1 (h) Any other decision by the department or an air authority 2 which pursuant to law must be decided as an adjudicative proceeding 3 under chapter 34.05 RCW.

4 (i) Decisions of the department of natural resources, the 5 department of fish and wildlife, and the department that are 6 reviewable under chapter 76.09 RCW, and the department of natural 7 resources' appeals of county, city, or town objections under RCW 8 76.09.050(7).

9 (j) Forest health hazard orders issued by the commissioner of 10 public lands under RCW 76.06.180.

(k) Decisions of the department of fish and wildlife to issue, deny, condition, or modify a hydraulic project approval permit under chapter 77.55 RCW, to issue a stop work order, to issue a notice to comply, to issue a civil penalty, or to issue a notice of intent to disapprove applications.

16 (1) Decisions of the department of natural resources that are 17 reviewable under RCW 78.44.270.

(m) Decisions of an authorized public entity under RCW 79.100.010 to take temporary possession or custody of a vessel or to contest the amount of reimbursement owed that are reviewable by the hearings board under RCW 79.100.120.

(n) Decisions of the department of ecology that are appealable under RCW 70A.245.020 to set recycled minimum postconsumer content for covered products or to temporarily exclude types of covered products in plastic containers from minimum postconsumer recycled content requirements.

27 (o) Orders by the department of ecology under RCW 70A.455.080.

(2) The following hearings shall not be conducted by the hearingsboard:

30 (a) Hearings required by law to be conducted by the shorelines31 hearings board pursuant to chapter 90.58 RCW.

32 (b) Hearings conducted by the department pursuant to RCW 33 70A.15.3010, 70A.15.3070, 70A.15.3080, 70A.15.3090, 70A.15.3100, 34 70A.15.3110, and 90.44.180.

35 (c) Appeals of decisions by the department under RCW 90.03.110 36 and 90.44.220.

37 (d) Hearings conducted by the department to adopt, modify, or 38 repeal rules.

1 (3) Review of rules and regulations adopted by the hearings board 2 shall be subject to review in accordance with the provisions of the 3 administrative procedure act, chapter 34.05 RCW.

4 Sec. 6. RCW 43.21B.300 and 2022 c 180 s 813 are each amended to 5 read as follows:

(1) Any civil penalty provided in RCW 18.104.155, 70A.15.3160, 6 70A.205.280, 70A.300.090, 70A.20.050, 70A.245.040, 70A.245.050, 7 70A.245.070, 70A.245.080, 70A.65.200, 70A.455.090, section 3 of this 8 <u>act,</u> 88.46.090, 90.03.600, 90.46.270, 90.48.144, 90.56.310, 9 90.56.330, and 90.64.102 and chapter 70A.355 RCW shall be imposed by 10 a notice in writing, either by certified mail with return receipt 11 requested or by personal service, to the person incurring the penalty 12 from the department or the local air authority, describing the 13 violation with reasonable particularity. For penalties issued by 14 15 local air authorities, within 30 days after the notice is received, 16 the person incurring the penalty may apply in writing to the authority for the remission or mitigation of the penalty. Upon 17 receipt of the application, the authority may remit or mitigate the 18 penalty upon whatever terms the authority in its discretion deems 19 20 proper. The authority may ascertain the facts regarding all such 21 applications in such reasonable manner and under such rules as it may deem proper and shall remit or mitigate the penalty only upon a 22 demonstration of extraordinary circumstances such as the presence of 23 24 information or factors not considered in setting the original 25 penalty.

(2) Any penalty imposed under this section may be appealed to the pollution control hearings board in accordance with this chapter if the appeal is filed with the hearings board and served on the department or authority 30 days after the date of receipt by the person penalized of the notice imposing the penalty or 30 days after the date of receipt of the notice of disposition by a local air authority of the application for relief from penalty.

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(3) A penalty shall become due and payable on the later of:

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(a) Thirty days after receipt of the notice imposing the penalty;

35 (b) Thirty days after receipt of the notice of disposition by a 36 local air authority on application for relief from penalty, if such 37 an application is made; or

38 (c) Thirty days after receipt of the notice of decision of the39 hearings board if the penalty is appealed.

1 (4) If the amount of any penalty is not paid to the department 2 within 30 days after it becomes due and payable, the attorney general, upon request of the department, shall bring an action in the 3 name of the state of Washington in the superior court of Thurston 4 county, or of any county in which the violator does business, to 5 6 recover the penalty. If the amount of the penalty is not paid to the 7 authority within 30 days after it becomes due and payable, the authority may bring an action to recover the penalty in the superior 8 9 court of the county of the authority's main office or of any county in which the violator does business. In these actions, the procedures 10 11 and rules of evidence shall be the same as in an ordinary civil 12 action.

13 (5) All penalties recovered shall be paid into the state treasury 14 and credited to the general fund except those penalties imposed pursuant to RCW 18.104.155, which shall be credited to the 15 16 reclamation account as provided in RCW 18.104.155(7), RCW 17 70A.15.3160, the disposition of which shall be governed by that provision, RCW 70A.245.040 and 70A.245.050, which shall be credited 18 to the recycling enhancement account created in RCW 70A.245.100, RCW 19 20 70A.300.090 and section 3 of this act, which shall be credited to the 21 model toxics control operating account created in RCW 70A.305.180, 22 RCW 70A.65.200, which shall be credited to the climate investment account created in RCW 70A.65.250, RCW 90.56.330, which shall be 23 credited to the coastal protection fund created by RCW 90.48.390, and 24 25 RCW 70A.355.070, which shall be credited to the underground storage tank account created by RCW 70A.355.090. 26

27 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. This chapter may be known and cited as the 28 toxic-free cosmetics act.

29 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. Sections 1 through 4 and 7 of this act 30 constitute a new chapter in Title 70A RCW.

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
