AN ACT Relating to individuals with developmental disabilities that have also received child welfare services; and amending RCW 3.88C.010, 43.88.058, 71A.24.005, 71A.24.010, and 71A.12.370.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 43.88C.010 and 2022 c 219 s 2 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) The caseload forecast council is hereby created. The council 8 shall consist of two individuals appointed by the governor and four 9 individuals, one of whom is appointed by the chairperson of each of 10 the two largest political caucuses in the senate and house of 11 representatives. The chair of the council shall be selected from 12 among the four caucus appointees. The council may select such other 13 officers as the members deem necessary.

14 (2) The council shall employ a caseload forecast supervisor to
 15 supervise the preparation of all caseload forecasts. As used in this
 16 chapter, "supervisor" means the caseload forecast supervisor.

(3) Approval by an affirmative vote of at least five members of the council is required for any decisions regarding employment of the supervisor. Employment of the supervisor shall terminate after each term of three years. At the end of the first year of each three-year term the council shall consider extension of the supervisor's term by one year. The council may fix the compensation of the supervisor. The supervisor shall employ staff sufficient to accomplish the purposes of this section.

4 (4) The caseload forecast council shall oversee the preparation 5 of and approve, by an affirmative vote of at least four members, the 6 official state caseload forecasts prepared under RCW 43.88C.020. If 7 the council is unable to approve a forecast before a date required in 8 RCW 43.88C.020, the supervisor shall submit the forecast without 9 approval and the forecast shall have the same effect as if approved 10 by the council.

11 (5) A councilmember who does not cast an affirmative vote for 12 approval of the official caseload forecast may request, and the 13 supervisor shall provide, an alternative forecast based on 14 assumptions specified by the member.

(6) Members of the caseload forecast council shall serve without additional compensation but shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120 while attending sessions of the council or on official business authorized by the council. Nonlegislative members of the council shall be reimbursed for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 43.03.050 and 43.03.060.

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(7) "Caseload," as used in this chapter, means:

(a) The number of persons expected to meet entitlement requirements and require the services of public assistance programs, state correctional institutions, state correctional noninstitutional supervision, state institutions for juvenile offenders, the common school system, long-term care, medical assistance, foster care, and adoption support;

(b) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington
 college bound scholarship program and are expected to attend an
 institution of higher education as defined in RCW 28B.92.030;

31 (c) The number of students who are eligible for the Washington 32 college grant program under RCW 28B.92.200 and 28B.92.205 and are 33 expected to attend an institution of higher education as defined in 34 RCW 28B.92.030; and

(d) The number of children who are eligible, as defined in RCW
 43.216.505, to participate in, and the number of children actually
 served by, the early childhood education and assistance program.

38 (8) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the temporary 39 assistance for needy families and the working connections child care 40 programs as a courtesy. 1 (9) By January 1, 2023, the caseload forecast council shall 2 present the number of individuals who are assessed as eligible for 3 and have requested a service through the individual and family 4 services waiver and the basic plus waiver administered by the 5 developmental disabilities administration as a courtesy. The caseload 6 forecast council shall be presented with the service request list as 7 defined in RCW 71A.10.020 to aid in development of this information.

(10) Beginning with the official forecast submitted in November 8 2022 and subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 9 specific purpose, the caseload forecast council shall forecast the 10 number of individuals who are assessed as eligible for and have 11 12 requested supported living services, a service through the core waiver, an individual and family services waiver, and the basic plus 13 14 waiver administered by the developmental disabilities administration as a courtesy. The caseload forecast council shall be presented with 15 16 the service request list as defined in RCW 71A.10.020 to aid in 17 development of this information.

18 (11) As a courtesy, beginning with the official forecast 19 submitted in November 2022, the caseload forecast council shall 20 forecast the number of individuals who are expected to reside in 21 state-operated living alternatives administered by the developmental 22 disabilities administration.

(12) The caseload forecast council shall forecast youth participating in the extended foster care program pursuant to RCW 74.13.031 separately from other children who are residing in foster care and who are under eighteen years of age.

(13) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the number of youth expected to receive behavioral rehabilitation services while involved in the foster care system and the number of screened in reports of child abuse or neglect.

31 (14) The caseload forecast council shall forecast the number of 32 individuals who are functionally and financially eligible for 33 medicaid waiver services administered by the developmental 34 disabilities administration who also:

35 (a) Are subject to a dependency proceeding under chapter 13.34
36 <u>RCW;</u>

37 (b) Are receiving extended foster care services as defined in RCW 38 74.13.020; or

1 (c) Exited a dependency proceeding under chapter 13.34 RCW or discontinued extended foster care services as defined in 2 RCW 3 74.13.020. (15) Unless the context clearly requires otherwise, 4 the definitions provided in RCW 43.88.020 apply to this chapter. 5 6 (((15))) (16) During the 2021-2023 fiscal biennium, and beginning with the November 2021 forecast, the caseload forecast council shall 7 produce an unofficial forecast of the long-term caseload for juvenile 8 rehabilitation as a courtesy. 9

10 Sec. 2. RCW 43.88.058 and 2021 c 334 s 1904 are each amended to 11 read as follows:

For the purposes of this chapter, expenditures for the following ((foster care, adoption support and related services, and child protective)) services must be forecasted and budgeted as maintenance level costs:

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(1) Behavioral rehabilitation services placements;

17 (2) Social worker and related staff to receive, refer, and 18 respond to screened-in reports of child abuse or neglect((, except in 19 fiscal year 2021));

20 (3) Court-ordered parent-child and sibling visitations delivered 21 by contractors; ((and))

22 (4) Those activities currently being treated as maintenance level costs for budgeting or forecasting purposes on June 7, 2018, 23 24 including, but not limited to: (a) Adoption support and other adoption-related expenses; (b) foster care maintenance payments; (c) 25 child-placing agency management fees; (d) support goods such as 26 27 clothing vouchers; (e) child aides; and (f) child care for children in foster or relative placements when the caregiver is at work or in 28 29 school; and

30 (5) Developmental disability waiver slots as required under RCW 31 <u>71A.12.370</u>.

32 Sec. 3. RCW 71A.24.005 and 2009 c 194 s 1 are each amended to 33 read as follows:

34 <u>(1)</u> The legislature recognizes that the number of children who 35 have developmental disabilities along with intense behaviors is 36 increasing, and more families are seeking out-of-home placement for 37 their children. 1 (2) The legislature intends to create services and to develop 2 supports for these children, family members, and others involved in 3 the children's lives to avoid disruption to families ((and 4 eliminate)), help prevent the need for out-of-home placement, and 5 supplement the child welfare services a child may be receiving from 6 the department of children, youth, and families.

7 <u>(3)</u> The legislature directs the department to maintain a federal 8 waiver through which services may be provided to allow children with 9 developmental disabilities and intense behaviors to maintain 10 permanent and stable familial relationships. The legislature intends 11 for these services to be locally based and offered as early as 12 possible to avoid family disruption and out-of-home placement, but 13 also offered to children in out-of-home placement when necessary.

14 Sec. 4. RCW 71A.24.010 and 2009 c 194 s 2 are each amended to 15 read as follows:

16 (1) To the extent funding is appropriated for this purpose, 17 intensive behavior support services may be provided by the 18 department, directly or by contract, to children who have 19 developmental disabilities and intense behaviors and to their 20 families.

(2) The department shall be the lead administrative agency for
 children's intensive behavior support services and shall:

(a) Collaborate with appropriate parties to develop and implement
 the intensive in-home support services program within the division of
 developmental disabilities;

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(b) Use best practices and evidence-based practices;

27 (c) Provide coordination and planning for the implementation and 28 expansion of intensive in-home services;

29 (d) Contract for the provision of intensive in-home and planned 30 out-of-home services;

31 (e) Monitor and evaluate services to determine whether the 32 program meets standards identified in the service contracts;

33 (f) Collect data regarding the number of families served, and 34 costs and outcomes of the program;

35 (g) Adopt appropriate rules to implement the program;

36 (h) License out-of-home respite placements on a timely basis; and

(i) Maintain an appropriate staff-to-client ratio.

(3) A child may receive intensive behavior support services whenthe department has determined that:

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- (a) The child is under the age of twenty-one;

2 (b) The child has a developmental disability and has been 3 determined eligible for these services;

4 (c) The child/family acuity scores are high enough in the 5 assessment conducted by the division of developmental disabilities to 6 indicate the child's behavior puts the child or family at significant 7 risk or is very likely to require an out-of-home placement;

8 (d) The child meets eligibility for the home and community-based 9 care waiver;

10 (e) The child resides in his or her family home or is 11 ((temporarily)) in an out-of-home placement ((with a plan to return 12 home)); and

(f) The family agrees to participate in the program and complete the care and support steps outlined in the completed individual support plan((; and

16 (g) The family is not subject to an unresolved child protective
17 services referral)).

18 Sec. 5. RCW 71A.12.370 and 2021 c 56 s 4 are each amended to 19 read as follows:

((When there is funded capacity for services)) Services provided through a medicaid waiver administered by the department, ((and)) to the extent consistent with federal law and federal funding requirements, ((priority for that waiver)) shall be provided to eligible individuals who ((exited)) meet any of the following characteristics:

26 <u>(1) Are subject to a dependency proceeding under chapter 13.34</u>
27 <u>RCW;</u>

28 (2) Are receiving extended foster care services as defined in RCW 29 74.13.020; or

30 <u>(3) Exited</u> a dependency proceeding under chapter 13.34 RCW 31 ((within the last two years)) or discontinued extended foster care 32 services as defined in RCW 74.13.020.

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
