HOUSE BILL 1594

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2023 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to allowing certain types of maintenance 2 experience to substitute for work experience required to be eligible 3 to take the examination for the residential maintenance specialty 4 electrician certificate; and amending RCW 19.28.191.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 19.28.191 and 2020 c 153 s 26 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 (1) Upon receipt of the application, the department shall review 9 the application and determine whether the applicant is eligible to 10 take an examination for the master journey level electrician, journey 11 level electrician, master specialty electrician, or specialty 12 electrician certificate of competency.

(a) To be eligible to take the examination for a master journey level electrician certificate of competency, the applicant must have possessed a valid journey level electrician certificate of competency for four years.

(b) To be eligible to take the examination for a master specialty electrician certificate of competency, the applicant must have possessed a valid specialty electrician certificate of competency, in the specialty applied for, for two years.

1 (c) To be eligible to take the examination for a journey level certificate of competency, the applicant must have successfully 2 completed an apprenticeship program approved under chapter 49.04 RCW 3 or equivalent apprenticeship program approved by the department for 4 the electrical construction trade in which the applicant worked in 5 6 the electrical construction trade for a minimum of eight thousand hours. Four thousand of the hours shall be in industrial or 7 commercial electrical installation under the supervision of a master 8 journey level electrician or journey level electrician and not more 9 than a total of four thousand hours in all specialties under the 10 supervision of a master journey level electrician, journey level 11 12 electrician, master specialty electrician working in that electrician's specialty, or specialty electrician working in that 13 electrician's specialty. Specialty electricians with less than a four 14 thousand hour work experience requirement cannot credit the time 15 16 required to obtain that specialty towards qualifying to become a 17 journey level electrician. The holder of a specialty electrician certificate of competency with a four thousand hour work experience 18 requirement shall be allowed to credit the work experience required 19 to obtain that certificate towards apprenticeship requirements for 20 21 qualifying to take the examination for a journey level electrician 22 certificate of competency.

(d) To be eligible to take the examination for a specialty
electrician certificate of competency, the applicant must have:

25 (i) Worked in the residential (as specified in WAC 296-46B-920(2)(a)), pump and irrigation (as specified in 26 WAC 27 296-46B-920(2)(b)), sign (as specified in WAC 296-46B-920(2)(d)), 28 limited energy (as specified in WAC 296-46B-920(2)(e)), nonresidential maintenance (as specified in WAC 296-46B-920(2)(q)), 29 or other new nonresidential specialties as determined by the 30 31 department in rule under the supervision of a master journey level 32 electrician, journey level electrician, master specialty electrician working in that electrician's specialty, or specialty electrician 33 working in that electrician's specialty for a minimum of four 34 thousand hours; 35

36 (ii) Worked in the appliance repair specialty as determined by 37 the department in rule, restricted nonresidential maintenance as 38 determined by the department in rule, the equipment repair specialty 39 as determined by the department in rule, the pump and irrigation 40 specialty other than as defined by (d)(i) of this subsection or

1 domestic pump specialty as determined by the department in rule, or a specialty other than the designated specialties in (d)(i) of this 2 subsection for a minimum of the initial ninety days, or longer if set 3 by rule by the department. The restricted nonresidential maintenance 4 specialty is limited to a maximum of 277 volts and 20 amperes for 5 6 lighting branch circuits and/or a maximum of 250 volts and 60 amperes for other circuits excluding the replacement or repair of circuit 7 breakers. The department may alter the scope of work for the 8 restricted nonresidential maintenance specialty by rule. The initial 9 period must be spent under one hundred percent supervision of a 10 11 master journey level electrician, journey level electrician, master specialty electrician working in that electrician's specialty, or 12 specialty electrician working in that electrician's specialty. After 13 14 this initial period, a person may take the specialty examination. 15 However, an applicant seeking to take the specialty examination for residential maintenance (as specified in WAC 296-46B-920(2)(i)) may 16 substitute four years of direct maintenance experience in property 17 management for the initial period of 100 percent supervised work that 18 is required before being eligible to take the examination. The 19 applicant must provide proof to the department with a notarized 20 21 verification letter documenting the work experience the applicant has 22 accrued in direct maintenance experience in property management. If 23 the person passes the examination, the person may work unsupervised for the balance of the minimum hours required for certification. A 24 25 person may not be certified as a specialty electrician in the appliance repair specialty or in a specialty other than the 26 designated specialties in (d)(i) of this subsection, however, until 27 28 the person has worked a minimum of two thousand hours in that 29 specialty, or longer if set by rule by the department;

30 (iii) Successfully completed an approved apprenticeship program 31 under chapter 49.04 RCW for the applicant's specialty in the 32 electrical construction trade; or

(iv) In meeting the training requirements for the pump and 33 irrigation or domestic pump specialties, the individual shall be 34 allowed to obtain the experience required by this section at the same 35 36 time the individual is meeting the experience required by RCW 18.106.040(1)(d). After meeting the training requirements provided in 37 this section, the individual may take the examination and upon 38 39 passing the examination, meeting additional training requirements as 40 may still be required for those seeking a pump and irrigation, or a

1 domestic pump specialty certificate as defined by rule, and paying the applicable fees, the individual must be issued the appropriate 2 certificate. The department may include an examination for specialty 3 plumbing certificate defined in RCW 18.106.010(14)(c) with the 4 examination required by this section. The department, by rule and in 5 6 consultation with the electrical board, may establish additional 7 equivalent ways to gain the experience requirements required by this subsection. The department shall establish a single document for 8 those who have received both an electrical specialty certification as 9 10 defined by this subsection and have also met the certification 11 requirements for the specialty plumber as defined bv RCW 12 18.106.010(14)(c), showing that the individual has received both certifications. No other experience or training requirements may be 13 14 imposed.

15 (e) Any applicant for a journey level electrician certificate of 16 competency who has successfully completed a two-year program in the 17 electrical construction trade at public community or technical colleges, or not-for-profit nationally accredited technical or trade 18 19 schools licensed by the workforce training and education coordinating board under chapter 28C.10 RCW, may substitute up to two years of the 20 21 technical or trade school program for two years of work experience under a master journey level electrician or journey level electrician 22 23 required under the apprenticeship program. The applicant shall obtain the additional two years of work experience required in industrial or 24 25 commercial electrical installation prior to the beginning, or after 26 the completion, of the technical school program. Any applicant who 27 has received training in the electrical construction trade in the 28 armed service of the United States may be eligible to apply armed 29 service work experience towards qualification to complete an apprenticeship and take the examination for the journey level 30 31 electrician certificate of competency.

32 (f) An applicant for a specialty electrician certificate of competency who, after January 1, 2000, has successfully completed a 33 two-year program in the electrical construction trade at a public 34 community or technical college, or a not-for-profit nationally 35 accredited technical or trade school licensed by the workforce 36 training and education coordinating board under chapter 28C.10 RCW, 37 may substitute up to one year of the technical or trade school 38 39 program for one year of work experience under a master journey level 40 electrician, journey level electrician, master specialty electrician

working in that electrician's specialty, or specialty electrician working in that electrician's specialty. Any applicant who has received training in the electrical construction trade in the armed services of the United States may be eligible to apply armed service work experience towards qualification to take the examination for an appropriate specialty electrician certificate of competency.

7 (g) The department must determine whether hours of training and 8 experience in the armed services or school program are in the 9 electrical construction trade and appropriate as a substitute for 10 hours of work experience. The department must use the following 11 criteria for evaluating the equivalence of classroom electrical 12 training programs and work in the electrical construction trade:

13 (i) A two-year electrical training program must consist of three 14 thousand or more hours.

(ii) In a two-year electrical training program, a minimum of two thousand four hundred hours of student/instructor contact time must be technical electrical instruction directly related to the scope of work of the electrical specialty. Student/instructor contact time includes lecture and in-school lab.

20 (iii) The department may not allow credit for a program that 21 accepts more than one thousand hours transferred from another 22 school's program.

(iv) Electrical specialty training school programs of less than two years will have all of the above student/instructor contact time hours proportionately reduced. Such programs may not apply to more than fifty percent of the work experience required to attain certification.

(v) Electrical training programs of less than two years may not be credited towards qualification for journey level electrician unless the training program is used to gain qualification for a four thousand hour electrical specialty.

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(h) No other requirement for eligibility may be imposed.

(2) The department shall establish reasonable rules for the examinations to be given applicants for certificates of competency. In establishing the rules, the department shall consult with the board. Upon determination that the applicant is eligible to take the examination, the department shall so notify the applicant, indicating instructions for taking the examination.

39 (3) No noncertified individual may work unsupervised more than40 one year beyond the date when the trainee would be eligible to test

1 for a certificate of competency if working on a full-time basis after 2 original application for the trainee certificate. For the purposes of 3 this section, "full-time basis" means two thousand hours.

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
