AN ACT Relating to small districts with less than 2,750 students and significant participation in skill centers; and amending RCW 28A.245.020.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.245.020 and 2019 c 197 s 1 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 (1) ((Beginning in the 2007-08 school year and thereafter, students)) Students attending skill centers shall be funded for all 8 classes at the skill center and the sending districts, up to ((one 9 10 and six-tenths)) 1.6 full-time equivalents or as determined in the 11 omnibus operating appropriations act. The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall develop procedures 12 to 13 implement this subsection, including:

14 <u>(a) Procedures</u> to ensure that the ((school)) sending district and 15 the skill center report no student for more than ((one and six-16 tenths)) <u>1.6</u> full-time equivalent students combining both their high 17 school enrollment and skill center enrollment((. Additionally, the 18 office of the superintendent of public instruction shall develop 19 procedures));

1 (b) Procedures for determining the appropriate share of the fulltime equivalent enrollment count between the ((resident high school)) 2 3 sending district and skill center; (c) Procedures for funding students for 1.0 full-time equivalent 4 at the sending district if all the criteria in (c)(i) through (v) of 5 6 this subsection are met: (i) The total headcount enrollment of the sending district is 7 fewer than 2,750 students; 8 9 (ii) At least 10 percent of the sending district's combined 11th and 12th grade student headcount is enrolled at the skill center; 10 (iii) The student is enrolled for at least 0.5 full-time 11 equivalents at the sending district prior to any enhancement under 12 13 this subsection; 14 (iv) The student is enrolled for at least 0.5 full-time equivalents at the skill center; and 15 16 (v) The sending district is a member of the administrative 17 council governing the skill center. 18 (2) (a) A rural satellite skill center must report direct enrollment and receive direct funding if it meets the following 19 20 criteria: (i) The center is located at least $((\frac{\text{thirty}}{)})$ <u>30</u> miles from a 21 22 core campus or other satellite program and enrolls students from a 23 minimum of two school districts; 24 (ii) The center is solely responsible for hiring staff and 25 covering all staffing costs; (iii) The center is solely responsible for providing facilities, 26 equipment, materials, supplies, and training; 27 28 (iv) The center has demonstrated the ability to build successful 29 community and local business partnerships; (v) The center has been operational and has secured agreements 30 31 for at least one year with two or more rural districts in the area to 32 accept and enroll students in the center, has completed the required 33 feasibility study, and has secured commitments from local businesses or industries; 34 (vi) The career and technical education advisory committee and 35 36 the local school district board of directors recommend and support the direct funding; and 37 (vii) The center shares liability of all reviews for the purposes 38 39 of auditing and the consolidated program review including state and 40 federal monitoring of the career and technical education programs.

1 (b) A core campus skill center may receive, for administrative 2 purposes, up to seven percent of the funding provided to a partnered 3 rural satellite skill center under (a) of this subsection.

4 (c) A core campus skill center may charge the annually required 5 per-pupil facility fee consistent with RCW 28A.245.100 related to 6 minor repair and maintenance capital accounts as negotiated in the 7 interdistrict cooperative agreement.

8 (3) For the purposes of this section, "rural," consistent with 9 the definition in the small, rural school achievement program and the 10 rural education achievement program eligibility criteria, means:

(a) A local education agency that serves only schools that have a national center for education statistics school locale code of ((forty-one, forty-two, or forty-three)) <u>41, 42, or 43</u>; or

(b) A local education agency that is located entirely within counties with a population density less than ((one hundred)) <u>100</u> persons per square mile or counties smaller than ((two hundred twenty-five)) <u>225</u> square miles as determined and published by the office of financial management each year for the period of July 1st to June 30th.
