## HOUSE BILL 1664

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2023 Regular Session

By Representatives Goehner and Barnard

1 AN ACT Relating to ensuring rural representation on the 2 environmental justice council; amending RCW 70A.02.110; adding a new 3 section to chapter 70A.02 RCW; creating a new section; providing an 4 expiration date; and declaring an emergency.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that the duties of the environmental justice council include making recommendations on 7 the distribution of billions of dollars of state revenue and 8 oversight of agency programs and projects that relate to improved 9 10 environmental outcomes for overburdened communities and vulnerable populations. The legislature finds that 30 of 39 Washington counties 11 12 are designated as rural counties under state law and that poverty rates are higher in rural counties than urban counties. Ensuring 13 rural representation is important because environmental burdens are 14 15 not limited to urban areas, and in fact many of the most highly 16 impacted communities in the state, using the department of health's 17 map at least for purposes of the clean energy transformation act, are 18 in rural counties. The legislature intends counties to improve the 19 representation of Washington's people on the environmental justice 20 council by requiring that at least one-half of the council's 21 membership reside in rural counties.

1 Sec. 2. RCW 70A.02.110 and 2022 c 181 s 15 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 (1) The environmental justice council is established to advise
4 covered agencies on incorporating environmental justice into agency
5 activities.

6 (2) The council consists of 14 members, except as provided in RCW 7 70A.65.040(3), appointed by the governor. The councilmembers must be persons who are well-informed regarding and committed to the 8 principles of environmental justice and who, to the greatest extent 9 practicable, represent diversity in race, ethnicity, age, and gender, 10 11 urban and rural areas, and different regions of the state. At least 12 one-half of the membership of the council must be comprised of persons who reside in a rural county, as defined in RCW 82.14.370. A 13 person appointed to the council to represent a rural county must 14 resign their position on the council effective immediately upon no 15 16 longer residing in a rural county. The members of the council shall 17 elect two members to serve as cochairs for two-year terms. The council must include: 18

(a) Seven community representatives, including one youth representative, the nominations of which are based upon applied and demonstrated work and focus on environmental justice or a related field, such as racial or economic justice, and accountability to vulnerable populations and overburdened communities;

(i) The youth representative must be between the ages of 18 and25 at the time of appointment;

(ii) The youth representative serves a two-year term. All other community representatives serve four-year terms, with six representatives initially being appointed to four-year terms and five being initially appointed to two-year terms, after which they will be appointed to four-year terms;

31 (b) Two members representing tribal communities, one from eastern 32 Washington and one from western Washington, appointed by the governor, plus two tribal members as specified in RCW 70A.65.040. The 33 governor shall solicit and consider nominees from each of the 34 federally recognized tribes in Washington state. The governor shall 35 36 collaborate with federally recognized tribes on the selection of tribal representatives. The tribal representatives serve four-year 37 38 terms. One representative must be initially appointed for a four-year 39 term. The other representative must be initially appointed for a two-

1 year term, after which, that representative must be appointed for a 2 four-year term;

3 (c) Two representatives who are environmental justice 4 practitioners or academics to serve as environmental justice experts, 5 the nominations of which are based upon applied and demonstrated work 6 and focus on environmental justice;

7 (d)(i) One representative of a business that is regulated by a 8 covered agency and whose ordinary business conditions are 9 significantly affected by the actions of at least one other covered 10 agency; and

(ii) One representative who is a member or officer of a union representing workers in the building and construction trades; and

(e) One representative at large, the nomination of which is based upon applied and demonstrated work and focus on environmental justice.

16 (3) Covered agencies shall serve as nonvoting, ex officio 17 liaisons to the council. Each covered agency must identify an 18 executive team level staff person to participate on behalf of the 19 agency.

20 (4) Nongovernmental members of the council must be compensated 21 and reimbursed in accordance with RCW 43.03.050, 43.03.060, and 22 43.03.220.

23 (5) The department of health must:

(a) Hire a manager who is responsible for overseeing all staffingand administrative duties in support of the council; and

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(b) Provide all administrative and staff support for the council.

(6) In collaboration with the office of equity, the office of financial management, the council, and covered agencies, the department of health must:

30 (a) Establish standards for the collection, analysis, and 31 reporting of disaggregated data as it pertains to tracking population 32 level outcomes of communities;

33 (b) Create statewide and agency-specific process and outcome 34 measures to show performance:

35 (i) Using outcome-based methodology to determine the 36 effectiveness of agency programs and services on reducing 37 environmental disparities; and

38 (ii) Taking into consideration community feedback from the 39 council on whether the performance measures established accurately

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1 measure the effectiveness of covered agency programs and services in 2 the communities served; and

3 (c) Create an online performance dashboard to publish performance
4 measures and outcomes as referenced in RCW 70A.02.090 for the state
5 and each covered agency.

6 (7) The department of health must coordinate with the 7 consolidated technology services agency to address cybersecurity and 8 data protection for all data collected by the department.

9 (8) (a) With input and assistance from the council, the department 10 of health must establish an interagency work group to assist covered 11 agencies in incorporating environmental justice into agency decision 12 making. The work group must include staff from each covered agency 13 directed to implement environmental justice provisions under this 14 chapter and may include members from the council. The department of 15 health shall provide assistance to the interagency work group by:

(i) Facilitating information sharing among covered agencies onenvironmental justice issues and between agencies and the council;

18 (ii) Developing and providing assessment tools for covered 19 agencies to use in the development and evaluation of agency programs, 20 services, policies, and budgets;

21 (iii) Providing technical assistance and compiling and creating 22 resources for covered agencies to use; and

(iv) Training covered agency staff on effectively using data and tools for environmental justice assessments.

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(b) The duties of the interagency work group include:

(i) Providing technical assistance to support agency compliance
 with the implementation of environmental justice into their strategic
 plans, environmental justice obligations for budgeting and funding
 criteria and decisions, environmental justice assessments, and
 community engagement plans;

(ii) Assisting the council in developing a suggested schedule and timeline for sequencing the types of: (A) Funding and expenditure decisions subject to rules; and (B) criteria incorporating environmental justice principles;

35 (iii) Identifying other policies, priorities, and projects for 36 the council's review and guidance development;

(iv) Identifying goals and metrics that the council may use to assess agency performance in meeting the requirements of chapter 314, Laws of 2021 for purposes of communicating progress to the public, the governor, and the legislature; and 1 (v) Developing the guidance under subsection (9)(c) of this 2 section in coordination with the council.

3 (9) The council has the following powers and duties:

4 (a) To provide a forum for the public to:

5 (i) Provide written or oral testimony on their environmental 6 justice concerns;

7 (ii) Assist the council in understanding environmental justice
8 priorities across the state in order to develop council
9 recommendations to agencies for issues to prioritize; and

10 (iii) Identify which agencies to contact with their specific 11 environmental justice concerns and questions;

(b) (i) The council shall work in an iterative fashion with the interagency work group to develop guidance for environmental justice implementation into covered agency strategic plans pursuant to RCW 70A.02.040, environmental justice assessments pursuant to RCW 70A.02.060, budgeting and funding criteria for making budgeting and funding decisions pursuant to RCW 70A.02.080, and community engagement plans pursuant to RCW 70A.02.050;

19 (ii) The council and interagency work group shall regularly 20 update its guidance;

21 (c) In consultation with the interagency work group, the council:

(i) Shall provide guidance to covered agencies on developing
 environmental justice assessments pursuant to RCW 70A.02.060 for
 significant agency actions;

(ii) Shall make recommendations to covered agencies on which agency actions may cause environmental harm or may affect the equitable distribution of environmental benefits to an overburdened community or a vulnerable population and therefore should be considered significant agency actions that require an environmental justice assessment under RCW 70A.02.060;

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(iii) Shall make recommendations to covered agencies:

32 (A) On the identification and prioritization of overburdened33 communities under this chapter; and

34 (B) Related to the use by covered agencies of the environmental 35 and health disparities map in agency efforts to identify and 36 prioritize overburdened communities;

37 (iv) May make recommendations to a covered agency on the timing 38 and sequencing of a covered agencies' efforts to implement RCW 39 70A.02.040 through 70A.02.080; and

1 (v) May make recommendations to the governor and the legislature 2 regarding ways to improve agency compliance with the requirements of 3 this chapter;

(d) By December 1, 2023, and biennially thereafter, and with
consideration of the information shared on September 1st each year in
covered agencies' annual updates to the council required under RCW
70A.02.090, the council must:

8 (i) Evaluate the progress of each agency in applying council 9 guidance, and update guidance as needed; and

(ii) Communicate each covered agency's progress to the public, 10 the governor, and the legislature. This communication is not required 11 to be a report and may take the form of a presentation or other 12 format that communicates the progress of the state and its agencies 13 in meeting the state's environmental justice goals in compliance with 14 chapter 314, Laws of 2021, and summarizing the work of the council 15 16 pursuant to (a) through (d) of this subsection, and subsection (11) 17 of this section; and

18 (e) To fulfill the responsibilities established for the council 19 in RCW 70A.65.040.

(10) By November 30, 2023, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036,
the council must submit a report to the governor and the appropriate
committees of the house of representatives and the senate on:

(a) The council's recommendations to covered agencies on the identification of significant agency actions requiring an environmental justice assessment under subsection (9)(c)(ii) of this section;

(b) The summary of covered agency progress reports provided to the council under RCW 70A.02.090(1), including the status of agency plans for performing environmental justice assessments required by RCW 70A.02.060; and

31 (c) Guidance for environmental justice implementation into 32 covered agency strategic plans, environmental justice assessments, 33 budgeting and funding criteria, and community engagement plans under 34 subsection (9)(c)(i) of this section.

35 (11) The council may:

(a) Review incorporation of environmental justice implementation
 plans into covered agency strategic plans pursuant to RCW 70A.02.040,
 environmental justice assessments pursuant to RCW 70A.02.060,
 budgeting and funding criteria for making budgeting and funding

1 decisions pursuant to RCW 70A.02.080, and community engagement plans
2 pursuant to RCW 70A.02.050;

3 (b) Make recommendations for amendments to this chapter or other 4 legislation to promote and achieve the environmental justice goals of 5 the state;

6 (c) Review existing laws and make recommendations for amendments 7 that will further environmental justice;

8 (d) Recommend to specific agencies that they create environmental9 justice-focused, agency-requested legislation;

10 (e) Provide requested assistance to state agencies other than 11 covered agencies that wish to incorporate environmental justice 12 principles into agency activities; and

13 (f) Recommend funding strategies and allocations to build 14 capacity in vulnerable populations and overburdened communities to 15 address environmental justice.

16 (12) The role of the council is purely advisory and council 17 decisions are not binding on an agency, individual, or organization.

18 (13) The department of health must convene the first meeting of 19 the council by January 1, 2022.

(14) All council meetings are subject to the open public meetings requirements of chapter 42.30 RCW and a public comment period must be provided at every meeting of the council.

23 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 70A.02 24 RCW to read as follows:

(1) The governor must reappoint the membership of the environmental justice council, established in RCW 70A.02.110, by December 31, 2023, to comply with the requirements of this act, with new councilmembers to begin serving on or before January 1, 2024.

(2) (a) The terms of all members of the environmental justice
 council appointed prior to the effective date of this section
 terminate December 31, 2023.

32 (b) A member of the environmental justice council appointed prior 33 to the effective date of this section may reapply and is eligible to 34 serve as an environmental justice councilmember for the term 35 beginning January 1, 2024.

36 (3) This section expires July 1, 2027.

37 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. This act is necessary for the immediate 38 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of

- 1 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes
- 2 effect immediately.

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
