HOUSE BILL 1779

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2023 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to reducing toxic air pollution that threatens 2 human health; adding a new section to chapter 70A.15 RCW; creating 3 new sections; and providing an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. The legislature finds that carbon monoxide 5 6 poisoning kills at least 430 people in the United States every year 7 and 50,000 people seek medical care to treat the adverse effects of carbon monoxide poisoning. Carbon monoxide gas is odorless and 8 colorless, making it difficult for people to protect themselves and 9 10 detect an issue that can cause sudden illness, death, and lifelong 11 disability. Therefore, the legislature intends to direct state agencies to collaborate on a study of what Washington state is doing 12 13 to prevent carbon monoxide poisoning and what the state might 14 reasonably do to keep people safe.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 70A.15 16 RCW to read as follows:

17 September 1, 2023, the department must (1) By convene an interagency carbon monoxide work group consisting of representatives 18 of the department of health, the director of the forensic laboratory 19 20 services at the Washington state patrol, the department of

1 transportation, and the office of the attorney general. The 2 interagency carbon monoxide work group must nominate a chair and the 3 chair may designate up to two additional participants with subject 4 matter expertise to participate on the work group.

5 (2) The purpose of the interagency carbon monoxide work group is 6 to produce a report regarding current and recommended future state 7 agency activities to:

8 (a) Prevent carbon monoxide poisoning, including leaks from motor9 vehicles;

10 (b) Increase awareness of carbon monoxide among the most at-risk 11 populations;

(c) Collect data on the number of incidents of carbon monoxide poisoning and their causes in Washington, in order to track the reduction of such incidents over time; and

15 (d) Identify any opportunities to seek federal grants or other 16 sources of funding available for public awareness campaigns related 17 to carbon monoxide harm avoidance.

18 (3) The interagency carbon monoxide work group must submit a 19 report to the appropriate committees of the legislature and the 20 governor by December 1, 2024, that contains recommendations on new 21 policy changes and other actions that could be taken to reduce carbon 22 monoxide poisoning in Washington.

23 (4) This section expires July 1, 2026.

24 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act may be known and cited as Mary's 25 law.

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
