## HOUSE BILL 1829

State of Washington 67th Legislature 2022 Regular Session

1 AN ACT Relating to creating the African American studies 2 specialty endorsement; adding a new section to chapter 28A.410 RCW; 3 creating new sections; and providing an expiration date.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that African 5 6 American studies is a multidisciplinary academic field primarily 7 devoted to the study, politics, culture, achievements, history, characteristics, and issues of people of African descent in North 8 America. The legislature acknowledges that this field of study 9 10 challenges the sociohistorical and cultural content and definition of 11 western ideology and argues for a multicultural, rather than a 12 eurocentric, interpretation of the western hemisphere. The legislature realizes that efforts to integrate African American 13 studies into social studies curriculum and mainstream education in 14 15 the United States date back to 1915.

16 (2)(a) The legislature finds that legislation enacted in 2020 17 directed the office of the superintendent of public instruction to 18 convene a work group to develop recommendations for integrating, on a 19 regular and ongoing basis, African American history, examinations of 20 racism, and the history of the civil rights movement into existing 21 social studies curriculum provided to students in grades seven

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1 through 12. One of the work group's recommendations is for the state 2 to establish an endorsement program in African American studies for 3 educators teaching grades seven through 12.

4 (b) The legislature also finds that legislation enacted in 2021 5 directed the office of the superintendent of public instruction to 6 develop a clear definition and framework for African American studies 7 to guide instruction in grades seven through 12.

8 (3) Therefore, the legislature intends to create an African 9 American studies specialty endorsement and to direct the Washington 10 professional educator standards board to develop essential learnings 11 for the endorsement that are aligned with the framework for African 12 American studies to guide instruction in grades seven through 12 that 13 is being developed by the office of the superintendent of public 14 instruction.

15 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 28A.410
16 RCW to read as follows:

(1) The African American studies specialty endorsement is created for educators with valid administrator certificates, valid educational staff associate certificates, and valid and endorsed teacher certificates.

(2) (a) By November 1, 2023, the Washington professional educator 21 22 standards board must adopt rules for the essential learnings for the African American studies specialty endorsement. The essential 23 24 learnings must describe the specific knowledge and skills that an 25 educator is expected to master to obtain the specialty endorsement, for example: (i) Connects history, culture, and contributions of 26 27 African Americans from precolonial Africa to contemporary America 28 through historical, interdisciplinary, and intersectional lenses; uses culturally responsive practices 29 (ii) and asset-based 30 methodologies that pull from all students' cultural funds of 31 knowledge; and (iii) demonstrates ability to tailor curriculum to 32 teach African American studies across urban, suburban, and rural 33 settings.

34 (b) The standards or essential learnings must be aligned with the 35 framework for African American studies to guide instruction in grades 36 seven through 12, developed by the office of the superintendent of 37 public instruction as required by section 501(4)(o), chapter 334, 38 Laws of 2021.

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NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. (1) The Washington professional educator standards board must convene a work group to advise and make recommendations to the Washington professional educator standards board regarding the essential learnings for the African American studies specialty endorsement described in section 2 of this act.

6 (2) The work group must include representatives from the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the state board of 7 education, a state association of school principals, a state 8 association of public educators and other organizations representing 9 educators, students, families, and the African American community. 10 11 The work group must consult with the educational opportunity gap 12 oversight and accountability committee created in RCW 28A.300.136 and the Washington state commission on African American affairs created 13 in RCW 43.113.010. 14

15 (3) This section expires June 30, 2024.

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
