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## HOUSE BILL 2292

State of Washington 68th Legislature 2024 Regular Session

- AN ACT Relating to hatchery improvement; creating new sections;
- 2 providing an expiration date; and declaring an emergency.
- 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- Sec. 1. The legislature finds that salmon hold 4 NEW SECTION. unique and irreplaceable significance in Washington's ecosystem, 5 6 culture, and economy. The iconic species not only serves as a 7 keystone in maintaining the ecological balance of our waterways but also fishing and the consumption of fish are central to culture of 8 nonindigenous peoples. Unfortunately, 9 indigenous and 10 populations face numerous challenges that require complex, 11 multifaceted, integrated responses. To truly find success in salmon 12 recovery, all parties must work together on each section of the 13 overall solution. Hatcheries represent one piece of this puzzle. When properly aligned with salmon's broader conservation goals, hatcheries 14 15 are a critical tool that can help mitigate the ecological and 16 economic impacts of low salmon populations. Therefore, the 17 legislature intends to continue in its quest for scientifically 18 supported solutions for salmon by collaboratively studying and 19 improving state and tribal hatchery efforts.

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- NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. (1) The department of fish and wildlife shall work in collaboration with tribal comanagers and at least two jointly selected independent scientists to identify for analysis two state-managed salmonid hatcheries and three salmonid hatcheries managed by tribal comanagers located near waterways entering the Puget Sound to audit and identify areas of improvement measured in terms of adult survival in topics including:
- 8 (a) Funding challenges;
  - (b) Staff capacity;

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- 10 (c) Infrastructure capacity; and
- 11 (d) Identification of ecological factors limiting return of adult 12 hatchery fish.
- 13 (2) At least one hatchery chosen for an audit must be located 14 near a significantly impacted waterway where wild salmon recovery 15 alone will not meet treaty obligations and limits harvest 16 opportunities for all fishers.
- 17 (3) The department of fish and wildlife and tribal comanagers in 18 collaboration shall provide annual progress reports to the 19 legislature pursuant to RCW 43.01.036, by December 1, 2025, with a 20 final report due on December 1, 2026.
- 21 (4) The amount of the funding appropriated for the purposes of 22 this section that is distributed to tribal comanagers must be equal 23 to the amount that is distributed to the department of fish and 24 wildlife.
- 25 (5) This section expires July 1, 2027.
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes effect immediately.

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
