- AN ACT Relating to providing consumer notice regarding cinnamon sources that naturally contain high levels of coumarin; adding a new section to chapter 69.04 RCW; and creating a new section.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:
- NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The legislature finds that coumarin is a toxicant that has been generally banned for use as a food additive by the United States department of agriculture since 1954 due to its propensity to cause liver damage in sensitive populations. Although banned as an intentional additive for most foods, coumarin is still present in the American food supply as a naturally occurring component of some common food flavorings.
- The legislature further finds that the product commonly 12 marketed as cinnamon may, in actuality, be a derivative of a variety 13 14 different plants in the Cinnamomum genus, each naturally developing different coumarin profiles. Ceylon cinnamon, also known 15 16 as true cinnamon, is one such source plant that happens to naturally 17 produce low levels of coumarin. However, most cinnamon in commerce today derives from other related species that, as a group, 18 referred to as cassia cinnamon. The dried bark from these species 19 contain substantial amounts of naturally occurring coumarin and could 20 21 pose a risk to a member of a sensitive population.

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- 1 (3) The legislature further finds that it is in the public's 2 interest to allow cinnamon consumers to easily identify whether 3 cinnamon being offered for sale is derived from Ceylon cinnamon or 4 cassia cinnamon so that an informed purchasing decision can be made 5 regarding coumarin levels.
- 6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** A new section is added to chapter 69.04 7 RCW to read as follows:
- 8 (1) Any package labeled as whole cinnamon bark or ground cinnamon 9 that is not wholly derived from the dried inner bark of the Ceylon or 10 true cinnamon plant (*Cinnamomum verum*) must include conspicuous 11 notice to the potential end consumer that the contents of the package 12 contains cassia cinnamon. At a minimum, this notice must include the 13 word "cassia" appearing on the label in the same size and font as 14 largest appearance of the word "cinnamon" on the package.
- 15 (2) This section applies to all cinnamon not derived from the 16 plant known as *Cinnamomum verum*, including cinnamon derived from the 17 plants known as *Cinnamomum cassia*, *Cinnamomum loureiroi*, and 18 *Cinnamomum burmannii*.
- 19 (3) This section only applies to cinnamon sold as a stand-alone 20 end product. This section does not apply to other products with 21 cinnamon listed or included among other ingredients.
- 22 (4) Any package sold or offered for sale in violation of this 23 section is deemed to be misbranded under this chapter.

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
