1 AN ACT Relating to protecting personal information from 2 disclosure for persons who make claims of sexual harassment; 3 reenacting and amending RCW 42.56.250; and adding new sections to 4 chapter 42.56 RCW.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 42.56.250 and 2017 c 38 s 1 and 2017 c 16 s 1 are 7 each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

8 The following employment and licensing information is exempt from 9 public inspection and copying under this chapter:

10 (1) Test questions, scoring keys, and other examination data used11 to administer a license, employment, or academic examination;

(2) All applications for public employment, including the names
of applicants, resumes, and other related materials submitted with
respect to an applicant;

(3) Professional growth plans (PGPs) in educator license renewals
 submitted through the eCert system in the office of the
 superintendent of public instruction;

18 (4) The following information held by any public agency in 19 personnel records, public employment related records, volunteer 20 rosters, or included in any mailing list of employees or volunteers 21 of any public agency: Residential addresses, residential telephone

1 numbers, personal wireless telephone numbers, personal email addresses, social security numbers, driver's license numbers, 2 identicard numbers, and emergency contact information of employees or 3 volunteers of a public agency, and the names, dates of birth, 4 residential addresses, residential telephone numbers, personal 5 6 wireless telephone numbers, personal email addresses, social security numbers, and emergency contact information of dependents of employees 7 or volunteers of a public agency. For purposes of this subsection, 8 "employees" includes independent provider home care workers 9 as 10 defined in RCW 74.39A.240;

(5) Information that identifies a person who, while an agency employee: (a) Seeks advice, under an informal process established by the employing agency, in order to ascertain his or her rights in connection with a possible unfair practice under chapter 49.60 RCW against the person; and (b) requests his or her identity or any identifying information not be disclosed;

17 (6) Investigative records compiled by an employing agency 18 conducting an active and ongoing investigation of a possible unfair 19 practice under chapter 49.60 RCW or of a possible violation of other 20 federal, state, or local laws prohibiting discrimination in 21 employment;

(7) Criminal history records checks for board staff finalist
 candidates conducted pursuant to RCW 43.33A.025;

(8) Except as provided in RCW 47.64.220, salary and benefit
information for maritime employees collected from private employers
under RCW 47.64.220(1) and described in RCW 47.64.220(2);

(9) Photographs and month and year of birth in the personnel files of employees and workers of criminal justice agencies as defined in RCW 10.97.030. The news media, as defined in RCW 5.68.010(5), shall have access to the photographs and full date of birth. For the purposes of this subsection, news media does not include any person or organization of persons in the custody of a criminal justice agency as defined in RCW 10.97.030; ((and))

34 (10) The global positioning system data that would indicate the 35 location of the residence of a public employee or volunteer using the 36 global positioning system recording device; and

37 (11) Information that identifies an agency employee who has made 38 a claim with the employing agency of sexual harassment and has 39 requested that his or her identity or any identifying information not 40 be disclosed without his or her consent, except for the name of the 1 agency employee who made the claim and receives a monetary settlement 2 from the agency arising out of the claim of sexual harassment. The 3 agency must notify the employee who makes a claim of sexual 4 harassment that the employee may request that his or her identity or 5 any identifying information not be disclosed.

6 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 42.56 7 RCW to read as follows:

8 (1) Any person who requests and obtains the identity or 9 identifying information of an agency employee that has made a claim 10 of sexual harassment and uses such information to harass, stalk, 11 threaten, or intimidate that employee, is subject to civil liability.

12 (2) Any person liable under subsection (1) of this section may be 13 sued in superior court by any aggrieved party, or in the name of the 14 state by the attorney general or the prosecuting authority of any 15 political subdivision. The court may order an appropriate civil 16 remedy. The plaintiff may recover up to one thousand dollars for each 17 record used in violation of this section, as well as costs and 18 reasonable attorneys' fees.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 42.56
20 RCW to read as follows:

By January 1, 2023, the public records exemptions accountability committee, in addition to its duties in RCW 42.56.140, must prepare and submit a report to the legislature that includes recommendations on whether the exemption created in section 1, chapter . . ., Laws of 2018 (section 1 of this act) should be continued, modified, or terminated, in accordance with its authority under RCW 42.56.140.

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
