1 WHEREAS, Today, we join with people in every corner of the great 2 state of Washington and throughout the United States of America to 3 honor the life and legacy of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, 4 Jr.; and

5 WHEREAS, Dr. King was born on January 15, 1929, in Atlanta, 6 Georgia, and on June 18, 1953, he and Coretta Scott were married in 7 Marion, Alabama; and

8 WHEREAS, He dedicated his life's work to gain civil and economic 9 rights for all; and

10 WHEREAS, We remember his Letter to Birmingham, which includes the 11 words, "Nonviolent direct action seeks to create such a crisis and 12 establish such creative tension that a community that has 13 consistently refused to negotiate is forced to confront the issue"; 14 and

15 WHEREAS, People around the world still use his nonviolent 16 philosophy as a guide to make lasting changes, following the words of 17 Dr. King, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere"; and 18 WHEREAS, His belief in equality and opportunity for all was not 19 restricted to the cessation of racial injustice, it also extended to 20 the necessity of economic justice for all people, so that all may 21 live free of the afflictions of poverty; and

22 WHEREAS, Dr. King propelled the truths of segregation and racial 23 injustice to the forefront of American conversation at dinner tables across the country, helping to bring an end to unjust laws, and
fulfilling the promise of a democracy for every American; and

3 WHEREAS, The Civil Rights Act of 1964 and the Voting Rights Act 4 of 1965 became law thanks to the blood, sweat, and tears shed by Dr. 5 King and his supporters from every community in the United States; 6 and

7 WHEREAS, We remember Dr. King's steadfast commitment to the 8 ideals of impartiality and opportunity for all in the face of 9 tyranny, cruelty, and mistreatment by those in power; and

10 WHEREAS, He received the Nobel Peace Prize in 1964, the youngest 11 man to ever be selected for this extraordinary honor; and

12 WHEREAS, Despite Dr. King's assassination on April 4, 1968, his 13 legacy of compassion and nonviolence lived on through his followers 14 and his wife, Coretta Scott King; and

15 WHEREAS, It is fitting to honor Dr. King's historic advocacy for 16 equal treatment of all people during a time of tremendous racial 17 tension;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives recognize the importance of the life of Dr. King and exalt his dedicated work and embrace the ideals of equality and equity for all people.
