AN ACT Relating to establishing the office of career connect Washington; amending RCW 28C.30.020, 28C.30.030, 28C.30.040, 28C.30.050, 28C.30.060, 28C.30.070, and 28B.77.005; adding a new chapter to Title 28B RCW; and recodifying RCW 28C.30.020, 28C.30.030, 28C.30.040, 28C.30.050, 28C.30.060, and 28C.30.070.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. (1) The office of career connect 8 Washington is created within the student achievement council.

9 (2) The purpose of the office is to:

10 (a) Advance, promote, and coordinate the career connect 11 Washington vision to create and sustain a statewide system for career 12 connected learning that is demand-driven and leads Washington's 13 residents towards a career pathway, and ensures residents obtain a 14 postsecondary credential, economic self-sufficiency, and fulfillment;

(b) Lead and staff the career connected learning cross-agency work group established in RCW 28C.30.030 (as recodified by this act);

(c) In coordination with key stakeholders, measure performance of career connected activities including student enrollment, retention, completion, successful postcompletion outcomes, including employment status, wage levels, ongoing education enrollment, and degree completion, and closing equity gaps. 1 Sec. 2. RCW 28C.30.020 and 2019 c 406 s 57 are each amended to 2 read as follows:

3 The definitions in this section apply throughout this chapter 4 unless the context clearly requires otherwise.

5 (1) "Career ((awareness and exploration" means programs,)) 6 explore" aligns with the requirements of the high school and beyond 7 plan articulated in RCW 28A.230.090 including programs, activities, 8 and events that provide early exposure to jobs and industries. 9 (("Career awareness and exploration" are)) Examples of "career 10 explore" include structured programs that include job fairs, guest 11 speakers, job shadows, jobsite tours, and other similar activities.

12 (2) "Career connected learning" ((means)) is a learning 13 experience that is integrated with work-related content and skills in 14 the following three categories: (a) Career ((awareness and 15 exploration)) explore; (b) career ((preparation)) prep; and (c) 16 career launch. "Career connected learning" includes work-integrated 17 learning and work-integrated experiences.

18 (3) "Career connected learning coordinators" are the full-time 19 equivalent employees in each of the nine educational service 20 districts working in coordination with the office of the 21 superintendent of public instruction to support the expansion of 22 career connected learning opportunities.

23 <u>(4)</u>(a) "Career launch ((programs" means))" are state registered 24 apprenticeships and programs that combine the following three 25 elements:

26 (i) Supervised paid work experience;

(ii) Aligned classroom learning to academic and employer standards. For career launch ((programs)) involving the K-12 system, aligned classroom learning must meet educational requirements and standards of the office of the superintendent of public instruction; and

(iii) Culmination in a ((valuable)) credential ((beyond a high school diploma or forty-five)) with demonstrated value to industry as established through the career launch endorsement process established in RCW 28C.30.040 (as recodified by this act) or 45 college credits towards a two-year or four-year postsecondary credential <u>and</u> preparation for employment.

38 (b) "Career launch ((programs))" includes the elements in (a) of 39 this subsection and may be achieved through, but are not limited to, 40 one or more of the following: (i) <u>State registered apprenticeships as approved by the</u>
 <u>Washington state apprenticeship and training council at the</u>
 <u>department of labor and industries;</u>

<u>(ii)</u> A state-approved career and technical education sequence of
courses or program of study that include requirements in alignment
with RCW 28A.700.030;

7 ((((ii))) (iii) A qualifying degree or credential earned through a
8 community or technical college or university.

9 (c) "Career launch ((programs))" may be initiated in a secondary 10 education system and completed in a postsecondary education system, 11 or first year of paid employment, as long as all parties jointly plan 12 the program.

13 (d) "Career launch ((programs))" must be endorsed through the 14 process created under RCW 28C.30.040(1)(a) <u>(as recodified by this</u> 15 <u>act)</u>.

16 ((((+++))) (5) "Career ((preparation programs" means programs that 17 give students hands-on skills and knowledge experience within a particular business, career track, or industry, and help prepare 18 students to work in a professional setting. "Career preparation 19 programs" include career and technical education courses, on-site 20 21 internships, preapprenticeship programs, and other similar opportunities)) prep" are programs that provide students with 22 23 introductory knowledge, skills, and/or abilities specific to high-24 demand industry sectors or career pathways; educate students on the 25 necessary training or process required to enter entry-level positions or complete further training or education within the industry sector 26 27 or pathway; and ensure students can make an informed decision about 28 whether to continue training within the industry sector or pathway. "Career prep" includes any sequences of career and technical 29 30 education courses that meet the requirements outlined in RCW 28A.655.250, or may include other career and technical education 31 courses, on-site internships, state recognized apprenticeship 32 preparation programs, and other similar opportunities. "Career prep" 33 34 does not include apprenticeship preparation programs in apprenticeable occupations that are not state recognized pursuant to 35 36 RCW 28B.117.020(11).

37 (((5))) (6) "Complete Washington" means the program established 38 in the 2018 omnibus operating appropriations act, section 117, 39 chapter 299, Laws of 2018, for the purpose of connecting prior 40 learning with postsecondary degree completion.

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1 ((-(6)-)) (7) "Industry sector leaders" may include industry
2 associations, centers of excellence, workforce development
3 organizations, community-based organizations, and other entities that
4 demonstrate the ability to implement career connected activities
5 within a targeted industry sector.

6 <u>(8) "Office" means the office of career connect Washington</u> 7 <u>created in section 1 of this act.</u>

8 (9) "Work group" means the career connected learning cross-agency 9 work group established in RCW 28C.30.030 (as recodified by this act).

10 (((-7))) (10) "Work-integrated learning" has the meaning provided 11 in RCW 28A.630.135.

12 Sec. 3. RCW 28C.30.030 and 2019 c 406 s 54 are each amended to 13 read as follows:

(1) ((Within existing resources, a)) A career connected learning cross-agency work group is established ((to scale up and expand high quality career connected learning opportunities in communities across the state.

18 (2) The purpose of the work group is to coordinate agency 19 functions and external partnerships and carry out the duties and 20 responsibilities set forth in RCW 28C.30.040.

21 (3) The governor shall select the chair of the work group.

(4) The governor's office may consult or contract with entities with expertise in industry and education partnerships to provide staffing support and guidance on industry talent needs. The governor's office may convene additional ad hoc committees that include industry sector advisory groups and leaders including, but not limited to, high-level representatives from education, industry, philanthropy, as well as students, parents, and community partners.

 8 <u>coordinators, regional networks, and industry sector leaders;</u>

9 <u>(c) Coordinate the joint development of an annual work plan of</u> 10 <u>each office or state agency in the work group that includes intended</u> 11 <u>goals and indicators to measure progress as it relates to</u> 12 <u>administering career connected learning access and completion. Each</u> 13 <u>office or state agency shall share relevant data and work plans, and</u> 14 <u>report on progress to the office and the work group;</u>

15 <u>(d)</u> Meet at least ((six)) <u>four</u> times during the calendar year; 16 and

17 (((c))) <u>(e)</u> Report progress to the governor and appropriate 18 committees of the legislature by ((September 1st)) November 1st 19 annually.

15 (h) Develop websites and other resources, and coordinate current 16 resources managed by the workforce training and education 17 coordinating board, the student achievement council, <u>the department</u> 18 <u>of labor and industries</u>, and the employment security department, to 19 inform students, employers, and the public about career connected 20 learning opportunities;

21 (((h))) <u>(i)</u> Develop financial and other support services to 22 increase access and success in career connected learning for students 23 facing barriers or living in underserved communities;

((((i))) (j) Address transfer and articulation issues to ensure career launch ((program)) participants receive high school and college credit in programs initiated in K-12 or dropout reengagement programs, or college credit in postsecondary programs and <u>state</u> registered apprenticeships, and work to expand the portability of credits to the maximum extent possible;

30 (((j))) (k) With respect to the portability of credit for the 31 purposes of postsecondary degree attainment, the career connected 32 learning (([cross-agency])) <u>cross-agency</u> work group shall coordinate 33 when appropriate with the complete Washington program;

34 (((k))) <u>(l)</u> Establish clear targets for equity to guide state 35 data development and action by regional partners related to program 36 design and expansion, including specific equity-focused criteria 37 within grant funding processes and strategies; and

38 (((1))) <u>(m)</u> Develop data systems and protocols for career 39 connected learning planning and evaluation purposes;

1 (2) By September 1, 2019, and by each September 1st thereafter, 2 make budget recommendations to the office of financial management, to 3 direct resources to education programs for career connected learning 4 as follows:

(a) Support the K-12 system and the office of the superintendent of public instruction to increase student participation in career connected learning and work-integrated learning programs that include career ((awareness and exploration)) explore, career ((preparation)) prep, and career launch;

10 (b) Support expansion of innovative program design in <u>state</u> 11 registered apprenticeships, year-round and summer programs, and 12 equitable access to dual credit;

13 (c) Support two-year and four-year institutions of higher 14 education to expand career connected learning enrollments, and 15 specifically:

16 (i) Build capacity at community and technical colleges to support 17 innovative design in career launch ((and registered apprenticeship 18 programs)), as well as program participation by high school graduates 19 or out-of-school youth;

20 (ii) Align the use of work-study to support career launch ((and 21 registered apprenticeship programs)); and

(iii) Clarify financial aid eligibility and exclusions from financial aid caps for career launch ((and registered apprenticeship programs));

25 (d) Promote innovation in equivalency and credentialing within 26 endorsed career launch ((and registered apprenticeship programs));

(e) Expand the number of portable credits and credit for prior
 learning to ensure that career launch ((programs)) transfer for high
 school or college credit to the maximum extent possible; and

30 (f) Support the <u>state</u> registered apprenticeship system and the 31 department of labor and industries to build capacity to expand <u>state</u> 32 registered apprenticeship and ((preapprenticeship)) <u>state recognized</u> 33 <u>apprenticeship preparation</u> programs;

Support regional leadership, ((program intermediaries)) 34 (3) industry sector leaders, and career connected learning and work-35 36 integrated learning navigation and coordination to expand participation in career connected learning and work-integrated 37 learning opportunities and the implementation of the career connected 38 39 learning grant program established in RCW 28C.30.050 (as recodified 40 by this act);

1 (4) Support the formation and operation of regional networks in 2 both rural and urban areas to guide career connected learning and 3 work-integrated learning opportunities that are both tailored to the 4 local needs of students and employers, and designed for portable 5 credentials across education settings and across an industry; and

6 (5) Develop <u>and maintain</u> a data enclave for career connected 7 learning and work-integrated learning to measure progress and ensure 8 equity of opportunity for career connected learning and work-9 integrated learning, ((led)) <u>hosted and maintained</u> by the education 10 research and data center at the office of financial management, as 11 follows:

12 (a) Develop ((program codes for career connected learning and 13 work-integrated learning opportunities in K-12 and postsecondary 14 education in order to track those programs that are designated as 15 career connected learning programs for each of the three categories 16 set forth in the definition of "career connected learning" in RCW 17 28C.30.020; and

(b) Collect and disaggregate program participation and outcomes data by race, gender, income, rurality, ability, foster youth, homeless youth, English language learner, and other relevant categories)) and maintain program identification codes for K-12 and postsecondary career explore, career prep, and career launch in order to track and evaluate each program, region, sector, and to analyze individual student enrollments, persistence, and completions;

(b) Collect student identification information, that includes student access, enrollment, persistence, and completion metrics, and demographic data that includes, but is not limited to, race, gender, income, rurality, disability, foster youth, homeless youth, and English language learner;

30 (6) Develop and maintain a public facing dashboard updated each 31 year by January 10th to ensure transparency and access regarding 32 program outcomes, regional impact, and progress towards statewide 33 enrollment and completion goals;

34 <u>(7) Oversee and administer or develop an interagency agreement</u> 35 with any state agency to administer any work stream associated with 36 implementation of career connect Washington including the career 37 connected learning grant program established in RCW 28C.30.050 (as 38 recodified by this act); and 39 (8) Lead and staff the career connected learning cross-agency

39 (8) Lead and staff the career connected learning cross-agency 40 work group established in RCW 28C.30.030 (as recodified by this act). 1 The office may consult or contract with entities with expertise 2 in business, labor, and education partnerships to provide strategic 3 guidance and staffing support necessary to carry out these duties. 4 The office may convene additional ad hoc committees that include 5 industry sector advisory groups and leaders including, but not 6 limited to, high-level representatives from education, industry, 7 philanthropy, as well as students, parents, and community partners.

8 Sec. 5. RCW 28C.30.050 and 2019 c 411 s 9 are each amended to 9 read as follows:

10 (1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 11 specific purpose, the career connected learning grant program is established as a competitive grant program to advance the career 12 connect Washington vision under RCW 28C.30.040 (as recodified by this 13 <u>act</u>). ((The employment security department shall administer the 14 program. The governor's office shall work with the employment 15 16 security department to establish grant criteria and guide the process for selection with consultation from the career connected learning 17 18 cross-agency work group.))

(2) The purpose of the career connected learning grant program is to create career connected learning opportunities, including career ((awareness and exploration)) explore, career ((preparation)) prep, and career launch ((programs)), that are ((both)) tailored to the local needs of students and employers and designed so that students may receive high school or ((college)) postsecondary credit across industries and regions of the state to the maximum extent possible.

4 (4) The program administrator shall ((consult with the governor's 5 office and the career connected learning cross-agency work group 6 established in RCW 28C.30.030 to develop a formal request for 7 proposal for both the regional career connected learning and work-8 integrated learning networks and the program intermediaries)) make 9 competitive awards for career connected learning programs and other 10 activities.

(5) (a) Proposals for regional career connected learning and workintegrated learning networks ((and intermediaries)) may be sought from applicants within the geographic areas of the nine educational service districts. Successful applicants shall convene and manage regional, cross-industry networks that will lead to the expansion of career connected learning opportunities.

17 Regional career connected learning and work-integrated (b) learning network applicants must demonstrate regional knowledge and 18 status as a trusted partner of industry and education stakeholders, a 19 track record of success with career connected learning and aligned 20 21 initiatives, and a commitment to equity. Regional career connected learning networks may include, but are not limited to, regional 22 23 education networks, school districts, educational service districts, higher education institutions, workforce development councils, 24 25 chambers of commerce, industry associations, joint labor management councils, multiemployer training partnerships, economic development 26 27 councils, and nonprofit organizations.

(6) (a) Eligible program ((intermediary)) builder applicants may include, but are not limited to, new or existing industry associations, joint labor management councils, regional networks, career technical student organizations, postsecondary education and training institutions working with multiple employer partners, state agencies, and other community-based organizations and expanded learning partners.

35 (((7))) <u>(b)</u> Program ((intermediaries)) <u>builders</u> must work with 36 appropriate faculty and staff at the state universities, the regional 37 universities, ((and)) the state college, other postsecondary 38 <u>representatives</u>, and K-12 education representatives, to expand the 39 number of career launch ((program)) credits that may be articulated 40 and transferred to postsecondary degree programs.

 2 <u>strong employer relationships and engagement and show knowledge of</u>

- 5 <u>(a)</u> Identification of specific occupations in demand and 6 <u>anticipated to be in demand in the future;</u>

 8 credentials needed for occupations; and
- 9 (c) Identification of or development of specific programs needed 10 to provide the necessary skills, education, training, or credentials.

11 <u>(8) Eligible industry sector leader applicants may include, but</u> 12 <u>are not limited to, industry associations, joint labor management</u> 13 <u>councils, multiemployer training partnerships, higher education</u> 14 <u>institutions, and centers of excellence established pursuant to RCW</u> 15 <u>28B.50.902.</u>

16 (9) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this 17 specific purpose, the employment security department, as the 18 administrator of the program, has the authority to utilize funds 19 deposited in the career connected learning account for the purposes 20 of the program.

(((9) During the 2019-2021 fiscal biennium, the employment security department must provide sufficient funding from amounts appropriated for the program to the office of the superintendent of public instruction to provide a grant to each of the nine educational service districts for costs of employing one full-time equivalent employee to support the expansion of career connected learning opportunities.))

28 Sec. 6. RCW 28C.30.060 and 2019 c 406 s 59 are each amended to 29 read as follows:

The career connected learning account is created in the state treasury. All receipts from ((public or)) private sources provided for the purpose of funding grants under RCW 28C.30.050 (as recodified by this act) must be deposited into the account. Moneys in the account may be spent only after appropriation. Expenditures from the account may be used only for career connected learning grants.

36 Sec. 7. RCW 28C.30.070 and 2019 c 406 s 58 are each amended to 37 read as follows:

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1 Where applicable, career ((awareness and exploration)) explore, 2 career connected learning, career launch ((programs)), and career 3 ((preparation programs)) prep are subject to RCW 49.12.121 and 4 49.12.123 regarding employing minors.

5 Sec. 8. RCW 28B.77.005 and 2021 c 134 s 1 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

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8 (2) The council is composed of ((10)) <u>12</u> voting members as 9 provided in this subsection.

(1) The student achievement council is created.

10 (a) ((Six)) Eight citizen members shall be appointed by the 11 governor with the consent of the senate. One of the citizen members shall be an undergraduate student and one shall be a graduate 12 student. The citizen members shall also include a representative from 13 each of the following groups: A worker representative, a 14 15 representative of the business community, a representative of a local 16 community or region dedicated to career connected learning pathways, and a tribal representative. The citizen members shall be selected 17 based on their knowledge of or experience in higher education. At 18 least two of the citizen members shall have direct experience with 19 career connected learning programs and/or pathways, including state 20 registered apprenticeship. In making appointments to the council, the 21 22 governor shall give consideration to citizens representing ((labor, $business_{T}$) women((T)) and racial and ethnic minorities, as well as 23 24 geographic representation, to ensure that the council's membership 25 reflects the state's diverse ((population)) communities. The citizen members shall serve for four-year terms except for each of the 26 27 student members, who shall serve for two years; however, the terms of 28 the initial members and the undergraduate and graduate student 29 members shall be staggered.

30 (b) A representative of an independent nonprofit higher education 31 institution as defined in RCW 28B.07.020, selected by an association 32 of independent nonprofit baccalaureate degree-granting institutions. 33 The representative appointed under this subsection (2)(b) shall 34 excuse himself or herself from voting on matters relating primarily 35 to public institutions of higher education.

36 (c) Chosen for their recognized ability and innovative leadership 37 experience in broad education policy and system design, a 38 representative of each of the following shall be selected by the 1 respective organizations, who shall serve at the pleasure of the 2 appointing organizations:

3 (i) A representative of the four-year institutions of higher
4 education as defined in RCW 28B.10.016, selected by the presidents of
5 those institutions;

6 (ii) A representative of the state's community and technical 7 college system, selected by the state board for community and 8 technical colleges; and

9 (iii) A representative of the state's K-12 education system, 10 selected by the superintendent of public instruction in consultation 11 with the department of children, youth, and families and the state 12 board of education. The representative appointed under this 13 subsection (2)(c)(iii) shall excuse himself or herself from voting on 14 matters relating primarily to institutions of higher education.

15 (3) The chair shall be selected by the council from among the 16 citizen members appointed to the council. The chair shall serve a 17 one-year term but may serve more than one term if selected to do so 18 by the membership.

(4) The council may create advisory committees on an ad hoc basis 19 for the purpose of obtaining input from students, faculty, and higher 20 21 education experts and practitioners, citizens, business and industry, and labor, and for the purpose of informing their research, policy, 22 23 and programmatic functions. Ad hoc advisory committees addressing secondary to postsecondary transitions and university and college 24 25 admissions requirements must include K-12 sector representatives including teachers, school directors, principals, administrators, and 26 others as the council may direct, in addition to higher education 27 28 representatives. The council shall maintain a contact list of K-12 and higher education stakeholder organizations to provide notices to 29 stakeholders regarding the purposes of ad hoc advisory committees, 30 31 timelines for planned work, means for participation, and a statement 32 of desired outcomes.

33 (5) Any vacancies on the council shall be filled in the same 34 manner as the original appointments. Appointments to fill vacancies 35 shall be only for such terms as remain unexpired. Any vacancies among 36 council members appointed by the governor shall be filled by the 37 governor subject to confirmation by the senate and shall have full 38 authority to act before the time the senate acts on their 39 confirmation.
