## SUBSTITUTE SENATE BILL 5395

## State of Washington 66th Legislature 2019 Regular Session

**By** Senate Early Learning & K-12 Education (originally sponsored by Senators Wilson, C., Randall, Keiser, Saldaña, Takko, Mullet, Wellman, Das, Nguyen, Billig, Pedersen, Rolfes, Darneille, Dhingra, Hasegawa, Hunt, and Kuderer; by request of Superintendent of Public Instruction)

1 AN ACT Relating to requiring comprehensive sexual health 2 education that is consistent with the Washington state health and 3 physical education K-12 learning standards and that requires 4 affirmative consent curriculum; and amending RCW 28A.300.475.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 28A.300.475 and 2007 c 265 s 2 are each amended to 7 read as follows:

8 (1) (a) By September 1, ((2008)) 2021, every public school ((that offers)) must provide comprehensive sexual health education ((must 9 10 assure that sexual health education)) as an integral part of the 11 curriculum that is evidence-informed, medically and scientifically age-appropriate, ((appropriate)) and inclusive for all 12 accurate, students regardless of ((gender, race, disability status, or sexual 13  $\frac{1}{1}$  orientation,)) their protected class status under chapter 49.60 RCW 14 15 and includes information ((about)) and skills-based instruction that: 16 (i) Includes both abstinence and other methods of preventing 17 unintended pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases;

18 (ii) Encourages healthy relationships that are based on mutual 19 respect and affection and are free from violence, coercion, and 20 intimidation; 1 (iii) Teaches how to identify and respond to attitudes and 2 behaviors that contribute to sexual violence; and

3 <u>(iv) Emphasizes the importance of affirmative consent, meaning</u>
4 <u>conscious and voluntary agreement to engage in sexual activity, as a</u>
5 <u>requirement before sexual activity</u>.

6 (b) In addition:

7 (i) All sexual health information, instruction, and materials 8 must be medically and scientifically accurate((-));

9 (ii) Abstinence may not be taught to the exclusion of other 10 materials and instruction on contraceptives and disease 11 prevention((-));

12 <u>(iii) Instruction and materials must be inclusive and use</u> 13 <u>language and strategies that recognize all members of a protected</u> 14 <u>class under chapter 49.60 RCW;</u>

15 (iv) A public school may choose to use separate, outside speakers 16 or prepared curriculum to teach different content areas or units 17 within the comprehensive sexual health <u>education</u> program as long as 18 all speakers, curriculum, and materials used are in compliance with 19 this section((-)); and

20 <u>(v) Comprehensive sexual health education must be consistent with</u> 21 <u>the Washington state health and physical education K-12 learning</u> 22 <u>standards and</u> the January 2005 guidelines for sexual health 23 information and disease prevention developed by the department of 24 health and the office of the superintendent of public instruction.

(2) By September 1, 2020, comprehensive sexual health education
must be phased in beginning with students in grades six through
twelve. By September 1, 2021, comprehensive sexual health education
must be phased in for students in grades kindergarten through five.
Full statewide implementation for all public schools and all grade
levels must be achieved by September 1, 2021.

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(3) As used in ((<del>chapter 265, Laws of 2007,</del>)) <u>this section:</u>

32 <u>(a) "Evidence-informed" means a program that is informed by</u> 33 <u>scientific research and effective practice and replicates evidence-</u> 34 <u>based programs or substantially incorporates elements of effective</u> 35 <u>programs.</u>

36 <u>(b)</u> "Medically and scientifically accurate" means information 37 that is verified or supported by research in compliance with 38 scientific methods, is published in ((peer-review)) peer-reviewed 39 journals, where appropriate, and is recognized as accurate and 40 objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise

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1 in the field of sexual health including but not limited to the 2 American college of obstetricians and gynecologists, the ((Washington 3 state)) department of health, and the federal centers for disease 4 control and prevention.

((-(3))) (4) The superintendent of public instruction((and the 5 6 department of health)) shall make the Washington state health and physical education K-12 learning standards and the January 2005 7 guidelines for sexual health information and disease prevention 8 available to <u>public</u> schools ((districts)), teachers, and quest 9 speakers on ((their)) the office of the superintendent of public 10 web sites. 11 instruction's Within available resources, the 12 superintendent of public instruction ((and the department of health)) shall make any related information, model policies, curricula, or 13 other resources available as well. 14

15 ((<del>(4)</del>)) (5)(a) The superintendent of public instruction, in consultation with the department of health, shall develop a list of 16 17 comprehensive sexual health education curricula that are consistent with the 2005 guidelines for sexual health information and disease 18 19 prevention, the Washington state health and physical education K-12 learning standards, and this section. This list shall ((be intended 20 21 to)) serve as a resource for school((s)) <u>districts</u>, teachers, or any 22 other organization or community group, and shall be updated ((no less 23 frequently than annually)) at least biannually and made available on 24 the web site((s)) of the office of the superintendent of public 25 instruction ((and the department of health)).

26 ((<del>(5)</del>)) <u>(b) By September 1, 2019, the superintendent of public</u> 27 <u>instruction must develop comprehensive sexual health education</u> 28 <u>instructional materials review tools and make them available on the</u> 29 <u>office of the superintendent of public instruction's web site.</u>

30 (6) Public schools ((that offer sexual health education are 31 encouraged to review their sexual health curricula and)) must choose 32 a curriculum from the list developed under subsection (((+))) (5) of 33 this section((. Any public school that offers sexual health education 34 may)) or use the review tools developed under subsection (5)(b) of this section to identify, choose, or develop any other curriculum( $(\tau)$ 35 if the curriculum chosen or developed)) that complies with the 36 37 requirements of this section. Public schools must use the review tools when choosing curricula other than those from the list 38 39 developed under subsection (5) of this section.

1 ((<del>(6)</del>)) <u>(7)</u> ((Any)) <u>Parents</u> or legal guardians who ((wishes)) wish to have ((his or her child)) their children excused from any 2 planned instruction in <u>comprehensive</u> sexual health education may do 3 so upon filing a written request with the school district board of 4 directors or its designee, or the principal of the school ((his or 5 6 her)) their child attends, or the principal's designee. In addition, ((any)) parents or legal guardians may review the comprehensive 7 sexual health education curriculum offered in ((his or her)) their 8 child's school by filing a written request with the school district 9 10 board of directors, the principal of the school ((his or her)) their 11 child attends, or the principal's designee.

12 ((-(7))) (8) The office of the superintendent of public instruction ((shall, through its Washington state school health 13 profiles survey or other existing reporting mechanism, ask)) must 14 15 require public school((s)) districts to ((identify any)) report, on 16 an annual basis, curricula used to provide <u>comprehensive</u> sexual 17 health education((, and shall)). The superintendent of public instruction must report the results of this inquiry to the education 18 19 committees of the legislature ((on a biennial basis, beginning with the 2008-09 school year by November 1, 2021, and biennially 20 21 thereafter.

((<del>(8) The requirement</del>)) <u>(9) RCW 28A.600.480(2)</u>, which encourages school employees, students, and volunteers to report harassment, intimidation, or bullying ((<del>under RCW 28A.600.480(2)</del>)), applies to this section.

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
