SENATE BILL 5440

State of Washington 65th Legislature 2017 Regular Session

By Senators Zeiger, Darneille, O'Ban, Walsh, Miloscia, Hunt, Carlyle, and Warnick

1 AN ACT Relating to establishing the legislative-executive 2 WorkFirst poverty reduction oversight task force; amending RCW 3 74.08A.260; adding new sections to chapter 74.08A RCW; and creating a 4 new section.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. (1) The leqislature finds that 7 intergenerational poverty, which passes from parents to children, should be distinguished from situational poverty, which occurs after 8 9 an event like losing employment. Intergenerational poverty can affect 10 lives of many future children and generations without the the 11 development of specific strategies to stop this cycle.

12 (2) The legislature finds that it is necessary to bring together 13 state agencies and other stakeholders for the purposes of policy and 14 program development to address intergenerational poverty and to 15 develop specific strategies to provide families the support they need 16 to overcome a history of poverty.

17 The legislature legislative-executive (3)finds that the WorkFirst oversight task force has recommended that its scope be 18 modified to include poverty reduction in order to provide a renewed 19 20 focus on the underlying causes of intergenerational poverty in 21 Washington. Therefore, the legislature intends to create а

legislative-executive WorkFirst poverty reduction oversight task force and an intergenerational poverty advisory committee in order to lay the groundwork in Washington for advancing intergenerational prosperity and reducing poverty.

5 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 74.08A 6 RCW to read as follows:

7 The definitions in this section apply throughout RCW 74.08A.260 8 and sections 4 and 5 of this act unless the context clearly requires 9 otherwise.

10 (1) "Advisory committee" means the intergenerational poverty 11 advisory committee.

12 (2) "Cycle of poverty" or "poverty cycle" means the set of 13 factors or events by which the long-term poverty of a person is 14 likely to continue and be experienced by each child of the person 15 when the child becomes an adult unless there is outside intervention.

16 (3) "Intergenerational poverty" means poverty in which two or 17 more successive generations of a family continue in the cycle of 18 poverty and governmental dependence, and is not situational poverty.

19 (4) "Task force" means the legislative-executive WorkFirst20 poverty reduction oversight task force.

21 Sec. 3. RCW 74.08A.260 and 2011 1st sp.s. c 42 s 2 are each 22 amended to read as follows:

23 (1) Each recipient shall be assessed after determination of 24 program eligibility and before referral to job search. Assessments 25 shall be based upon factors that are critical to obtaining 26 employment, including but not limited to education, availability of 27 child care, history of family violence, history of substance abuse, and other factors that affect the ability to obtain employment. 28 29 Assessments may be performed by the department or by a contracted 30 entity. The assessment shall be based on a uniform, consistent, 31 transferable format that will be accepted by all agencies and organizations serving the recipient. 32

(2) Based on the assessment, an individual responsibility plan shall be prepared that: (a) Sets forth an employment goal and a plan for maximizing the recipient's success at meeting the employment goal; (b) considers WorkFirst educational and training programs from which the recipient could benefit; (c) contains the obligation of the recipient to participate in the program by complying with the plan;

1 (d) moves the recipient into full-time WorkFirst activities as 2 quickly as possible; and (e) describes the services available to the 3 recipient either during or after WorkFirst to enable the recipient to 4 obtain and keep employment and to advance in the workplace and 5 increase the recipient's wage earning potential over time.

6 (3) Recipients who are not engaged in work and work activities,
7 and do not qualify for a good cause exemption under RCW 74.08A.270,
8 shall engage in self-directed service as provided in RCW 74.08A.330.

9 (4) If a recipient refuses to engage in work and work activities 10 required by the department, the family's grant shall be reduced by 11 the recipient's share, and may, if the department determines it 12 appropriate, be terminated.

13 (5) The department may waive the penalties required under 14 subsection (4) of this section, subject to a finding that the 15 recipient refused to engage in work for good cause provided in RCW 16 74.08A.270.

17 (6) In consultation with the recipient, the department or 18 contractor shall place the recipient into a work activity that is 19 available in the local area where the recipient resides.

(7) Assessments conducted under this section shall include a 20 21 consideration of the potential benefit to the recipient of engaging in financial literacy activities. The department shall consider the 22 options for financial literacy activities available in the community, 23 including information and resources available through the financial 24 25 education public-private partnership created under RCW 28A.300.450. The department may authorize up to ten hours of financial literacy 26 a core activity or an optional activity under 27 activities as 28 WorkFirst.

(8)(a) ((From July 1, 2011, through June 30, 2012, subsections 29 (2) through (6) of this section are suspended for a recipient who is 30 31 a parent or other relative personally providing care for one child 32 under the age of two years, or two or more children under the age of six years. This suspension applies to both one and two parent 33 families. However, both parents in a two-parent family cannot use the 34 suspension during the same month. Beginning July 1, 2012, the 35 department shall phase in the work activity requirements that were 36 suspended, beginning with those recipients closest to reaching the 37 sixty-month limit of receiving temporary assistance for needy 38 39 families under RCW 74.08A.010(1). The phase in shall be accomplished 40 so that a fairly equal number of recipients required to participate

1 in work activities are returned to those activities each month until the total number required to participate is participating by June 30, 2 2013. Nothing in this subsection shall prevent a recipient from 3 participating in the WorkFirst program on a voluntary basis. 4 Recipients who participate in the WorkFirst program on a voluntary 5 6 basis shall be provided an option to participate in the program on a part-time basis, consisting of sixteen or fewer hours of activities 7 per week. Recipients also may participate voluntarily on a full-time 8 9 basis.

10 (b)(i) The period of suspension of work activities under this subsection provides an opportunity for the legislative and executive 11 12 branches to oversee redesign of the WorkFirst program. To realize this opportunity, both during the period of suspension and following 13 reinstatement of work activity requirements as redesign is being 14 15 implemented,)) A legislative-executive WorkFirst poverty reduction 16 oversight task force is established((, with members as provided in 17 this subsection (8)(b)).

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(((ii))) (b) The primary goals of the task force are to:

19 <u>(i) Reduce the overall percentage of people living below two</u> 20 <u>hundred percent of the federal poverty level by fifty percent by the</u> 21 <u>year 2025. The task force must work toward this goal in a manner that</u> 22 <u>seeks to eliminate disparities including, but not limited to,</u> 23 <u>disparities by race, ethnicity, sex, gender, zip code, immigration</u> 24 <u>status, age, household type, and disability status; and</u>

25 (ii) Prevent and address adverse childhood experiences and the 26 trauma of children who are living in poverty through the provision of 27 effective services.

28 (c) The task force shall include diverse, statewide 29 representation and its membership shall reflect regional, racial, and 30 cultural diversity to adequately represent the needs of all children 31 and families in the state. The task force shall consist of the 32 following members:

33 <u>(i)</u> The president of the senate shall appoint two members from 34 each of the two largest caucuses of the senate.

35 (((iii))) (ii) The speaker of the house of representatives shall 36 appoint two members from each of the two largest caucuses of the 37 house of representatives.

38 (((iv))) (iii) The governor shall appoint members representing 39 the department of social and health services, the department of early 40 learning, the department of commerce, the employment security

1 department, ((the office of financial management)) the office of the superintendent of public instruction, the department of corrections, 2 and the state board for community and technical colleges. 3 The governor shall direct representatives from the department of health, 4 the health care authority, and the workforce training and education 5 б coordinating board to serve in an advisory capacity to the task 7 force. (iv) The governor shall request participation by representatives 8 9 of tribal governments. (v) The cochairs of the intergenerational poverty advisory 10 committee created in section 4 of this act shall serve as voting 11 12 members of the task force. (((v))) (d) The task force shall choose cochairs, one from among 13 the legislative members and one from among the executive branch 14 members. The legislative members shall convene the initial meeting of 15 16 the task force. 17 (((-))) (e) The task force shall: (i) Oversee the partner agencies' ((implementation of the 18 19 redesign)) operation of the WorkFirst program and operation of the temporary assistance for needy families program to ensure that the 20 programs are achieving desired outcomes for their clients; 21 22 (ii) Determine evidence-based outcome measures for the WorkFirst program, including measures related to equitably serving the needs of 23 historically underrepresented populations, such as English language 24 25 learners, immigrants, refugees, and other diverse communities; 26 (iii) Develop accountability measures for WorkFirst recipients and the state agencies responsible for their progress toward self-27 28 sufficiency; 29 (iv) Review existing statutes, administrative codes, and budget appropriations for their impact on advancing the goal of fifty 30 31 percent poverty reduction by 2025; 32 (v) Collaborate with the advisory committee created in section 4 of this act to develop strategies to reduce poverty and prevent 33 adverse childhood experiences, and monitor the impact of these 34 35 strategies; (vi) Seek input on best practices from service providers, 36 community-based organizations, legislators, state agencies, 37 stakeholders, the business community, and subject matter experts; 38 39 (vii) Collaborate with partner agencies and the advisory 40 committee to share and analyze data and information collected under p. 5 SB 5440

1 section 5 of this act and from other sources regarding intergenerational poverty in the state, with a primary focus on data 2 and information regarding children who are at risk of continuing the 3 cycle of poverty and welfare dependency unless outside intervention 4 5 is made; б (viii) Make recommendations to the governor and the legislature 7 regarding: (A) Policies to improve the effectiveness of the WorkFirst 8 9 program over time; (B) Early identification of those recipients most likely to 10 11 experience long stays on the program and strategies to improve their 12 ability to achieve progress toward self-sufficiency; and 13 (C) Necessary changes to the program, including taking into 14 account federal changes to the temporary assistance for needy 15 families program((-)); 16 (((d))) (ix) Direct the department of social and health services 17 to develop a five-year and ten-year plan to address intergenerational poverty, subject to oversight and approval by the task force. Upon 18 19 approval by the task force, the department must submit these plans to the governor and the appropriate committees of the legislature by 20 December 1, 2018; and 21 (x) Beginning December 1, 2019, and each December 1st thereafter 22 and in collaboration with the advisory committee, provide an annual 23 report to the governor and the appropriate committees of the 24 25 legislature on the progress being made towards the goals identified 26 in this section. 27 (f) The partner agencies must provide the task force with regular 28 reports on: 29 (i) The partner agencies' progress toward meeting the outcome and performance measures established under ((-)) (e) 30 of this 31 subsection; 32 (ii) Caseload trends and program expenditures, and the impact of 33 those trends and expenditures on client services, including services to historically underrepresented populations; and 34 (iii) The characteristics of families who have been unsuccessful 35 36 on the program and have lost their benefits either through sanction or the sixty-month time limit. 37 ((((e)))) (<u>(g)</u> Staff support for the task force must be provided by 38 39 senate committee services, the house of representatives office of 40 program research, and the state agency members of the task force.

1 (((f))) (<u>h</u>) The task force shall meet on a quarterly basis 2 ((beginning September 2011)), or as determined necessary by the task 3 force cochairs.

4 (((g))) (i) Legislative members of the task force are reimbursed 5 for travel expenses in accordance with RCW 44.04.120. Nonlegislative 6 members are not entitled to be reimbursed for travel expenses if they 7 are elected officials or are participating on behalf of an employer, 8 governmental entity, or other organization. Any reimbursement for 9 other nonlegislative members is subject to chapter 43.03 RCW.

10 (j) The expenses of the task force must be paid jointly by the 11 senate and the house of representatives. Task force expenditures are 12 subject to approval by the senate facilities and operations committee 13 and the house of representatives executive rules committee, or their 14 successor committees.

15 (k) During its tenure, the state agency members of the task force 16 shall respond in a timely manner to data requests from the cochairs.

17 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. A new section is added to chapter 74.08A 18 RCW to read as follows:

(1) To assist the task force established in RCW 74.08A.260, thereis created the intergenerational poverty advisory committee.

(2) The advisory committee must include diverse, statewide representation from public, nonprofit, and for-profit entities. The committee membership must reflect regional, racial, and cultural diversity to adequately represent the needs of all children and families in the state.

26 (3) Members of the advisory committee are appointed by the 27 secretary, with the approval of the task force.

28 (4) The advisory committee must include representatives from:

29 (a) Advocacy groups that focus on childhood poverty issues;

30 (b) Advocacy groups that focus on education issues;

31 (c) Academic experts in childhood poverty or education issues;

32 (d) Faith-based organizations that address childhood poverty or 33 education issues;

34 (e) Tribal governments;

35 (f) Families impacted by poverty;

36 (g) Local government representatives that address childhood 37 poverty or education issues;

38 (h) The business community; and

(i) The commission on African-American affairs, the state
 commission on Hispanic affairs, the state commission on Asian Pacific
 American affairs, and the governor's office of Indian affairs.

4 (5) Subject to subsection (6) of this section, each member of the 5 advisory committee is appointed for a four-year term unless a member 6 is appointed to complete an unexpired term.

7 (6) The secretary may adjust the length of term at the time of
8 appointment or reappointment so that approximately one-half of the
9 advisory committee is appointed every two years.

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(7) The secretary may remove an advisory committee member:

11 (a) If the member is unable or unwilling to carry out the 12 member's assigned responsibilities; or

13 (b) For good cause.

14 (8) If a vacancy occurs in the advisory committee membership for15 any reason, a replacement may be appointed for the unexpired term.

16 (9) The advisory committee shall choose cochairs from among its 17 membership. The secretary shall convene the initial meeting of the 18 advisory committee.

(10) A majority of the advisory committee constitutes a quorum of the advisory committee at any meeting and the action of the majority of members present is the action of the advisory committee.

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(11) The advisory committee shall:

(a) Meet quarterly at the request of the task force cochairs orthe cochairs of the advisory committee;

(b) Make recommendations to the task force on how the task force and the state can effectively address the needs of children affected by intergenerational poverty and achieve the purposes and duties of the task force as described in RCW 74.08A.260;

(c) Ensure that the advisory committee's recommendations to the task force are supported by verifiable data, including data gathered under section 5 of this act; and

32 (d) Gather input from diverse communities about the impact of 33 intergenerational poverty on outcomes such as education, health care, 34 employment, involvement in the child welfare system, and other 35 related areas.

36 (12) The department shall provide staff support to the advisory 37 committee.

38 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. A new section is added to chapter 74.08A
39 RCW to read as follows:

(1) The department may establish and maintain a system to track
 intergenerational poverty which has the ability to:

3 (a) Identify groups that have a high risk of experiencing4 intergenerational poverty;

5 (b) Identify incidents, patterns, and trends that explain or 6 contribute to intergenerational poverty;

7 (c) Assist case workers, social scientists, and government 8 officials in the study and development of effective and efficient 9 plans and programs to help individuals and families in the state to 10 break the cycle of poverty; and

11 (d) Gather and track available local, state, and national data
12 on:

13 (i) Official poverty rates;

14 (ii) Child poverty rates;

15 (iii) Years spent by individuals in childhood poverty;

16 (iv) Years spent by individuals in adult poverty; and

17 (v) Related poverty information.

18 (2) In implementing the intergenerational poverty tracking19 system, the department is encouraged to:

20 (a) Use available data in the tracking system, including public 21 assistance data, census data, and other data made available to the 22 department;

(b) Develop and implement methods to integrate, compare, analyze,
and validate the data for the purposes described in subsection (1) of
this section; and

(c) Include in the annual written report described in RCW
 74.08A.260, a report on the data, findings, and potential uses of the
 tracking system.

(3) The tracking system must protect the privacy of individuals living in poverty by using and distributing data within the tracking system in compliance with RCW 74.04.060, and other applicable state and federal laws.

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
