AN ACT Relating to modifying miscellaneous provisions impacting department of fish and wildlife licensing requirements; amending RCW 77.08.010, 77.08.075, 77.32.155, 77.32.470, 77.32.480, 77.32.520, and 79A.80.040; and adding a new section to chapter 77.32 RCW.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 Sec. 1. RCW 77.08.010 and 2017 3rd sp.s. c 8 s 2 are each 7 amended to read as follows:

8 The definitions in this section apply throughout this title or 9 rules adopted under this title unless the context clearly requires 10 otherwise.

(1) "Angling gear" means a line attached to a rod and reel capable of being held in hand while landing the fish or a handheld line operated without rod or reel.

(2) "Bag limit" means the maximum number of game animals, game
birds, or game fish which may be taken, caught, killed, or possessed
by a person, as specified by rule of the commission for a particular
period of time, or as to size, sex, or species.

(3) "Building" means a private domicile, garage, barn, or publicor commercial building.

(4) "Closed area" means a place where the hunting of some or allspecies of wild animals or wild birds is prohibited.

1 (5) "Closed season" means all times, manners of taking, and places or waters other than those established by rule of the 2 commission as an open season. "Closed season" also means all hunting, 3 fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds, game 4 fish, food fish, or shellfish that do not conform to the special 5 6 restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the 7 commission as an open season or that have not otherwise been deemed legal to hunt, fish, take, harvest, or possess by rule of the 8 9 commission as an open season.

10 (6) "Closed waters" means all or part of a lake, river, stream,11 or other body of water, where fishing or harvesting is prohibited.

12 (7) "Commercial" means related to or connected with buying,13 selling, or bartering.

14 (8) "Commission" means the state fish and wildlife commission.

(9) "Concurrent waters of the Columbia river" means those waters of the Columbia river that coincide with the Washington-Oregon state boundary.

18 (10) "Contraband" means any property that is unlawful to produce 19 or possess.

(11) "Covered animal species" means any species of elephant, rhinoceros, tiger, lion, leopard, cheetah, pangolin, marine turtle, shark, or ray either: (a) Listed in appendix I or appendix II of the convention on international trade in endangered species of wild flora and fauna; or (b) listed as critically endangered, endangered, or vulnerable on the international union for conservation of nature and natural resources red list of threatened species.

(12) "Covered animal species part or product" means any item that contains, or is wholly or partially made from, any covered animal species.

30 (13) "Deleterious exotic wildlife" means species of the animal 31 kingdom not native to Washington and designated as dangerous to the 32 environment or wildlife of the state.

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(14) "Department" means the department of fish and wildlife.

34 (15) "Director" means the director of fish and wildlife.

35 (16) "Distribute" or "distribution" means either a change in 36 possession for consideration or a change in legal ownership.

37 (17) "Endangered species" means wildlife designated by the38 commission as seriously threatened with extinction.

39 (18) "Ex officio fish and wildlife officer" means:

1 (a) A commissioned officer of a municipal, county, or state 2 agency having as its primary function the enforcement of criminal 3 laws in general, while the officer is acting in the respective 4 jurisdiction of that agency;

(b) An officer or special agent commissioned by one of the 5 6 following: The national marine fisheries service; the Washington state parks and recreation commission; the United States fish and 7 wildlife service; the Washington state department of natural 8 resources; the United States forest service; or the United States 9 parks service, if the agent or officer is in the respective 10 11 jurisdiction of the primary commissioning agency and is acting under 12 a mutual law enforcement assistance agreement between the department and the primary commissioning agency; 13

(c) A commissioned fish and wildlife peace officer from another state who meets the training standards set by the Washington state criminal justice training commission pursuant to RCW 10.93.090, 43.101.080, and 43.101.200, and who is acting under a mutual law enforcement assistance agreement between the department and the primary commissioning agency; or

(d) A Washington state tribal police officer who successfully
completes the requirements set forth under RCW 43.101.157, is
employed by a tribal nation that has complied with RCW 10.92.020(2)
(a) and (b), and is acting under a mutual law enforcement assistance
agreement between the department and the tribal government.

(19) "Fish" includes all species classified as game fish or food fish by statute or rule, as well as all finfish not currently classified as food fish or game fish if such species exist in state waters. The term "fish" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts of fish species.

30 (20) "To fish" and its derivatives means an effort to kill, 31 injure, harass, harvest, or capture a fish or shellfish.

32 (21) "Fish and wildlife officer" means a person appointed and 33 commissioned by the director, with authority to enforce this title 34 and rules adopted pursuant to this title, and other statutes as 35 prescribed by the legislature. Fish and wildlife officer includes a 36 person commissioned before June 11, 1998, as a wildlife agent or a 37 fisheries patrol officer.

(22) "Fish broker" means a person who facilitates the sale or
 purchase of raw or frozen fish or shellfish on a fee or commission
 basis, without assuming title to the fish or shellfish.

1 (23) "Fish dealer" means a person who engages in any activity 2 that triggers the need to obtain a fish dealer license under RCW 3 77.65.280.

4 (24) "Fishery" means the taking of one or more particular species 5 of fish or shellfish with particular gear in a particular 6 geographical area.

7 (25) "Food, food waste, or other substance" includes human and 8 pet food or other waste or garbage that could attract large wild 9 carnivores.

10 (26) "Fresh water" means all waters not defined as salt water 11 including, but not limited to, rivers upstream of the river mouth, 12 lakes, ponds, and reservoirs.

13 (27) "Fur-bearing animals" means game animals that shall not be 14 trapped except as authorized by the commission.

15 (28) "Fur dealer" means a person who purchases, receives, or 16 resells raw furs for commercial purposes.

17 (29) "Game animals" means wild animals that shall not be hunted 18 except as authorized by the commission.

19 (30) "Game birds" means wild birds that shall not be hunted 20 except as authorized by the commission.

(31) "Game farm" means property on which wildlife is held, confined, propagated, hatched, fed, or otherwise raised for commercial purposes, trade, or gift. The term "game farm" does not include publicly owned facilities.

25 (32) "Game reserve" means a closed area where hunting for all 26 wild animals and wild birds is prohibited.

(33) "To hunt" and its derivatives means an effort to kill,
injure, harass, harvest, or capture a wild animal or wild bird.

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(34) "Illegal items" means those items unlawful to be possessed.

30 (35)(a) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means 31 to purposefully or knowingly provide, leave, or place in, on, or 32 about any land or building any food, food waste, or other substance 33 that attracts or could attract large wild carnivores to that land or 34 building.

35 (b) "Intentionally feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not 36 include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed 37 garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically 38 directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority 39 to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

40 (36) "Large wild carnivore" includes wild bear, cougar, and wolf.

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1 (37) "License year" means the period of time for which a 2 recreational license is valid. The license year begins April 1st, and 3 ends March 31st.

4 (38) "Limited-entry license" means a license subject to a license 5 limitation program established in chapter 77.70 RCW.

6 (39) "Limited fish seller" means a licensed commercial fisher who 7 sells his or her fish or shellfish to anyone other than a wholesale 8 fish buyer thereby triggering the need to obtain a limited fish 9 seller endorsement under RCW 77.65.510.

10 (40) "Money" means all currency, script, personal checks, money 11 orders, or other negotiable instruments.

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(41) "Natural person" means a human being.

(42) (a) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" means to provide, leave, or place in, on, or about any land or building any food, food waste, or other substance that attracts or could attract large wild carnivores to that land or building, without the awareness that a reasonable person in the same situation would have with regard to the likelihood that the food, food waste, or other substance could attract large wild carnivores to the land or building.

20 (b) "Negligently feed, attempt to feed, or attract" does not 21 include keeping food, food waste, or other substance in an enclosed 22 garbage receptacle or other enclosed container unless specifically 23 directed by a fish and wildlife officer or animal control authority 24 to secure the receptacle or container in another manner.

25 (43) "Nonresident" means a person who has not fulfilled the 26 qualifications of a resident.

(44) "Offshore waters" means marine waters of the Pacific Ocean
outside the territorial boundaries of the state, including the marine
waters of other states and countries.

(45) "Open season" means those times, manners of taking, and 30 31 places or waters established by rule of the commission for the lawful 32 hunting, fishing, taking, or possession of game animals, game birds, game fish, food fish, or shellfish that conform to the special 33 restrictions or physical descriptions established by rule of the 34 commission or that have otherwise been deemed legal to hunt, fish, 35 take, or possess by rule of the commission. "Open season" includes 36 the first and last days of the established time. 37

38 (46) "Owner" means the person in whom is vested the ownership 39 dominion, or title of the property.

1 (47) "Person" means and includes an individual; a corporation; a 2 public or private entity or organization; a local, state, or federal 3 agency; all business organizations, including corporations and 4 partnerships; or a group of two or more individuals acting with a 5 common purpose whether acting in an individual, representative, or 6 official capacity.

7 (48) "Personal property" or "property" includes both corporeal
8 and incorporeal personal property and includes, among other property,
9 contraband and money.

10 (49) "Personal use" means for the private use of the individual 11 taking the fish or shellfish and not for sale or barter.

12 (50) "Predatory birds" means wild birds that may be hunted 13 throughout the year as authorized by the commission.

14 (51) "To process" and its derivatives mean preparing or 15 preserving fish, wildlife, or shellfish.

16 (52) "Protected wildlife" means wildlife designated by the 17 commission that shall not be hunted or fished.

18 (53) "Raffle" means an activity in which tickets bearing an 19 individual number are sold for not more than twenty-five dollars each 20 and in which a permit or permits are awarded to hunt or for access to 21 hunt big game animals or wild turkeys on the basis of a drawing from 22 the tickets by the person or persons conducting the raffle.

(54) "Resident" has the same meaning as defined in RCW 77.08.075.

24 (55) "Salt water" means those marine waters seaward of river 25 mouths.

(56) "Seaweed" means marine aquatic plant species that are dependent upon the marine aquatic or tidal environment, and exist in either an attached or free floating form, and includes but is not limited to marine aquatic plants in the classes Chlorophyta, Phaeophyta, and Rhodophyta.

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(57) "Senior" means a person seventy years old or older.

32 (58) "Shark fin" means a raw, dried, or otherwise processed 33 detached fin or tail of a shark.

34 (59)(a) "Shark fin derivative product" means any product intended 35 for use by humans or animals that is derived in whole or in part from 36 shark fins or shark fin cartilage.

(b) "Shark fin derivative product" does not include a drug approved by the United States food and drug administration and available by prescription only or medical device or vaccine approved by the United States food and drug administration.

1 (60) "Shellfish" means those species of marine and freshwater 2 invertebrates that have been classified and that shall not be taken 3 or possessed except as authorized by rule of the commission. The term 4 "shellfish" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts 5 of shellfish species.

6 (61) "State waters" means all marine waters and fresh waters 7 within ordinary high water lines and within the territorial 8 boundaries of the state.

9 (62) "To take" and its derivatives means to kill, injure, 10 harvest, or capture a fish, shellfish, wild animal, bird, or seaweed.

11 (63) "Taxidermist" means a person who, for commercial purposes, 12 creates lifelike representations of fish and wildlife using fish and 13 wildlife parts and various supporting structures.

14 (64) "Trafficking" means offering, attempting to engage, or 15 engaging in sale, barter, or purchase of fish, shellfish, wildlife, 16 or deleterious exotic wildlife.

17 (65) "To trap" and its derivatives means a method of hunting 18 using devices to capture wild animals or wild birds.

19 (66) "Unclaimed" means that no owner of the property has been 20 identified or has requested, in writing, the release of the property 21 to themselves nor has the owner of the property designated an 22 individual to receive the property or paid the required postage to 23 effect delivery of the property.

(67) "Unclassified wildlife" means wildlife existing in
Washington in a wild state that have not been classified as big game,
game animals, game birds, predatory birds, protected wildlife,
endangered wildlife, or deleterious exotic wildlife.

(68) "To waste" or "to be wasted" means to allow any edible 28 portion of any game bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big 29 game animal other than cougar to be rendered unfit for human 30 31 consumption, or to fail to retrieve edible portions of such a game bird, food fish, game fish, shellfish, or big game animal other than 32 cougar from the field. For purposes of this chapter, edible portions 33 of game birds must include, at a minimum, the breast meat of those 34 birds. Entrails, including the heart and liver, of any wildlife 35 species are not considered edible. 36

37 (69) "Wholesale fish buyer" means a person who engages in any 38 fish buying or selling activity that triggers the need to obtain a 39 wholesale fish buyer endorsement under RCW 77.65.340.

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1 (70) "Wild animals" means those species of the class Mammalia 2 whose members exist in Washington in a wild state. The term "wild 3 animal" does not include feral domestic mammals or old world rats and 4 mice of the family Muridae of the order Rodentia.

5 (71) "Wild birds" means those species of the class Aves whose 6 members exist in Washington in a wild state.

7 (72) "Wildlife" means all species of the animal kingdom whose members exist in Washington in a wild state. This includes but is not 8 9 limited to mammals, birds, reptiles, amphibians, fish, and invertebrates. The term "wildlife" does not include feral domestic 10 11 mammals, old world rats and mice of the family Muridae of the order 12 Rodentia, or those fish, shellfish, and marine invertebrates classified as food fish or shellfish by the director. The term 13 "wildlife" includes all stages of development and the bodily parts of 14 15 wildlife members.

16 (73) "Wildlife meat cutter" means a person who packs, cuts, 17 processes, or stores wildlife for consumption for another for 18 commercial purposes.

(74) "Youth" means a person ((fifteen years old for fishing and))
 under sixteen years old for fishing and hunting.

21 Sec. 2. RCW 77.08.075 and 2014 c 48 s 2 are each amended to read 22 as follows:

23 (1) For the purposes of this title or rules adopted under this 24 title, "resident" means((\div

(1) A)) <u>a</u> natural person who has maintained a permanent place of abode within the state for at least ninety days immediately preceding an application for a license, has established by formal evidence an intent to continue residing within the state, is not licensed to hunt or fish as a resident in another state or country, and is not receiving resident benefits of another state or country.

31 (((a))) (2) For purposes of this section, "permanent place of 32 abode" means a residence in this state that a person maintains for 33 personal use.

34 (((b))) <u>(a)</u> A natural person can demonstrate that the person has 35 maintained a permanent place of abode in Washington by showing that 36 the person:

37 (i) Uses a Washington state address for federal income tax or 38 state tax purposes; 1 (ii) Designates this state as the person's residence for 2 obtaining eligibility to hold a public office or for judicial 3 actions;

4 (iii) Is a registered voter in the state of Washington; or

5 (iv) Is a custodial parent with a child attending 6 prekindergarten, kindergarten, elementary school, middle school, or 7 high school in this state.

8 (((c))) <u>(b)</u> A natural person can demonstrate the intent to 9 continue residing within the state by showing that he or she:

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(i) Has a valid Washington state driver's license; or

11 (ii) Has a valid Washington state identification card, if the 12 person is not eligible for a Washington state driver's license; and

13 (iii) Has registered the person's vehicle or vehicles in 14 Washington state((;

15 (2) The spouse of a member of the United States armed forces if 16 the member qualifies as a resident under subsection (1), (3), or (4) 17 of this section, or a natural person age eighteen or younger who does 18 not qualify as a resident under subsection (1) of this section, but 19 who has a parent or legal guardian who qualifies as a resident under 20 subsection (1), (3), or (4) of this section;

21 (3) A member of the United States armed forces temporarily 22 stationed in Washington state on predeployment orders. A copy of the 23 person's military orders is required to meet this condition;

(4) An active duty, nonretired member of the United States armed forces who is permanently stationed in Washington or who designates Washington on his or her military "state of legal residence certificate" or enlistment or reenlistment documents. A copy of the person's "state of legal residence certificate" or enlistment or reenlistment documents is required to meet the conditions of this subsection)).

31 Sec. 3. RCW 77.32.155 and 2017 c 255 s 1 are each amended to 32 read as follows:

(1) (a) ((When purchasing any hunting license, persons under the age of eighteen)) All persons purchasing any hunting license for the first time, if born on or after January 1, 1972, shall present certification of completion of a course of instruction ((of at least ten hours)) in the safe handling of firearms, safety, conservation, and sporting/hunting behavior. ((All persons purchasing any hunting 1 license for the first time, if born after January 1, 1972, shall
2 present such certification.))

3 (b)(i) The director may establish a program for training persons 4 in the safe handling of firearms, conservation, and sporting/hunting 5 behavior and shall prescribe the type of instruction and the 6 qualifications of the instructors. The director shall, as part of 7 establishing the training program, exempt the following individuals 8 from the firearms skills portion of any instruction course completed 9 over the internet:

10 (A) ((Members)) Current or retired members of the United States
11 military;

12 (B) Current or retired general authority Washington peace 13 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020;

14 (C) Current or retired limited authority Washington peace 15 officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly 16 authorized by his or her employer to carry a concealed pistol;

(D) Current or retired specially commissioned Washington peace officers as defined in RCW 10.93.020, if the officer is or was duly authorized by his or her commissioning agency to carry a concealed pistol; ((and))

(E) Current or retired Washington peace officers as defined in RCW 43.101.010 who have met the requirements of RCW 43.101.095 or 43.101.157 and whose certification is in good standing or has not been revoked; and

25 <u>(F) Current or retired federal peace officers as defined in RCW</u> 26 <u>10.93.020</u>.

(ii) The director may cooperate with the national rifle association, organized sports/outdoor enthusiasts' groups, or other public or private organizations when establishing the training program.

31 (c) Upon the successful completion of a course established under 32 this section, the trainee shall receive a hunter education 33 certificate signed by an authorized instructor. The certificate is 34 evidence of compliance with this section.

35 (d) The director may accept certificates from other states that 36 persons have successfully completed firearm safety, hunter education, 37 or similar courses as evidence of compliance with this section.

(2) (a) The director may authorize a once in a lifetime, one
 license year deferral of hunter education training for individuals
 who are accompanied, while hunting, by a nondeferred Washington-

licensed hunter who ((has held a Washington hunting license for the prior three years and is over)) is at least eighteen years of age. The commission shall adopt rules for the administration of this subsection to avoid potential fraud and abuse.

5 (b) The director is authorized to collect an application fee, not 6 to exceed twenty dollars, for obtaining the once in a lifetime, one 7 license year deferral of hunter education training from the 8 department. This fee must be deposited into the fish and wildlife 9 enforcement reward account and must be used exclusively to administer 10 the deferral program created in this subsection.

11 (c) For the purposes of this subsection, "accompanied" means to 12 go along with another person while staying within a range of the 13 other person that permits continual unaided visual and auditory 14 communication.

15 (3) To encourage the participation of an adequate number of 16 instructors for the training program, the commission shall develop 17 nonmonetary incentives available to individuals who commit to serving 18 as an instructor. The incentives may include additional hunting 19 opportunities for instructors.

20 <u>(4) The commission is authorized to adopt rules to offer a one-</u> 21 <u>time discount of up to \$20 on a hunting license purchase to first-</u> 22 <u>time resident hunters who have completed the Washington hunter</u> 23 <u>education training program.</u>

24 Sec. 4. RCW 77.32.470 and 2020 c 148 s 20 are each amended to 25 read as follows:

(1) A personal use saltwater, freshwater, combination, or
temporary((, or family fishing weekend)) license is required for all
persons ((fifteen)) <u>16</u> years of age or older to fish for or possess
fish taken for personal use from state waters or offshore waters.

30 (2) The fees for annual personal use saltwater, freshwater, or 31 combination licenses are as follows:

32 (a) A combination license allows the holder to fish for or 33 possess fish, shellfish, and seaweed from state waters or offshore 34 waters. The fee for this license is forty-five dollars for 35 residents((τ)) and one hundred eight dollars for nonresidents((τ) and 36 five dollars for youth)). There is an additional fifty-cent surcharge 37 for this license, to be deposited in the rockfish research account 38 created in RCW 77.12.702. 1 (b) A saltwater license allows the holder to fish for or possess 2 fish taken from saltwater areas. The fee for this license is twenty-3 five dollars for residents, fifty-two dollars for nonresidents, and 4 five dollars for resident seniors. There is an additional fifty-cent 5 surcharge for this license, to be deposited in the rockfish research 6 account created in RCW 77.12.702.

7 (c) A freshwater license allows the holder to fish for, take, or 8 possess food fish or game fish species in all freshwater areas. The 9 fee for this license is twenty-five dollars for residents, seventy-10 five dollars for nonresidents, and five dollars for resident seniors.

(3) (a) A temporary combination fishing license is valid for one to three consecutive days and allows the holder to fish for or possess fish, shellfish, and seaweed taken from state waters or offshore waters. The fee for this temporary fishing license is:

15 (i) One day - Eight dollars for residents and sixteen dollars for 16 nonresidents;

17 (ii) Two days - Twelve dollars for residents and twenty-four 18 dollars for nonresidents; and

19 (iii) Three days - Fifteen dollars for residents and thirty 20 dollars for nonresidents.

(b) The fee for a charter stamp is eight dollars for a one-day temporary combination fishing license for residents and nonresidents for use on a charter boat as defined in RCW 77.65.150.

(c) ((Except for active duty military personnel serving in any branch of the United States armed forces, the temporary combination fishing license is not valid on game fish species for an eightconsecutive-day period beginning on the opening day of the lowland lake fishing season as defined by rule of the commission.

(d))) The temporary combination fishing license fee for active duty military personnel serving in any branch of the United States armed forces is the resident rate ((as set forth in (a) of this subsection)). Active duty military personnel must provide a valid military identification card at the time of purchase of the temporary license to qualify for the resident rate.

35 (((e))) <u>(d)</u> There is an additional fifty-cent surcharge on the 36 temporary combination fishing license and the associated charter 37 stamp, to be deposited in the rockfish research account created in 38 RCW 77.12.702.

39 (4) ((A family fishing weekend license allows for a maximum of 40 six anglers: One resident and five youth; two residents and four youth; or one resident, one nonresident, and four youth. This license allows the holders to fish for or possess fish taken from state waters or offshore waters. The fee for this license is twenty dollars. This license is only valid during periods as specified by rule of the department.

6 (5) The commission may adopt rules to create and sell combination 7 licenses for all hunting and fishing activities at or below a fee 8 equal to the total cost of the individual license contained within 9 any combination.

10 (6))) The commission may adopt rules to allow the use of two 11 fishing poles ((per fishing license holder for use)) on selected 12 state waters. If authorized by the commission, license holders 16 years of age or older must purchase a two-pole stamp to use a second 13 pole. The proceeds from the sale of the two-pole stamp must be 14 deposited into the limited fish and wildlife account created in RCW 15 16 77.12.170(1) and used for the operation and maintenance of state-17 owned fish hatcheries. The fee for a two-pole stamp is thirteen dollars for residents and nonresidents, and five dollars for seniors. 18

19 Sec. 5. RCW 77.32.480 and 2016 c 78 s 1 are each amended to read 20 as follows:

(1) Upon written application, a combination fishing license shall be issued at the reduced rate of five dollars and all hunting licenses shall be issued at the reduced rate of a youth hunting license fee for the following individuals:

(a) A resident sixty-five years old or older who is an honorably
 discharged veteran of the United States armed forces having a
 service-connected disability;

(b) A resident who is an honorably discharged veteran of the United States armed forces with a thirty percent or more serviceconnected disability;

31 (c) A resident with a disability who permanently uses a 32 wheelchair;

33 (d) A resident who is blind or visually impaired; and

(e) A resident with a developmental disability as defined in RCW
 71A.10.020 with documentation of the disability certified by a
 physician licensed to practice in this state.

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1 a combination fishing license or any hunting license at the same cost 2 charged to a nondisabled Washington resident for the same license)) 3 combination fishing license or any hunting license must be issued at 4 the same cost charged to a nondisabled Washington resident for the 5 following individuals:

- 6 <u>(a) A nonstate resident veteran with a disability who otherwise</u> 7 <u>satisfies the criteria of subsection (1)(a) or (b) of this section;</u>
 - (b) An active duty member of the United States armed forces;

9 <u>(c) A full-time student who is enrolled in and attending an</u> 10 <u>accredited institution of higher education, as defined in RCW</u> 11 <u>28B.10.016, in Washington for at least six months immediately prior</u> 12 <u>to the date of application for any license. A student is deemed full-</u> 13 <u>time under the rules of the educational institution the student is</u> 14 <u>attending;</u>

15 (d) A natural person age 18 or younger, who does not qualify as a 16 resident, but who has a parent or legal guardian who qualifies for a 17 discount under (a) through (c) of this subsection; and

18 (e) The spouse of an individual who qualifies for a discount
19 under (a) through (c) of this subsection.

(3) Upon written application and department verification, the 20 21 following recreational hunting licenses must be issued at no cost to 22 a resident member of the state quard or national quard, as defined in 23 RCW 38.04.010, as long as the state guard or national guard member is: An active full-time state guard or national guard employee; or a 24 25 state guard or national guard member whose status requires the state 26 guard or national guard member to participate in drill training on a 27 part-time basis:

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(a) A small game hunting license under RCW 77.32.460(1);

- 29 (b) A supplemental migratory bird permit under RCW 77.32.350; and
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- (c) A big game hunting license under RCW 77.32.450 (1) and (2).

31 Sec. 6. RCW 77.32.520 and 2011 c 339 s 13 are each amended to 32 read as follows:

(1) A personal use shellfish and seaweed license is required for all persons other than residents or nonresidents under ((fifteen)) <u>16</u> years of age to fish for, take, dig for, or possess seaweed or shellfish, including razor clams, for personal use from state waters or offshore waters including national park beaches. 1 (2) A razor clam license allows a person to harvest only razor 2 clams for personal use from state waters, including national park 3 beaches.

4 (3) The fees for annual personal use shellfish and seaweed 5 licenses are:

6 (a) For a resident ((fifteen)) <u>16</u> years of age or older, ten 7 dollars;

8 (b) For a nonresident ((fifteen)) <u>16</u> years of age or older, 9 twenty-seven dollars; and

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(c) For a senior, five dollars.

(4) The fee for an annual razor clam license is eight dollars for residents, fifteen dollars for nonresidents, and eight dollars for seniors.

(1) The vehicle access pass is created solely for access to the 22 23 department of fish and wildlife recreation sites or lands. <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. A new section is added to chapter 77.32
 RCW to read as follows:

3 (1) The commission may adopt rules to create and sell combination 4 licenses for all hunting and fishing activities at or below a fee 5 equal to the total cost of the individual license contained within 6 any combination. Combination licenses may span one or more license 7 years.

8 (2) The director may offer temporary discounted promotional 9 pricing to increase angler, hunting, or wildlife viewing 10 participation.

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
