AN ACT Relating to creating the Washington career and college pathways innovation challenge program; amending RCW 28B.120.040; reenacting and amending RCW 43.79A.040; adding a new section to chapter 28B.120 RCW; and repealing RCW 28B.120.005, 28B.120.010, 28B.120.020, 28B.120.025, 28B.120.030, and 28B.120.900.

6 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

7 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 1. A new section is added to chapter 28B.120 8 RCW to read as follows:

9 (1) The Washington career and college pathways innovation 10 challenge program is established. The purpose of the program is to 11 meet statewide educational attainment goals established in RCW 12 28B.77.020 by developing local and regional partnerships that foster 13 innovations to:

(a) Increase postsecondary enrollment and completion for students
 enrolling directly from high school and adults returning to
 education; and

(b) Eliminate educational opportunity gaps for students of color, English language learners, students with disabilities, and foster and homeless youth.

20 (2)(a) The student achievement council shall administer the 21 program and award grants, based on a competitive grant process, to

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1 local and regional partnerships that represent cross-sector collaborations among education and higher education agencies and 2 institutions, local education agencies, local government, community-3 based organizations, employers, and other local entities. The student 4 achievement council must consult, in both the design of the grant 5 6 program as well as in the administration of the grant program, with stakeholders including representatives of: 7

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(i) The state board for community and technical colleges;

(ii) An organization representing the presidents of the public 9 four-year institutions of higher education; 10

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- (iii) The workforce training and education coordinating board;

12 (iv) An organization representing the private, not-for-profit, four-year institutions of higher education; 13

(v) The commission on African American affairs; 14

(vi) The commission on Hispanic affairs; 15

16 (vii) The commission on Asian Pacific American affairs;

17 (viii) The Washington state LGBTQ commission;

(ix) The governor's office of Indian affairs; and 18

(x) The Washington state women's commission. 19

(b) In awarding the grants, the student achievement council shall 20 21 consider applications that:

(i) Plan and pilot innovative initiatives to raise educational 22 23 attainment and decrease opportunity gaps;

(ii) Engage community-based organizations and resources; 24

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(iii) Expand the use of integrated work-based learning;

(iv) Provide financial support to cover expenses beyond 26 27 educational tuition and fees, and other services and supports for 28 students to enroll and complete education and training; and

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(v) Include local matching funds.

(c) In administering the program the student achievement council 30 31 may hire staff to support grant oversight and provide technical 32 assistance to grantees.

(d) The student achievement council may solicit and receive such 33 gifts, grants, and endowments from public or private sources as may 34 be made from time to time, in trust or otherwise, for the use and 35 benefit of the purposes of the program and may expend the same or any 36 income therefrom according to the terms of the gifts, grants, or 37 38 endowments.

39 (3) The student achievement council shall provide a report each 40 year beginning September 1, 2022, to the governor and the education

1 and higher education committees of the legislature in accordance with 2 RCW 43.01.036. The report shall:

3 (a) Describe grants awarded;

4 (b) Report the progress of each local and regional partnership by 5 reporting on high school graduation, postsecondary enrollment, and 6 completion for each of the regions that partnerships serve; and

7 (c) Disaggregate data by income, race, ethnicity, and other 8 demographic characteristics.

9 Sec. 2. RCW 28B.120.040 and 2012 c 229 s 575 are each amended to 10 read as follows:

The ((student achievement council fund for innovation and 11 quality)) Washington career and college pathways innovation challenge 12 13 program account is hereby established in the custody of the state treasurer. The student achievement council shall deposit in the fund 14 15 all moneys received ((under RCW 28B.120.030)) for the Washington 16 career and college pathways innovation challenge program. Moneys in the fund may be spent only for the purposes of ((RCW 28B.120.010 and 17 28B.120.020)) awarding grants under the Washington career and college 18 pathways innovation challenge program. Disbursements from the fund 19 20 shall be on the authorization of the student achievement council. The 21 fund is subject to the allotment procedure provided under chapter 22 43.88 RCW, but ((no)) an appropriation is not required for disbursements. 23

24 Sec. 3. RCW 43.79A.040 and 2021 c 175 s 10 and 2021 c 108 s 5 25 are each reenacted and amended to read as follows:

(1) Money in the treasurer's trust fund may be deposited, invested, and reinvested by the state treasurer in accordance with RCW 43.84.080 in the same manner and to the same extent as if the money were in the state treasury, and may be commingled with moneys in the state treasury for cash management and cash balance purposes.

31 (2) All income received from investment of the treasurer's trust 32 fund must be set aside in an account in the treasury trust fund to be 33 known as the investment income account.

34 (3) The investment income account may be utilized for the payment 35 of purchased banking services on behalf of treasurer's trust funds 36 including, but not limited to, depository, safekeeping, and 37 disbursement functions for the state treasurer or affected state 38 agencies. The investment income account is subject in all respects to

1 chapter 43.88 RCW, but no appropriation is required for payments to 2 financial institutions. Payments must occur prior to distribution of 3 earnings set forth in subsection (4) of this section.

4 (4) (a) Monthly, the state treasurer must distribute the earnings
5 credited to the investment income account to the state general fund
6 except under (b), (c), and (d) of this subsection.

7 The following accounts and funds must receive their (b) proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's 8 average daily balance for the period: The 24/7 sobriety account, the 9 Washington promise scholarship account, the Gina Grant Bull memorial 10 legislative page scholarship account, the Rosa Franklin legislative 11 12 internship program scholarship ((<del>[account]</del>)) <u>account</u>, the Washington advanced college tuition payment program account, the Washington 13 college savings program account, the accessible communities account, 14 the Washington achieving a better life experience program account, 15 the Washington career and college pathways innovation challenge 16 17 program account, the community and technical college innovation account, the agricultural local fund, the American Indian scholarship 18 19 endowment fund, the foster care scholarship endowment fund, the foster care endowed scholarship trust fund, the contract harvesting 20 21 revolving account, the Washington state combined fund drive account, 22 the commemorative works account, the county enhanced 911 excise tax account, the county road administration board emergency loan account, 23 the toll collection account, the developmental disabilities endowment 24 25 trust fund, the energy account, the fair fund, the family and medical leave insurance account, the fish and wildlife federal 26 lands revolving account, the natural resources federal lands revolving 27 28 account, the food animal veterinarian conditional scholarship account, the forest health revolving account, the fruit and vegetable 29 inspection account, the educator conditional scholarship account, the 30 31 game farm alternative account, the GET ready for math and science 32 scholarship account, the Washington global health technologies and 33 product development account, the grain inspection revolving fund, the Washington history day account, the industrial insurance rainy day 34 35 fund, the juvenile accountability incentive account, the law enforcement officers' and firefighters' plan 2 expense fund, the 36 local tourism promotion account, the low-income home rehabilitation 37 revolving loan program account, the multiagency permitting team 38 39 account, the northeast Washington wolf-livestock management account, the produce railcar pool account, the public use general aviation 40

1 airport loan revolving account, the regional transportation investment district account, the rural rehabilitation account, the 2 Washington sexual assault kit account, the stadium and exhibition 3 center account, the youth athletic facility account, the self-4 insurance revolving fund, the children's trust fund, the Washington 5 6 horse racing commission Washington bred owners' bonus fund and breeder awards account, the Washington horse racing commission class 7 C purse fund account, the individual development account program 8 account, the Washington horse racing commission operating account, 9 10 the life sciences discovery fund, the Washington state library-11 archives building account, the reduced cigarette ignition propensity 12 account, the center for deaf and hard of hearing youth account, the school for the blind account, the Millersylvania park trust fund, the 13 public employees' and retirees' insurance reserve fund, the school 14 15 employees' benefits board insurance reserve fund, the public 16 employees' and retirees' insurance account, the school employees' 17 insurance account, the long-term services and supports trust account, 18 the radiation perpetual maintenance fund, the Indian health 19 improvement reinvestment account, the department of licensing tuition recovery trust fund, the student achievement council tuition recovery 20 21 trust fund, the tuition recovery trust fund, the industrial insurance premium refund account, the mobile home park relocation fund, the 22 23 natural resources deposit fund, the Washington state health insurance pool account, the federal forest revolving account, and the library 24 25 operations account.

(c) The following accounts and funds must receive eighty percent of their proportionate share of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance for the period: The advance right-of-way revolving fund, the advanced environmental mitigation revolving account, the federal narcotics asset forfeitures account, the high occupancy vehicle account, the local rail service assistance account, and the miscellaneous transportation programs account.

33 (d) Any state agency that has independent authority over accounts 34 or funds not statutorily required to be held in the custody of the 35 state treasurer that deposits funds into a fund or account in the 36 custody of the state treasurer pursuant to an agreement with the 37 office of the state treasurer shall receive its proportionate share 38 of earnings based upon each account's or fund's average daily balance 39 for the period.

1 (5) In conformance with Article II, section 37 of the state 2 Constitution, no trust accounts or funds shall be allocated earnings 3 without the specific affirmative directive of this section.
