## SENATE BILL 5871

AN ACT Relating to establishing a pilot project to authorize certificated teachers to operate microschools; amending RCW 3 28B.76.526; adding a new chapter to Title 28A RCW; and providing an 4 expiration date.

5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

6 NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. INTENT. The legislature recognizes that 7 greater flexibility is required to meet the increasingly complex needs of student populations. Through establishing a microschool 8 pilot program, the legislature intends to provide certificated 9 10 educators with the opportunity to showcase unique professional 11 approaches and customized education services to improve the student 12 academic experience. The legislature also understands that some 13 students may particularly benefit from accessing instruction not regularly offered within the typical K-12 classroom. Therefore, the 14 15 legislature intends to prioritize the approval of microschools that 16 serve students with disabilities, students who are not meeting 17 academic standards, and students who require transitional bilingual 18 instruction.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 2. PILOT PROJECT. (1) The office of the 20 superintendent of public instruction shall establish a pilot project 1 to authorize certificated teachers to operate microschools as an 2 alternative environment for K-12 student instruction. The pilot 3 project shall commence beginning August 31, 2022, and conclude June 4 30, 2028.

5 (2) The office of the superintendent of public instruction and 6 the state board of education shall adopt rules to implement the pilot 7 project and may adapt requirements when necessary to allow for the 8 operation of microschools.

(3) The office of the superintendent of public instruction shall 9 approve up to 50 certificated teachers to operate microschools during 10 the first school year of the pilot project and up to 10 additional 11 12 certificated teachers to operate microschools each school year thereafter until the pilot project concludes. If, in any school year, 13 fewer microschools are established than authorized under 14 this subsection, additional microschools may be approved in subsequent 15 16 years to reach the cumulative approval limit. When selecting and 17 approving certificated teachers to operate microschools, the office of the superintendent of public instruction must aim to select 18 certificated teachers that will operate microschools in a variety of 19 rural, urban, and suburban locations, and may give priority to: 20

(a) Microschools that will serve students with disabilities whoare eligible for special education;

(b) Microschools that will serve students who are not meeting academic standards as defined in RCW 28A.165.015 at the time of enrollment; and

26 (c) Microschools that will provide transitional bilingual 27 instruction to eligible pupils defined in RCW 28A.180.030.

(4) The office of the superintendent of public instruction mustprovide the following reports to the legislature and the governor:

30 (a) By January 15, 2023, and annually thereafter through January 31 15, 2027, a brief status report describing implementation of the 32 microschool pilot project, including a description of the 33 microschools operated by certificated teachers and the number of 34 students and families being served by those microschools; and

35 (b) By November 30, 2027, a full report on findings from the 36 pilot project, including recommendations for modifying or expanding 37 the authorization of certificated teachers to operate microschools.

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<u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. DEFINITIONS. The definitions in this
 section apply throughout this chapter unless the context clearly
 requires otherwise.

4 (1) "Alternative learning environment" means an instructional
5 environment that is adequate to meet the approved instructional
6 program offered by the certificated teacher and meets reasonable
7 health and fire safety requirements.

8 (2) "Approved instructional program" means a program that offers 9 the annual minimum instructional hours required under RCW 28A.150.220 10 and provides course content that meets or exceeds the basic education 11 skills identified in RCW 28A.150.210 and the graduation requirements 12 under RCW 28A.230.090.

(3) "Certificated teacher" means a person who holds a professional education certificate as authorized by the Washington professional educator standards board and whose primary duty is the daily educational instruction of students.

17 (4) "Microschool" means an alternative learning environment 18 operated by a single certificated teacher who provides an approved 19 instructional program to up to 20 participating K-12 students. A 20 microschool is not a private school under chapter 28A.195 RCW and is 21 not home-based instruction under chapter 28A.200 RCW.

22 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 4. MICROSCHOOL OPERATIONS. (1) A microschool 23 must:

(a) Comply with local, state, and federal health, safety,
parents' rights, civil rights, and nondiscrimination laws applicable
to school districts and to the same extent as school districts
including, but not limited to, prohibiting discrimination as set
forth in chapter 28A.642 RCW and requiring sexual equality as set
forth in chapter 28A.640 RCW;

30 (b) Provide a program of basic education, that meets the goals in 31 RCW 28A.150.210, including instruction in the essential academic 32 learning requirements, and participate in the statewide student 33 assessment system as developed under RCW 28A.655.070;

34 (c) Comply with the screening and intervention requirements under 35 RCW 28A.320.260;

36 (d) Comply with the employee record check requirements in RCW 37 28A.400.303;

38 (e) Adhere to generally accepted accounting principles and be 39 subject to financial examinations and audits as determined by the

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1 state auditor, including annual audits for legal and fiscal
2 compliance;

3 (f) Comply with the annual performance report under RCW 4 28A.655.110; and

5 (g) Be subject to the performance improvement goals adopted by 6 the state board of education under RCW 28A.305.130.

7 (2) A certificated teacher approved to operate a microschool may
8 hire staff to assist in microschool operations.

9 (3) A microschool may not engage in any sectarian practices in 10 its educational program, admissions, or employment policies, or 11 operations.

12 (4) A microschool is a public school for purposes of RCW 13 28A.225.010.

14 (5) Microschools are subject to the supervision of the 15 superintendent of public instruction and the state board of 16 education, including accountability measures, to the same extent as 17 other public schools, except as otherwise provided in this chapter.

18 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 5. FUNDING. (1) Subject to amounts 19 appropriated for this specific purpose, the office of the 20 superintendent of public instruction must allocate the following 21 amounts to certificated teachers operating microschools:

(a) The base allocation per full-time equivalent student for the school district in which the microschool is located, multiplied by the number of full-time equivalent students enrolled at the microschool;

(b) Excess cost allocations for students enrolled at the microschool that are eligible for and receiving special education, as calculated under RCW 28A.150.390(2)(b); and

(c) Categorical allocations equal to 15 percent of the base allocation per full-time equivalent student as determined under (a) of this subsection for each eligible pupil enrolled at the microschool receiving transitional bilingual instruction under chapter 28A.180 RCW. An enrolled eligible pupil may only generate allocations under this subsection for three school years.

35 (2) Microschools are eligible to apply for special education 36 safety net awards.

37 (3) Microschools are operated separately from the common school38 system as an alternative to traditional common schools. All funds

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appropriated for the operation of microschools must be appropriated
 from the Washington opportunity pathways account.

3 Sec. 6. RCW 28B.76.526 and 2020 c 357 s 911 are each amended to 4 read as follows:

5 The Washington opportunity pathways account is created in the state treasury. Expenditures from the account may be used only for 6 programs in chapter 28A.--- RCW (the new chapter created in section 7 7 of this act) (microschools), chapter 28A.710 RCW (charter schools), 8 chapter 28B.12 RCW (state work-study), chapter 28B.50 9 RCW 10 (opportunity grant), RCW 28B.76.660 (Washington scholars award), RCW 11 28B.76.670 (Washington award for vocational excellence), chapter 28B.92 RCW (Washington college grant program), chapter 28B.105 RCW 12 (GET ready for math and science scholarship), chapter 28B.117 RCW 13 (passport to careers), chapter 28B.118 RCW (college bound 14 15 scholarship), and chapter 43.216 RCW (early childhood education and assistance program). During the 2019-21 fiscal biennium, the account 16 17 may also be appropriated for public schools funded under chapters 18 28A.150 and 28A.715 RCW.

19 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 7. Sections 1 through 5 and 8 of this act 20 constitute a new chapter in Title 28A RCW.

21 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 8. This act expires June 30, 2030.

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
