1 AN ACT Relating to ballot titles for initiatives to the people; 2 amending RCW 29A.72.050; creating a new section; and declaring an 3 emergency.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF WASHINGTON:

5 Sec. 1. RCW 29A.72.050 and 2003 c 111 s 1806 are each amended to 6 read as follows:

7 The ballot title for an initiative to the people, (1)an initiative to the legislature, a referendum bill, or a referendum 8 measure consists of: (a) A statement of the subject of the measure; 9 10 (b) a concise description of the measure; and (c) a question in the 11 form prescribed in this section for the ballot measure in question. The statement of the subject of a measure must be sufficiently broad 12 to reflect the subject of the measure, sufficiently precise to give 13 14 notice of the measure's subject matter, and not exceed ten words. The concise description must contain no more than thirty words, be a true 15 16 impartial description of the measure's essential contents, and 17 clearly identify the proposition to be voted on, and not, to the extent reasonably possible, create prejudice either for or against 18 19 the measure.

20 (2) For an initiative to the people, or for an initiative to the 21 legislature for which the legislature has not proposed an

alternative, the ballot title must be displayed on the ballot
 substantially as follows:

8 (3) For an initiative to the legislature for which the 9 legislature has proposed an alternative, the ballot title must be 10 displayed on the ballot substantially as follows:

11 "Initiative Measure Nos. . . and . . .B concern (statement 12 of subject).

13 Initiative Measure No. . . . would (concise description).

14As an alternative, the legislature has proposed Initiative15Measure No. . . .B, which would (concise description).

(4) For a referendum bill submitted to the people by the
legislature, the ballot issue must be displayed on the ballot
substantially as follows:

1 (5) For a referendum measure by state voters on a bill the 2 legislature has passed, the ballot issue must be displayed on the 3 ballot substantially as follows:

6 referendum petition on this bill. This bill would (concise
7 description). Should this bill be:

(6) The legislature may specify the statement of subject or 10 11 concise description, or both, in a referendum bill that it refers to 12 the people. The legislature may specify the concise description for an alternative it submits for an initiative to the legislature. If 13 the legislature fails to specify these matters, the attorney general 14 shall prepare the material that was not specified. The statement of 15 16 subject and concise description as so provided must be included as part of the ballot title unless changed on appeal. 17

18 The attorney general shall specify the statement of subject and 19 concise description for an initiative to the people, an initiative to 20 the legislature, and a referendum measure. The statement of subject 21 and concise description as so provided must be included as part of 22 the ballot title unless changed on appeal. Any initiative to the people that imposes any tax, fee, or charge, from any source, in any 23 amount, and for any purpose, must be given a ballot title describing 24 the initiative as a measure that increases taxes. 25

26 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> **Sec. 2.** This act applies to all initiatives to the 27 people filed with the secretary of state beginning January 1, 2016.

28 <u>NEW SECTION.</u> Sec. 3. This act is necessary for the immediate 29 preservation of the public peace, health, or safety, or support of 30 the state government and its existing public institutions, and takes 31 effect immediately.
